DR. RICHARD MILK TO BE REASSIGNED

Dr. Milk has completed almost a year of work with Cuban Refugees in Jamaica. Mrs. Milk writes that this has been quite a year for them—about 6,500 Cubans have passed through since they arrived in Jamaica. Most of the refugees have to stay three weeks to complete their resident visas

They have spent the Christmas holidays with Dr. Milk's mother in Walton, New York. Three of the children have been attending schools in the U.S.:

Richard—a freshman at College of Wooster in Ohio

Robert—11th grade at Mt. Hermon, New York

Carol—9th grade in Northfield, New York.

The two youngest children, Martha and Ann, have attended the Presbyterian-Methodist School in Jamaica during the fall months.

Mrs. Milk ended her Christmas letter with this note of faith: "Midst the uncertainties and tragedy that have been our daily diet for the past months, we are thankful for the 'certainties' that exist—for God's love as it was made manifest in this Holy Season, for faith that men of Good Will may extend it throughout the world; for the joy in enduring friendships".

The Board of Missions will assign the Milks to a new field of work in early 1962.

BUILDING PLANS— PROGRESS REPORT

Mr. Payne Midyette, chairman of the Building Committee, has reported that the architect is making final check with the mechanical engineers on the plans for the new church. We anticipate having the final plans early in the new year. When we have approved the plans in all details, we will furnish them to contractors and allow time for them to study the plans and submit bids. We hope to be ready to let the contract by March, 1962 at the latest.

At present \$305,000. is in the Building Fund. By decision of the congregation, \$275,000. was specified as the minimum to be on hand before the contract was to be let. Also by the decision of the congregation, the maximum to be borrowed for building was set at \$500,000. Even though we have surpassed the \$275,000, required for letting the contract, the expected total cost of the building will so far exceed the \$305,000. on hand plus the maximum of \$500,000, that can be borrowed, that we need a concerted effort to raise the amount in the Building Fund before the building is completed. We have only from now until the construction is done to raise the money needed; we must have the money when the new building is ready for our use.

In order to be successful, we need to make every effort now to anticipate the day of payment. Each member of the church who has not made a pledge is urged to do so. Any member who is behind in paying his pledge is urged to catch up. Anyone who can increase his giving to the Building Fund is invited to do so. Trinity is building for the generations ahead and all of us are privileged to have a part in this great undertaking.

Mr. Inglesias writes that the refugees need clothing: "The most of Cuban refugees come with very few clothes and some of them who come by boats have nothing except used clothing they receive after they get here. Some of them are wondering what they will do in winter days. If you have clothes, not very heavy—then send them directly to me, and I will take them to the people who attend our services at White Temple. Childrens' clothes are most useful to us".
