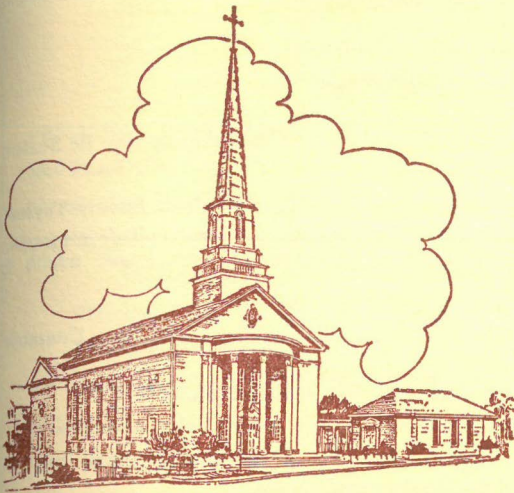

"THANK GOD FOR SOMETHING THAT MOVES UP!"

Dr. Halford E. Luccock has written of a man who many years ago stood behind a railing overlooking the American side of Niagara Falls. His eye was caught by the sight of a little steamboat, *The Maid of the Mist*, pushing upstream against the strong downward swirl of the Niagara River below the falls. His imagination took fire, and he cried out, "Thank God for something that moves up!"

If our imaginations catch fire we can stand on a similar parapet overlooking the river of human life in history. There was the downward rushing whirlpool of life in the first century A.D. and the tiny Christian Church launching out into that stream. There were so many strong pulls seeking to sink that little ship that her survival seemed impossible, but the Book of Acts reveals the thrill of the upward push as "the Lord added to their number day by day those who were being saved." In describing those days Arnold Toynbee has written that the Christian Church "brought a saving faith to a dying civilization."

In our imagination we can see still another chapter in the upward movement of the Christian Church. In the eighteenth century, another small ship is launched into the downward rushing river of life. England was in a large measure a gin-soaked, dissolute world, full of people without help and without hope. The power of the Christian religion was largely impotent. Then the Evangelical Revival is launched and again "a saving faith" is brought to "a dying civilization." What a thrilling experience it is to watch the launching of the Methodist movement; see it pushing out into the life of its time; later see it cross the Atlantic to the new world of America, push its way across the continent, and on out over all the seas of the globe, bringing the life of God to the souls of men. So we can say of her as well as of other branches of the Christian Church, "Thank God for something that moves up."

But if our imaginations are at all vivid they reveal to us the insight that our history should not become a storehouse of facts, but an experience equipping us for great action. The mists of doubts, fears, and meaninglessness have again swept mankind downward toward the sea of despair. Out of our great memories and spiritual experiences we should be equipped for acts of redeeming faith in these trying times. Let us so live the life of love and faith that afterward men will say of the Church of our time, "Thank God for something that moves up."

The Articles of Religion

XIV. Of Purgatory

The Romish doctrine concerning purgatory, pardon, worshipping, and adoration, as well of images as of relics, and also invocation of saints, is a fond thing, vainly invented, and grounded upon no warrant of Scripture, but repugnant to the Word of God.

XV. Of Speaking in the Congregation in Such a Tongue as the People Understand.

It is a thing plainly repugnant to the Word of God, and the custom of the primitive Church, to have public prayer in the church, or to administer the Sacraments, in a tongue not understood by the people.

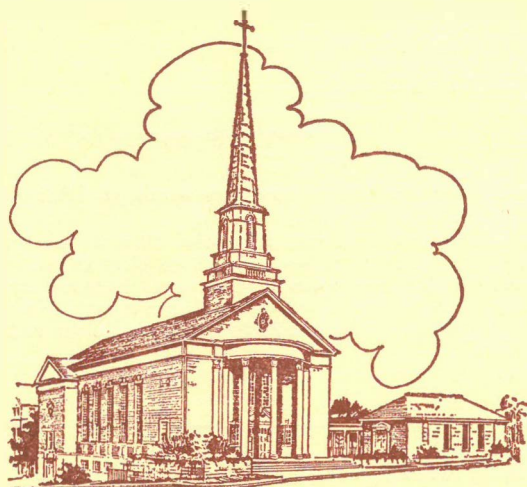

THE SPIRITUAL PRESENCE

This is the Trinity Season of our Church Year. It is during this time that our attention is focused on the workings of the Holy Spirit in our midst. Thus the color of our Paraments is red to denote Christian zeal and the ministry of the church working under the guidance and counsel of the Holy Spirit.

Paul Tillich has given us a sermon on the "Spiritual Presence" in which he enumerates the way this presence is manifest to us:

"The Spirit can work in you with a soft but insistent voice, telling you that your life is empty and meaningless, but that there are chances of a new life waiting before the door of your inner self to fill its void and to conquer its dullness. The Spirit can work in you, awakening the desire to strive towards the sublime over against the profanity of the average day. The Spirit can give you the courage which says "yes" to life in spite of the destructiveness you have experienced around you and within you. The Spirit can reveal to you that you have hurt somebody deeply, but it also can give you the right word which reunites him with you. The Spirit can make you love with the divine love someone you profoundly dislike or hate or who has no interest for you. The Spirit can conquer the laziness towards what you know is the aim of your life, and it can change your bad, aggressive, and depressed mood into stability and serenity.

The Spirit can liberate you from hidden enmity against those whom you love and from open revengefulness against those by whom you feel violated. The Spirit can give you the strength to throw away false anxieties and to take upon yourself the anxiety which belongs to life itself. The Spirit can awaken you to sudden insight into the way you must take, and it can open your eyes to a view of your world which makes everything new. The Spirit can give you joy in the midst of the ordinary routine as well as in the depth of sorrow.

The Spirit can create warmth in the coldness you feel within you and around you, and it can give you wisdom and strength where your human love towards a loved one has failed. The Spirit can throw you into the hell of despair about yourself and then give you the certainty that life has accepted you just when you feel totally rejected, and when you rejected yourself totally. The Spirit can give you the power of prayer, which nobody has except through the Spiritual Presence."

NEWS OF THE CHRISTIAN WORLD

The F.B.I. has reported that major crime increased ten per cent in 1963 over that in 1962. About forty per cent were burglaries; next was larceny, followed by thefts of automobiles. The cost of such crime, estimated by Director Hoover was some 27 billion. This increase of crime is five times as fast as the national population growth.

Many of those arrested were in the age bracket of 19 and under. What is it about our society that sends our youth out in search of such adventures? Has life lost its adventurous qualities and its excitement filled joys? It hasn't for most, but what about those for whom it has? What are we, the bearers of the good tidings of redemption and releasing, doing to communicate this message to those who find life drab and meaningless?

HOW DO YOU READ?

Do you believe everything you read as the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth? Today many read with uncritical eyes, taking for granted that the words of the one they are reading could not be incorrect or mistaken as to the true facts.

One of the the first requisites taught in reading is to ask, "from whence does it come?" Know your author, his background and qualifications that enable him to say what he is saying. Then ask, "why is he writing?" What is his purpose and primary end?

Today many folks are writing words and many more are reading them. It is imperative that we accept only that which we have validated. A distortion of the truth, if believed by enough people, can produce a reign of terror and confusion that can cause people to turn on those persons or institutions that have been so dear to them all their lives.

Let us read critically and with discernment that we may be receptive to the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth.

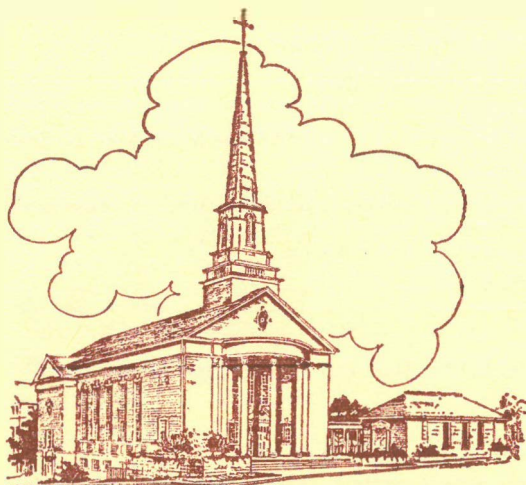

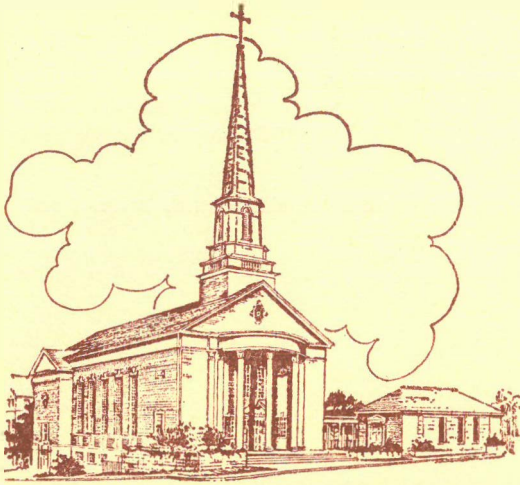

"This Is The Way We Go To School"

Providing an education for our children is a real adventure! The group arises early, some as early as 5:30, none later than 6:30. All must rush about the business of dressing, cleaning rooms, eating breakfast, completing chores. Junior and Senior High School students leave for the bus stop by 7:00, while students in the sixth grade and under leave at 7:45. Some children are dismissed in time to be home by 3:15, but others are 4:00 arriving back upon our campus.

THIS IS THE WAY WE GO TO SCHOOL—OR SCHOOLS, WE SHOULD SAY! The first six grades are enrolled at Enterprise, while the Junior and Senior High groups attend schools in DeLand. Any exceptional students attend the special program at a third school in DeLand. Vocational training has generally been obtained in Daytona Beach and in Orlando.

Children at our Sarah Hunt Home attend Bonner Elementary School and Campbell Junior and Senior High in Daytona Beach. Because they live close to schools attended they can arise later than our Enterprise group and walk to school.

THIS IS THE WAY WE COME HOME FROM SCHOOL—TO STUDY! Each evening we have a study hall for a minimum of one hour, with house-parents and tutors on hand to give guidance. During the summer and during the school year, two sessions of remedial reading are given selected boys and girls weekly.

THIS IS THE WAY WE ARE IN SCHOOL—TWO GRADES BELOW LEVEL! Before coming to us, many of the children were not sent to school regularly. A child who has seen parents fight one another, leave one another, or even murder one another has been emotionally damaged. Despite a high IQ, such a child may build a shell around himself which a skilled teacher cannot break for a long time.

THIS IS THE WAY WE GO TO SCHOOL—EXPENSIVELY! During this school year we will purchase 26,740 lunches at school. Total food cost for all meals in our two homes will be \$34,900.00. What a grocery bill!!!! It will take 150 pairs of shoes, 225 pairs of dungarees, 225 dresses, 450 sets of underwear, 450 pairs of socks and many other items just to start the school year.

THIS IS THE WAY WE GO TO SCHOOL—WITH YOU! It is your dollars which make all this possible. Today a fine dentist practices in Venice, a Navy Captain takes command of a huge aircraft carrier, a student starts to college to prepare for the ministry, a young mother cradles her baby tenderly in her arms, remembering how she longed for her own mother—all because you shared when Fifth Sunday and Christmas rolled around. These and others who lived in our Homes would be happy to shake your hand and thank you warmly. On their behalf, **THANK YOU VERY MUCH!**

NOT OUR OWN

Today our Trinity Youth Week begins and continues through September the third. The discussion topic for the Senior High Group is entitled "Not Our Own," and concerns itself with a Christian interpretation of the stewardship of possessions. While reading in the area of Christian Stewardship I came across this statement by John Calvin in his *magnus opus, Institutes of the Christian Religion*:

"We are not our own: let not our reason nor our will, therefore, sway our plans and deeds. We are not our own: let us therefore not set it as our goal to seek what is expedient for us according to the flesh. We are not our own: in so far as we can, let us therefore forget ourselves and all that is ours.

Conversely, we are God's: let us therefore live for him and die for him. We are God's: let his wisdom and will therefore rule all our actions. We are God's: let all the parts of our life accordingly strive toward him as our only lawful goal."

(Inst. III. 7.1)

Calvin seems to be saying something vitally connected with our understanding of Christian Stewardship. One of the first principles of stewardship, which is even inherent in the meaning of the word itself, is the understanding that all that we have, our possessions, our time, and our abilities is a gift from God. And if it is a gift, then we are responsible for using it for the purpose for which it was intended and recognizing the One from whence it has come. Therefore, we are not our own: we cannot do that which we might like to do with our gifts, not recognizing their true worth and value and their relationship to our other fellow men. We are God's: we are the human instruments of the divine, the ones who are to enjoy what has been given us and yet to realize our responsibility for its use and enjoyment. If we could realize that we are God's, and not our own, then the freedom to make decisions would be seen always subject to the decisions of the owner. Could this not be a partial solution to the problems which plague us every day of our lives. If we would not always seek to amalgamate the secular with the sacred, perhaps the sacred would have its proper influence in what we do with what has been given us.

When we consider our stewardship of time, abilities, and possessions, it is well that we have in mind that response that is frequently sung at the offertory:

*"We give Thee but Thine own, what-e'er the gift may be;
All that we have is Thine alone, a trust, O Lord, from Thee."*

The Psalmist says as much: "Know that the Lord is God! It is he that made us, and not we ourselves; we are his people. . . ." The truth would seem to be that we are God's—and not our own.
