## Light From The Pastor's Study

#### WHAT THE MASTER REQUIRES.

At this period of the Christian Year, our minds are full of the words and the teachings of Jesus. For instance, we are glad that once he said, "If any man will come after me let him deny himself, and take up his cross and follow me."

We are also encouraged to note that our New Testament leads us into some strict disciplines. Life is not to be an aimless journey for us, but one filled with purpose and devotion. It is for us to see now that "The love of Christ constraineth us." We are not free to be anything but the best. Jesus of Nazareth has a right to require much of us.

Purposeful living has never been easy. Shiftless, careless living may seem easy, yet it too has its own kind of a cross, but never a crown at all. That is life's tragedy. It seems that life always has a stern way of reminding us that there are laws, rules to be observed; that there are so many things required of us along the way.

Sorrow is one of the stern requirements of life. Suffering in another. We all face the fact of lonliness too, and many times. So it need not seem strange if our religion, Christianity, has some stern requirements also. We believe that our religion shows life on the highest level, and the best never comes easy, nor is it cheap.

The Old Testament is the story of the development of moral and spiritual religion among men. So many rules and so many laws grew up. But it was the old Prophet Micah who said: "What doth the Lord require of thee but to do justly, love mercy and walk humbly with God?"

The New Testament is the story of the Man of Galilee. His Spirit is loose in our world. Men may hedge it about with cumbersome creeds, dismal dogmas, limitless laws, but Jesus said, "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, take up his cross and follow me."

Is this religion to be coldly formal or fervently spiritual? Not what we do, but what we become is important. If doing aids becoming, well and good. If doing is an end in itself, religion is vain.

First of all, we can say that The Master requires a definite denial of self. Indeed, the spirit will discipline the body, or else the body will dominate the spirit of man. The Master represents the best, and He would have us to become obedient to the highest. That, of course, means discipline; and, for the most part, we do not like to come under constraint.

Men may say, "We will not conform". Yet, they are busy doing just that day by day. The Master does not require us to conform, he urges us to "be transformed", to become new creatures. A man wrapped up in self is selfish; and selfishness is a great tyrant. Jesus requires us to be victorious over self.

"Look at one other requirement. He says, "Take up your cross." He surely knew us for what we are, but he also believed in our potential best. He knows that I can carry my own cross, and that I must learn to do so.

The highest within me must triumph over the lowest within me. The cross means dying to evil and sin. It means self-giving in love, in service to God and to others. My cross may be many things, but surely it must be the cause to which I commit myself in life.

It was that for Jesus. Here is a fine quotation from Leslie Weatherhead about Jesus: "The words of Jesus about his suffering and death reveal that he willingly committed himself to some mighty task, costly to him beyond our imagining, but effecting for all men a deliverance beyond their own power to achieve, and that in doing so he knew himself to be utterly and completely one with God the Father."

As we remember Him, let us accept His plain requirements for the Christian.

Dear Mrs. Plant,

It was so good to have your letter. I don't have very much contact with Tallahassee anymore, and I wonder so often about the people there, the church, and the town. Especially at graduation time this year I was wondering about my ex-fourth graders who should have graduated from high school.

You were correct that my preparation was in the field of religious education, and it's a good background for being a minister's wife. This is our fourth year at Irofino, which is the county seat in the midst of logging country in the Idaho panhandle. Our church at Irofino has a membership of 250, and we have another church in Cavendish, which is a farming community, seventeen miles up on top of a mountain. (We are in a river valley.)

In a sense this part of the country is about as close to the frontier as anywhere in the United States, for some of the first settlers are still alive and remember the Indian Wars and pioneer travel. It's beautiful country, and we like it very much. "We" include two little boys, David, who will be four in September, and John Paul, who was two last Sunday.

Your committee knows the wide scope of church vocations. I love being a minister's wife. Aside from the particular minister I like being close to the work of the church—both locally and in the conference. Beside the actual training I got in seminary one of the biggest joys is the world-wide contact; it's quite a

thrill to read about the work around the world being done by people I went to school with.

If any of the present-day Trinity youth are considering a church vocation I think one of the best preparations is through the youth program beyond the local church—camps, caravans, work camps, etc.
