IN LOVING MEMORY OF OUR PASTOR

Dr. Glenn C. James, 67, pastor of Trinity Methodist Church since 1953, died in Tallahassee Memorial Hospital Sunday night.

He was taken ill Saturday with what was tentatively identified as a heart ailment. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

He leaves his wife, Gladys, two daughters, Mrs. William O. Cullom of Tallahassee and Mrs. Alfred B. Vaught of DeLand; two brothers, Max E. James of Cushing, Oklahoma, and Dr. Harry James of Hastings, Nebraska, and a sister, Mrs. Rex Winget of Cushing; and three granddaughters.

Dr. James came to Tallahassee after serving for 21 years as pastor of White Temple Methodist Church in Miami. At Tallahassee, he began the planning of a new sanctuary and chapel for Trinity, final plans for which had been received last week.

Pending completion of the sanctuary program, Dr. James had deferred retirement, but he and Mrs. James had built their home on Piedmont drive, and they had planned to remain in Tallahassee after his retirement from the active ministry.

Dr. James was born in Strawn, Kansas, and under the influence of his mother and pastor, had decided in 1917 to enter the ministry. But after the outbreak of World War I he joined the United States army, and at the Battle of St. Mihiel in September, 1918, as a member of the 89th Division was severely wounded. He spent the next year in military hospitals and emerged permanently crippled in one hip.

As we move on, let us close ranks and march with joy and purpose to accomplish the task and reach the goal that is set before us. Let us move as "a host of Christians whose hearts God had touched."

Following his release from the hospital in 1919, he entered Baker University, in Baldwin City, Kansas. After graduation in 1922, he spent three years as a student in the seminary of Garrett Biblical Institute, Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill. He then filled pastorates in Wisconsin until 1928, when he was sent to Radar Memorial Methodist church in Miami. After two and a half years in that pastorate, Dr. James was made Miami district superintendent, and from that position was assigned to White Temple in 1932. From Miami he came to Tallahassee in 1953.

Dr. James attended two General Conferences, one in 1932 in Atlantic City and the other one in 1936 in Columbus, Ohio of the Old Northern Methodist-Episcopal Churches before Unification. After Unification, he attended General Conferences in Atlantic City in 1940; Kansas City in 1944; 1948 he went to Boston, Mass. and in 1956 he attended the one in Minneapolis.

In Tallahassee as in Miami, Dr. James had taken active parts in the life of the community, and had become one of the leaders of the Tallahassee Ministerial Association. He belonged to the Tallahassee Chamber of Commerce, the Lions Club and the Y. M. C. A. In Miami he had been president of the community chest and of the Lions Club in that city.

While serving in White Temple, Dr. James established a home for the Old People in Miami which started out as an apartment house which grew and now is known as the beautiful "Biscayne Methodist Home" on Biscayne Boulevard, Miami and is self-supporting. White Temple helped with this project and later it became a project of the Miami District.

As a result of his growing stature in the Methodist church, Dr. James in 1939 was appointed by the bishop of the Florida Conference as a delegate to the Uniting Conference held in Kansas City, Kansas, for the unification of the Methodist churches. He also served as a delegate for 12 years to the National Convocation on Higher Education, Florida Conference,

and was past chairman of the Conference Board on Higher Education in the Florida Conference. He was a member of the General Board of Education of The Methodist Church and of the General Conference Commission on Higher Education and of the executive committee of that conference.

Although Dr. James had devoted much time to the planning and financing of the proposed sanctuary and chapel for Trinity, he took an active part in assisting in the establishment of St. Paul's and of John Wesley Methodist churches in Tallahassee. Also, he took a prominent part with other ministers of the community in resolving major elements of racial unrest in the past few years. His visits to the sick took him to the hospitals and homes of Tallahassee every day, and he was unsparing in personal ministry wherever he was called in Tallahassee.

A Memorial Fund for Dr. James has been set up and anyone wishing to give to it may send it to the church office marked for the Memorial Fund.

Milk Family Waits in Austin, Texas

Dr. and Mrs. Richard Milk and two of their daughters, Martha and Ann are settled in an apartment in Austin, Texas, waiting for their visa to permit them to go to Mexico to serve as agricultural missionaries for the Methodist Church. It is their hope to get to Mexico by April 1; however, until then Mrs. Milk is busy gathering household items necessary to get started again.

The Junior High youth learned that everything the Milk family had in Oriente, Cuba was confiscated by the Cuban government. Mrs. Milk brought only a couple of bags of clothing when she and the three girls came out in 1960, and when Dr. Milk came in January 1961 he was not allowed to bring anything—other than what he was wearing.

Mrs. Milk writes that they will be able to take household items with them, without duty, so long as the items are not "brand new". This is to prevent people from taking goods to Mexico for resale.
