Choir Needs Members to Lead Congregation in Worship Services

The letter quoted below is taken from *Trinity Chimes*, June, 1959, Trinity Church, Methodist, Youngstown, Ohio. It points up the common volunteer church choir problem, that of recruitment. Youngstown's Trinity's problem is identical with that of Tallahassee's Trinity's.

Dear Friends:

I want you to consider seriously an important matter. Our adult choir, Trinity Choir, needs more members.

to continue to lead the congregation of Trinity in worship, we need a large, well trained volunteer choir. Right now, here is how Trinity Choir's average attendance looks: 9 sopranos, 8 altos, 2 tenors, and 5 basses, for a total of 24.

This represents only about one percent of the total membership. Our church should have at least two or three percent of the adult membership in the adult choir. We would like to have an average Sunday Choir like this: 18 sopranos, 15 altos, 10 tenors, 12 basses for a total of 55 members.

In this day of "H" bombs and T-V's, mechanized work and play, the value of individuals singing praise to their Creator cannot be measured. This is an important and high calling. Will you respond?

As the present Pastor of Trinity, I am deeply moved by the devotion of our people as we together move out to meet this Great Challenge. Each one of us has a call from God to measure up to the challenge placed before us. When we do our full share, and undergird the total program with sincere prayer, I am sure that God will bless us and give us the victory in our plans for the future.

Registration of Church Attendance to Provide More Personal Ministry

The Commission on Membership and Evangelism is charged with the responsibility of reaching and cultivating both prospective and regular members of the church. In a church the size of Trinity, this task is enormous. After a thorough study by the Commission, it was found that many churches, both larger and smaller than Trinity, are using to good advantage the registration of attendance at the Sunday Worship Services.

A few simple words of introduction to the idea of attendance registration will suggest its simplicity and purpose

Attendance is registered at both morning services. The registration is a part of the regular ritual and will take place at the beginning of the "Pastor's Personal Words". Cards will be placed in the pews and every family (or representative of a family), both members and visitors, are encouraged to register their attendance and check the pertinent information on the card. The ushers will come forward and collect the cards before the time for the morning offering. Perhaps it will be possible for us to complete the registration of the entire congregation in less than two minutes.

The Commission suggests several reasons for Registration of Church Attendance:

I. TOTAL ENLISTMENT — American Methodism is emphasizing the necessity to enlist the total membership of the local church. It is difficult to know who needs to be visited and cultivated unless we have some method of determining a person's interest -which sometimes, is indicated by his attendance at worship services. The registration of attendance at the worship services is one way to help the church know who might need a more personal ministry.

- II. VISITORS AND PROSPECTIVE MEMBERS—We have numerous visitors in our church. Unfortunately, many of them come and go and we never know about their presence. The total registration of attendance would encourage our visitors to register their presence, thereby helping the Commission and the Pastors contact them immediately to encourage their interest and loyalty to the church.
- III. ADDRESS AND PHONE NUMBER CHANGES—The job is always with us of keeping up with change of addresses and phone numbers of our church members. On the registration of attendance card, there will be a place to check if your address or phone number has changed. Each week, we can quickly discover by the check marks, which cards list new addresses and new phone numbers. Such knowledge would greatly facilitate efficient and personal service to the Trinity Family and Friends by the church staff.

The Commission carried the recommendation for the Registration of Church Attendance to the Official Board. The Board authorized the Commission to proceed with the program. Your participation and co-operation as a church member and friend of Trinity will go a long way to make it possible for Trinity to better serve you,
