# WORLD COMMUNITY DAY JOINT OBSERVANCE TO BE HELD NOVEMBER 7

World Community Day observances will be held Friday, Nov. 7, at 10 a.m. in the recently constructed Tallahassee Christian church. The service will be the first joint meeting in the church since its opening.

The message for the day will be brought by Dr. Ralph L. Eyman, retired FSU School of Education professor.

Purpose of the community-wide meeting will be to study and discuss the value of exchange with the developing nations in building a positive peace, to join in a service of rededication, to participate in a new program of sharing, and to collect yarn and yardage to be shared with homeless women.

Members of Trinity are urged to collect, bring, or send yarn of any kind to be used to knit garments, jackets, or coverlets, or yardage that can be made into dresses, skirts, and work clothes. This material will go to refugee mothers awaiting settlement in new countries.

The offering will be used to help assist the women in the South Sea Islands to train for community development and to support the educational work of the United Church Women for peaceful world relations.

#### EDUCATION LOAN FUND TO WESLEY FOUNDATION

The Education Loan Fund, established several years ago by the Wesleyan Service Guild, has recently been given to the Wesley Foundation.

To be known as the Wesleyan Service Guild Loan Fund, it will be under the administration of the Reverend Austin Hollady. The Guild hopes that this sum of \$200.00 will help members of the Wesley Foundation who need small, immediate loans.

The Sunday preceding Thanksgiving has come to have special meaning for the members of Trinity beyond being a time of giving thanks for the blessings that have been ours. It is the day of our special offering for the Advance Mission Special, the "Cuba Special."

We can rightly be proud of our past contributions to the Methodist Agricultural and Industrial School at Preston, Cuba. Our church has been providing half of the salary of Rev. Richard G. Milk, the missionary in charge of that school.

We have also been providing \$600 in one and one-half scholarships for young Cuban youths to attend the school.

Several years ago the members of Trinity provided funds to build, and later expand, an infirmary there, which bears the name, "The Tallahassee Building." Yet, in terms of our resources, these past efforts in foreign missions have not been especially impressive.

This year we have an unusual opportunity to aid this Christian effort that so badly needs our assistance.

Rev. Milk was on furlough this past year and used the time to continue his graduate studies at Iowa State College. He has now requested and has been granted permission to remain at Iowa State another year to complete his doctorate degree, but he will not be on salary as was the case last year. Consequently, the contribution of \$3000.00 that we would otherwise make for his salary can be made available for some of the other countless needs of the school at Preston.

#### "COME, YE THANKFUL PEOPLE"

It was the Psalmist who sang, "O that men would praise the Lord for His goodness and for His wonderful works to the children of men." Now, as we come again to the month of November, our thoughts turn to the Thanksgiving Season.

There is no reason why we cannot fulfill one or more of these needs through this year's Cuba Special. Your Commission on Missions feels that the money we raise will serve best if Rev. Milk is given freedom to expend it as he sees fit.

The work of this Methodist school has become more important than ever as a result of the civil strife that is running rampant in Cuba. Many of the publicly supported vocational schools have been closed and our school is the *only* private vocational school for rural youth in that country.

Your Commission on Missions feels that we should increase our Advanced Special giving by at least one-fourth over the \$3600 that we raised last year. ### Trinity Trained Minister Writes of Church Work

The Rev. Ralph F. Jones, another Trinity member who entered the ministry, has written of his preparation. His father, T. F. Jones, passed away recently. His mother lives at 406 Williams Street.

"Jacqueline did her first two years college work at F.S.U. and then went directly to Scarritt and majored in religious education. While she was so engaged I took my first two years in Emory at Oxford. I then majored in philosophy at Emory in Atlanta.

"We were married in June 1950. Jacqueline had just graduated, and though she enjoyed her field work at Scarritt, including a Bethlehem center and a slum section church, she felt that she would still be in full-time Christian service by marrying me.

"Jacqueline helped me through seminary at Emory by working first as a secretary and then as a teacher. I had several scholarships and did various other jobs — anything from the packing room at Rich's to diggin ditches. I also served as a choir director at Oak Grove church in Atlanta.

"After seminary graduation in December 1952 we moved immediately to Mississippi to take a circuit appointment in Walnut, Mississippi. We started on 1900 and it certainly was missionary work. After two and a half years we left there with a beautiful new parsonage behind us all paid for and a pastor's salary of \$2500.

"We transferred to the Florida Conference and our first appointment was in Greensboro. We had a wonderful time there—the people were lovely to us. Two building programs were completed and the charge divided—Greensboro going station. A year ago we were appointed to Bowling Green where we are now serving.

"I think the youth program at camp was the most influential thing in Jac's decision. Mine was a gradual illumination and perhaps the greatest thing affecting it was the felt need for ministers as the influence of Christian professors."

# Announce Aid Program For Two Negro Colleges

At the session of the annual conference in Lakeland last June, action was taken providing assistance for two Negro colleges. One is Bethune-Cookman College, our Methodist school at Daytona Beach, Florida. The other is Payne College, located in Augusta, Georgia.

This plan calls for a special offering to be taken this year and another next year on a date set by the Conference. This year the date chosen by our Conference is Nov. 2. At that time, we will provide special envelopes for your use, and the offering is to be received at each of the morning services on that date.

This offering is designed to meet a special need that exists at this time. If we can raise as much as \$10,000 in this Conference in each of the next two years, then, for these two Negro schools, from another source, an equal sum will be added.

In other words, for the total of \$20,000 raised in two years, the schools will realize \$40,000 for their work. This is a real challenge, and our Florida Conference desires to help in this way these two worthy institutions. Make your offering significant.
