## Annual MYF Picnics and Worship May 21

### Gala Chicken Supper and Talent Show Wednesday, June 7

The third annual Trinity Methodist Men's Club Talent Show and Chicken Supper will be held at the American Legion Home Wednesday evening, June 7, according to Arthur McCarthy, general chairman.

Money raised through the advance sale of adult tickets at one dollar will be used for the purpose of setting up a Men's Club fund, proceeds of which will be used to assist deserving young men to attend theological school for spiritual training and study and to assist Methodist church schools in Florida.

"Supper will be served from 6 to 7 o'clock, with the Talent Show starting at 7:30. There will be no advance sale of children's tickets. Children's admission, at fifty cents, can be obtained at the gate."

## WALTER JAMES WRITES PERSONAL NOTE AND ASKS FOR ANSWERS TO THOUGHT-PROVOKING QUESTIONS

This may be a false note, but it is one that I feel compelled to make. Members of Trinity are working to build a new church. At the same time they should be working to maintain increased attendance.

On Palm Sunday evening the Chancel Choir of Trinity presented an oratorio called *The Redeemer*. Personal invitations to attend that service of worship were sent to each Trinity family. 150 people attended. On that same evening at East Hill Baptist Church, a small church near the Tallahassee Memorial Hospital, a similar service of worship through music was presented. Their sanctuary was filled to overflowing with more than 200 people.

There was a time a few years ago when our church family would support its choirs with their attendance upon the special musical programs the choirs presented. We could depend upon having a full sanctuary to hear *The Messiah* or *The Creation* sung. But not any longer. Many parents do not even come to hear their children sing, if they sing in the evening service.

The question is, why? T.V.? Apathy? A dislike for music? A lack of a sense of loyalty? Set ways of Sunday evening behavior that cannot be changed?

I do not know the answer, but I would be eager to hear from the congregation the answer to the question. Why did you not attend Palm Sunday evening? Should we discontinue having special musical presentations and have the choirs function only in their normal routine? Please let me know.—Walter James, Director of Music.

## 38 FOUNDATION STUDENTS PLAN TO ATTEND SEVENTH NATIONAL METHODIST CONFERENCE

Thirty eight students from the Wesley Foundation have indicated their desire to attend the Seventh National Methodist Student Conference to be held at the University of Illinois in Champaigne, Illinois. The dates are August 26-31, 1961. On the waiting list are nine other applicants, also interested in attending this conference. This is a once in a lifetime experience for college students, as it only convenes once in every four years.

An attendance of approximately 5000 students, campus pastors and counselors, faculty, and leaders is expected for the six-day conference. The total cost per Florida delegate is \$105, and it is hoped that the home churches of many of the delegates from the Foundation will help to finance their student's expenses.

The conference will feature eminent speakers on contemporary issues in culture, higher education, world affairs, communications, politics, and their relevance to the Christian faith. Delegates will participate in Bible study, worship, and multiple vocational and interest groups.

The theme for the convention is "Covenant for New Creation," and a unique feature of the conference is an Arts Festival of significant dimensions. Exhibits, informal conversations, performances, and discussions are planned in the following areas: architecture, drama, photography, sculpture and painting, dance, films, and poetry.

In preparation for the six days, the Foundation delegates have begun reading and studying the two preconference study books: An Inquiry Into Faith by J. Wesley Robb, and The Church: Its Origin and Task by Albert Barnett.

The Junior-Senior Get-Together was held on April 30, at the Foundation, with F.S.U. Methodist students serving as hosts to the high school juniors and seniors of the Tallahassee

Methodist Churches. Familiarizing the high school students with the Foundation's program was the prime purpose of the get-together.

May 14 is the date for the Annual Senior Banquet at the Foundation beginning at 6:00. Honored guests are all the Methodist seniors graduating either in June or next fall. Guest speaker will be Dr. Richard Fallon from the speech department.

#### Junior Camp at Pine Mountain Has Four Vacancies for Boys

The cost of the camp is \$20.00. This includes \$8.00 for the transportation there and back.
