TRINITY'S NEW CHURCH BUILDING

The contract has now been let for the erection of our new Sanctuary and Chapel to Albritton-Williams of Tallahassee for \$752,750.00. Contract has also been signed with the Austin Organ company for a new organ for the Sanctuary at \$56,000.00 and for the Chapel organ at \$7,125.00. We received credit from them for the old organ. When we add the cost of the furnishings and architectural fees, we will have an investment in the new building of a little more than one million dollars.

The building is to be of Colonial design. The front of the new church will have four large columns on a semi-circular portico. The spire is to be 140 feet above the main floor level and will have a cross at the top. The exterior of the building will be brick and stone. The roof will be covered with gray slate shingles. The entire building will be air conditioned.

As one enters from the front of the church into the Narthex (vestibule), he will find stairs on both sides, leading up to the balcony and

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OUR PUBLICATIONS

In order for us to be literate Methodist churchmen we must do a minimal amount of reading. To provide for this need your church publishes two fine pieces of literature.

On the conference level there is the Florida Methodist. This is the promotional and publicity organ of our Florida conference. 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ADVANCE SPECIAL— \$5,000.00 GOAL

Trinity Commission on Missions voted to strive for a goal of \$5,000.00 for The Richard Milk Fund. In previous years Trinity has raised \$3,800.00 (\$3,000-half support and two \$400.00 scholarships). Half support for a couple of the mission field is now \$3,900.00. This was the average cost during the last quadrium for base salary, medical expenses, education for missionaries' children, and transportation home every four years.

The Commission feels that Dr. Milk should be provided with a minimum \$100.00 monthly work fund as he strives to open a new mission station in Durango, Dgo, Mexico.

Dear Friends,

Greetings from this picturesque capital city, four hundred years old, a mile and a fourth high, at the edge of Mexico's western mountain range!

After leaving Cuba 19 months ago, we were in Austin. Texas for several months. Then we helped Cuban refugees in Jamaica for nine months. In January we were transferred to the autonomous Mexican Methodist Church to begin a pioneer project of "rural work". After weeks of waiting for official permission to reside in Mexico, we left Austin on May 31st. We have been busy finding a house, furnishing it, accumulating (all over again) materials and equipment for extension activities, meeting governmental and church leaders in Durango, and visiting with community leaders of several rural churches.

The purpose of these workshops is to guide the Local Church Commissions in planning their work and in organizing more effectively. HALLOWEEN FOR UNICEF

Trinity children (primary and junior) and junior high youth will again collect for UNICEF (United Nations Children's Fund) again on Halloween night. The children and youth will explain to their friends in their own neighborhood what the fund is for:

UNICEF fights hunger and malnutrition by supplying vitamins and powdered milk and by teaching parents what foods children need for normal growth and how to produce them locally. It helps establish clinics for mothers and children, educates mothers in hygiene and nutrition and trains nurses and midwives. UNICEF aids in disease control by supplying antibiotics, penicillin, BCG for mass vaccination and DDT for spraying against malaria.

In its 15 years of existence UNICEF has counted 134,000,000 persons vaccinated with BCG against tuberculosis; 31,000,000 treated for yaws; 11,000 treated for trachoma; 1,000,000 treated for leprosy; 66,000,000 protected from malaria with insecticides provided by UNICEF.

A charge against UNICEF has been that a large proportion of UNICEF goes to Communist Countries.

The Facts: Since 1951 only two Communist countries: (Yugo-slavia and Poland) have received aid from UNICEF. This allocation for the entire period since 1951 represents approximately 2.85 precent of the UNICEF allocations for that period.

Children and youth will be receiving materials and information concerning UNICEF, the parties, etc., during the coming month.

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down to the Social Hall. The balcony will have a seating capacity of 158 persons. The floor of the vestibule will be covered with tile. A small desk will be attached to the wall in the vestibule which can be used by visitors wishing to leave their names and addresses. There will also be in the vestibule a Memorial Book, in which will be listed all memorials that have been given or which will be given in the future to Trinity. There will be a separate page in the book for each memorial, with a picture of the memorial and brief statement about the person for whom the memorial was given and the name of the person donating same.

The Nave will have 28 pews on each side of the center isle, seating capacity 716 persons. There will be seats for 75 in the choir. The choir loft will be divided on each side of a central altar, as in our old sanctuary. The total seating capacity of the new sanctuary, including balcony and choir, will be 949 with room for 100 additional persons with the use of chairs.

The floor of the sanctuary will be level. The area underneath the pews will be covered with asphalt tile. The isle and chancel floor will be covered with a moth proof wool carpet.

There are to be three large stained glass windows at the rear of the chancel on the north wall. These will cost about \$7,000.00 each and it is the hope of the church that they will be given as memorials or in honor of persons now living. These are not included in the general contract. There will be a number of other memorials available in both the sanctuary and chapel, such as the pulpit, lecturn, altar, cross, vases, candlesticks and pews. The cost of these range from \$175.00 to about \$4,000.00. Anyone interested in making a memorial or a gift in honor of some one is urged to contact our

There will be five large clear glass windows on each side of the Nave. These will have plantation blinds to keep out the bright sun light.

The furnace and air-conditioning units are located in a basement two

floors below the chancel. There should be no noise from these.

The Social Hall and kitchen will cover the entire area beneath the Narthex, Nave and Chancel. The Social Hall is 95 x 38 feet and will seat 617 with chairs only or 432 at tables. This does not include the stage area which can be used for overflow. The kitchen will be at the south end beneath the Narthex. It is 27 x 29 feet with two storage rooms. The stage is at the north end directly beneath the chancel. It is 17 x 28 feet. The floor of the entire ground floor area will be covered with asphalt tile, except the kitchen which will have quarry tile on the floor.

The chapel will be at right angles to the sanctuary and will parallel Park Avenue. The entrance is at the west end. You will be able to enter both the chapel and sanctuary from Park Avenue without going up any steps. The chapel will seat 112. The floor underneath the pews will be covered with asphalt tile and the aisle and chancel floor will have carpet. The chapel organ is being given to the church as a memorial to Coyle E. Moore, Jr., by his parents. The chapel is connected with the sanctuary by a covered patio.

There are to be nine narrow stained glass windows in the east wall of the chapel. The estimated cost of each of these is \$700.00. These are not included in the building contract. It is the hope of the church that these will be given as memorials or in honor of persons now living.

The communion rail in the chapel will surround the altar. The cross will be suspended over the altar rather than resting on it. This is known as a free standing altar.

There are three clear glass windows in the south wall of the chapel.

At the rear of the chapel is the Ushers Room and directly across a hall is the Brides Room. There is also a small Sacristy for chapel use, cut off with folding doors from the Brides Room.

There are two large class rooms on the main floor on the east side of the building. At the north end there are three offices, a sacristy and storage room. There are two toilets on the main floor, one in the minister's office and the other in the brides room, and six toilets on the ground floor.

On the ground floor beneath the chapel is the choir room, four choir robing rooms (two for children, one for ladies and one for men) and the Music Director's office. On the east side of the building is the Church Parlor 40 x 25 feet and this opens out on the garden terrace. There is a small kitchenette in connection with the parlor. There is a large class room adjoining the parlor. There are two storage rooms on the ground floor.

There is to be a beautiful garden terrace which may be entered from the Social Hall, Parlor or class room, and it is also near the kitchen. It is the hope that this will be used extensively for outdoor entertaining when the weather is good.

COYLE E. MOORE, JR. MEMORIAL ORGAN

The organ in our lovely new chapel is being given by Dr. and Mrs. Coyle E. Moore, Sr. as an Abiding Memorial to their son, Coyle E. Moore, Ir. The organ is being designed and specially built for our chapel by the Austin Organ Company. It will contain a total of 309 pipes, divided into four separate ranks with eighteen different stops. The console is of a special compact design and will be finished to match the chapel furniture. The organ is valued at \$12,000 but will be installed for \$7,-100 because of its being purchased in conjunction with the layer church organ. This is, of course, a splendid memorial and we are grateful to Dr. and Mrs. Moore for establishing this Living Memorial to their son. Coyle E. Moore, Jr. was an outstanding young leader in our church and community. He is missed by all of us and the inspiration which the music of this organ brings into our lives will remind us of the inspiration of his life.
