1964 — GENERAL CONFERENCE YEAR

The General Conference is the supreme governing and lawmaking body of Methodism. It meets every four years, and the next meeting is to be in Pittsburgh on April 26. It is composed of an equal number of lay and ministerial delegates who have been elected by their respective annual conferences. One lay and one ministerial delegate are chosen for each seventy ministerial members of the annual conference. There will be 900 delegates to the 1964 General Conference. The Florida Conference will be represented by eight ministerial and eight lay delegates.

The business of The General Conference is to revise the book of *Discipline*, to make laws, to select and approve programs for the coming quadrennium, and to determine all sorts of important matters having to do with the ongoing of the Church.

At its opening session The General Conference will hear a comprehensive report from all the Bishops—"The Episcopal Address." The General Conference then proceeds to do its work by repealing or amending old laws, by passing new ones, and by determining the cause of the Church for the next four years.

As The General Conference meets this year, it will be confronted by disturbing social issues and challenged by the call to lead the people called Methodists into a dynamic program for the next four years. You can be informed of all that goes on by subscribing to *The Daily Christian Advocate*, (Air Mail) 201 Eighth Ave., South, Nashville, Tenn. Not everything proposed will be passed and some of the things you read and hear will not be factual. Everything said on the floor of The General Conference will be printed in *The Daily Christian Advocate*. I urge you to subscribe and read it.

Please give The General Conference a central place in your prayers. Pray that the delegates may be responsive to the influence of the Holy Spirit. Pray that The Methodist Church may be prepared to be used by God in this important hour in man's history. Pray that the purpose of God may be unfolded before our Methodist people and that they will be ready to walk in His way. Only thus can we be a worthy part of the "body of Christ."

But it is the same death every time—death in Jesus Christ, the death of the old man at his call."

LETTER FROM RICHARD G. MILK

Some months ago a friend sent a check for the support of some special missionary program. We sent it to Dr. Milk for parsonage repair, and this letter in part expresses his appreciation:

"This gift is being used for improvements in the parsonage in the Durango church. The gift of money for a need such as parsonage renovation should be, it seems to me, administered in such a way as to inspire local responsibility and local giving. Our present pastor has been concerned about church and parsonage repairs. For my part and the part of one or two other members of the church, it seemed that the parsonage was in even more desperate need than the sanctuary. The parsonage did not even have running water! It was necessary to consider the installation of a cistern, a pump, and an overhead tank in order to provide the house with water. The \$400 gift converted into Mexican currency is over 3,000 pesos. Taking this money and an additional thousand pesos which another friend had sent to us, we were able to challenge the local group to provide more than 3,000 pesos for the renovation - plastering, painting, a new kitchen stove and kitchen sink (there had been none before) in addition to the water installation. It has made an essential difference in the parsonage.

"God has opened up new opportunities of witness for us. We have been at times a little disappointed at the slow pace of the work, but we are beginning to see some results. It is very gratifying to see the increased enrollment and enthusiasm in the S. S. because of the work that Juliet has developed with the teachers. In one of the country churches we had very pleasing results from the Lord's Acre project of last year. In another country church close to Durango, I have had some success in helping a young man establish himself in the poultry business. We have in that same community a demonstration garden project that may mean a great deal to this community in the months and years ahead."

"Please express our deep appreciation and gratitude to the members of Trinity Church. May God's rich blessings rest upon all those who have been thinking and praying for this work."

THE GOSPEL IN ACTION

Stewardship is the gospel in action. Whether we think of it solcly in terms of possessions, or as an expression of a sense of gratitude for all God's blessings. History's finest illustration of stewardship is seen at Calvary, and we best understand its real meaning as we gaze upon the cross. At the foot of the cross, we clearly see that stewardship is the gospel in action—it is Man's response to God's love and purposes; it is the attitude of an individual Christian in all his relationships; it is the way one assumes the responsibilty of his particular vocation and makes it a tool to express his Christian convictions; it is the way one responds to God's care with gifts, prayers, service and regular presence at services of worship.

Fritz Kreisler understood the relationship we call stewardship. Although he struggled hard and made many sacrifices to develop his skill and technique, he was an artist because he was a "worthy steward" whose life was an expression of what he believed. He and his wife were content to live frugally and gave away most of what was received. When asked for an explanation he answered, "What I get over and above my needs, does not belong to me. God gave me the talent and the sensitivity to enable me to interpret my world in sound and share it with others. As I bare my soul, using the delicate violin to communicate my moods to my fellows, I am only using what God has given me and am being true to my destiny. I could not consider myself a good Christian if I did otherwise."

As Trinity Methodist endeavors to make the life and teachings, the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ concrete, the several programs which we develop and execute become the "Gospel in Action." In this effort you and I literally become the body of Christ—His hands, His feet, His voice and His love. We are the only gospel the world about us will know. Our stewardship becomes the voice of our faith. What kind of gospel will Trinity Methodist proclaim next year? It all depends on our stewardship. We are called to be good stewards of Jesus Christ.

VOICES OF OUR CHRISTIAN HERITAGE The Articles of Religion

I. Of Faith in the Holy Trinity

There is but one living and true God, everlasting, without body or parts, of infinite power, wisdom, and goodness; the maker and preserver of all things visible and invisible. 

LOSING AND FINDING YOUR LIFE

Jesus once said, "He who finds his life will lose it, and he who loses his life for my sake will find it." This caused me to ponder just how intently are we seeking to lose our lives to worthy causes and goals, or how nonchalantly are we going about finding a life that is filled with everything except this true life about which Jesus spoke.

One evening this week the television brought into our home a newscast which highlighted the rapidly rising tobacco sales. Cigarette sales have just about reached their former level which they had attained before the surgeon-general announced "the big scare." But now things are returning to "normal" and the "habit" has claimed its patrons despite the medical prophecy of increased cases of lung cancer.

This caused me great concern as I thought about our human condition in terms of theology. There have been various prophecies revealed to us about the relationship of God and Man. And the great Physician even went so far as to say if you go on habitually seeking your life in the wrong places and giving it to the wrong priorities—you'll lose it. But habit, custom, our own selfish egos rule our lives and we open ourselves to the possibility that we may "die before we live."

In our beautiful new building we will have a vast seating capacity—enough for all our members to attend ALL of our worship services. It would be a tragedy not to use all our pews. The first week in May we enter a period of spiritual renewal or revival services. All of these services of your Church are an opportunity to lose your life for the sake of Christ that we as a Church might truly find an ever present and everlasting life.

If we continue to take such statements of our Scripture lightly we may find ourselves like the absent-minded man who was so abstracted from his own true life that he hardly knew he existed until one morning he woke up to find himself dead.

Will we lose our lives without ever really finding them? Will we continue to live without ever touching the roots of our own existence? Or will we find our true nature and life by losing it to God in Christ?

V. Of The Sufficiency Of The Holy Scriptures For Salvation

The Holy Scriptures contain all things necessary to salvation; so that whatsoever is not read therein, nor may be proved thereby, is not to be required of any man that it should be believed as an article of faith, or be thought requisite or necessary to salvation. In the name of the Holy Scriptures we do understand those canonical books of the Old and New Testament of whose authority was never any doubt in the Church.

All the books of the New Testament, as they are commonly received, we do receive and account canonical.

VI. Of The Old Testoment

The Old Testament is not contrary to the New for both in the Old and New Testament everlasting life is offered to mankind by Christ, who is the only Mediator between God and man, being both God and Man. Wherefore they are not to be heard who feign that the old fathers did look only for transitory promises. Although the law given from God by Moses as touching ceremonies and rites doth not bind Christians, nor ought the civil precepts thereof of necessity be received in any commonwealth; yet notwithstanding, no Christian whatsoever is free from the obedience of the commandments which are called moral. The Discipline of The Methodist Church, ¶ 65, 66

Last Thanksgiving Methodist Churches throughout the Southeast received a special offering for the support of our Cuban Methodist brethren. Their sacrifices and hardships are on our hearts. During the past year Cuban Methodists have doubled their giving to the Church and replaced their exiled leadership. However, they need all the encouragement we can give them. In addition there are ten Florida Conference members who are now serving in mission fields around the world. How appropriate it would be if we should send them aid for their work as a symbol of our interest in and support of their work! You see that we can use as many thousands as you want to share. Show your appreciation for what God has allowed us to do for ourselves by giving sacrificially for others.

NEWS OF THE CHRISTIAN WORLD

In Britain, Methodist ranks are sharply divided where a Voice of Methodism group, opposing the proposed union with The Church of England, is in verbal bombast with a group called Toward Anglican-Methodist Unity. The British General Conference will vote in July on whether to continue talks on the merger.

The provisional Annual Conference in Puerto Rico heard reports on Methodist work on the Island that it had doubled in twelve years. To keep pace with this growth the Conference has been divided into two districts headed by Dr. Thomas Rico Soltero and the Rev. Rafael Boissen.

A series of open seminars at the U. N. and the new Church Center will be available for New York Fair visitors. The Mcthodist office at the U. N. has set May 11 to September 11 as the dates.



The Articles of Religion

XIII. Of the Church

The visible Church of Christ is a congregation of faithful men in which the pure Word of God is preached, and the Sacraments duly administered according to Christ's ordinance, in all those things that of necessity are requisite to the same.

Of the Rites and Ceremonies of the Churches

It is not necessary that rites and ceremonies should in all places be the same, or exactly alike; for they have been always different, and may be changed according to the diversity of countries, times, and men's manners, so that nothing be ordained against God's Word. Whosoever, through his private judgment, willingly and purposely doth openly break the rites and ceremonies of the church to which be belongeth, which are not repugnant to the Word of God, and are ordained and approved by common authority, ought to be rebuked openly (that others may fear to do the like), as one that offendeth against the common order of the church, and woundeth the consciences of weak brethren.

Every particular church may ordain, change, or abolish rites and ceremonies, so that all things may be done to edification.
