WORLD-WIDE COMMUNION SUNDAY

The observance of World-Wide Communion Sunday on the first Sunday in October has become one of the most significant days in global Christianity. It is estimated that of the nearly one billion Christians throughout the world, millions will bow and kneel at the Lord's Table, carrying out the tradition of Christian unity.

This year as Methodists participate in the spiritual life-renewing sacrament they will have in mind the thought: "As we drink the cup and eat the bread, we sense our oneness in Christ. And as we give, we express our oneness with our fellows."

Oneness with our fellow man is put in action through our contributions to the Fellowship of Suffering and Service Offering received on this day. These gifts are divided as follows:

One-half goes to the Methodist Committee on Overseas Relief for its work in relief, reconstruction and rehabilitation. In the past 24 years MCOR has received and administered more than \$20 million for food, clothing, blankets, medicines, hospitalization, and temporary housing. More recently, increasing emphasis has been placed on rehabilitation of refugees and disaster victims.

One-fourth goes to the Commission on Chaplains to recruit chaplains, assist their work, and provide for pensions. This commission undergirds the work of 650 Methodist ministers who serve as chaplains with the armed forces, in hospitals, in correctional institutions, and in industry. This is a truly ecumenical ministry as these chaplains are sent to minister to the spiritual welfare of all men and women.

One-fourth goes to the Commission on Camp Activities. Servicemen and their families who find themselves in a new community, most often far from home, welcome the work accomplished through this commission. With funds from World-wide Communion offerings, churches near military establishments are assisted in providing a "home church away from home," for these Methodists and others in the service.

Every member should commune at one of the Services this Sunday. Holy Communion will be administered at both morning services. Those who find it convenient are urged to attend the early service. Those who can attend only in the evening will be given an opportunity to commune at the close of the evening service.

The Eucharist

Past, present, and future are indissolubly united in the sacrament. It may be regarded as a dramatization of the advent of the Lord, which is at once His remembered coming in humiliation, and His desired coming in glory, both realized in His true presence in the Sacrament.

In the Eucharist, therefore, the Church perpetually reconstitutes the crisis in which the Kingdom of God came in history. It never gets beyond this. At each Eucharist we are there—we are in the night in which He was betrayed, at Golgotha, before the empty tomb on Easter day, and in the upper room where He appeared; and we are at the moment of His coming, with angels and archangels and all the company of heaven, in the twinkling of an eye at the last trump. Sacramental communion is not a purely mystical experience to which history, as embodied in the form and matter of the Sacrament, would be in the last resort irrelevant; it is bound up with a corporate memory of real events. History has been taken up into the suprahistorical, without ceasing to be history.



LETTER FROM RICHARD MILK

Oh happy day, Oh happy day, when Jesus washed my sins away! Hallelujah! God is marvelously wonderful. This morning as I sit for a moment in my study, and reflect upon the great wonders of God and his mercy, there are three special items of praise and of thanksgiving to Him.

The first is gratitude to God for: the support by prayers, gifts, and letters from

the first is gratitude to God for: the support by prayers, girts, and letters from churches and people like Trinity. I feel deeply grateful and honored that out of your busy lives, you have taken time to write warm letters of encouragement and appreciation. We do hope that there will be an opportunity at some future date for some of you to visit Durango. We now have three flights a week from Monterey, as well as three flights a week from Mexico City. In any event any member of Trinity Church would be most welcome to visit us, and to give a first hand account of the activities and environment of the work which you are supporting here. environment of the work which you are supporting here.

The second basis for deep thanks to God are the doors of opportunity that have opened for service. Looking ahead at my schedule for the next four months, I find every day and every week filled with different activities—activities that challenge, each one presenting an opportunity of witness for our Lord. True, there are some doors closed to us, but there are so many that have been opened that we have no time to

bemoan those that are still closed. The third great basis of thanksgiving and gratitude is a sense of accomplishment. We do feel that we have some harvest to show now for the two years invested here. We can see definite progress in the growth and atmosphere and fervor of the Durango Church. The distribution of literature suitable for rural community development has obtained a response far in excess of our original expectations. The plan for the improvement of parsonages and facilities for rural pastors and their work is going at full speed. Two parsonages have been constructed and dedicated, and in both congregations a new sense of fervor and witness can be noticed because of these ministerial homes which provide an adequate home base for these rural pastors. A program for short courses is in the planning stage for several during the year. Within two weeks I shall be in a ten-day rural institute in the northern part of the state of Zacatecas helping the Disciples of Christ ministers in a larger parish circuit there. The demonstrations projects and the simple experimental plots have revealed several very valuable facts about the proper application of limited water and adequate fertilization in this area of limited rainfall.

Please accept my heartfelt thanks for your friendship, for your loyal support, and for your keen interest. May God richly bless all the members of Trinity Church as you perform a task of witness there in that strategic capital city of the great state of Florida.



TO MAKE CHRIST KNOWN

The Discipline of The Methodist Church summarizes the goal of the churches missionary program with these words: "The supreme aim of Missions is to make the Lord Jesus Christ known to all peoples in all lands as their divine Saviour, to persuade them to become his disciples, and to gather these disciples into Christian churches; to enlist them in the building of the Kingdom of God; to cooperate with these churches; to promote world Christian fellowship; and to bring to bear on all human life the spirit and principles of Christ."

In trying to carry out this lofty directive the Methodist Church lifts up the Lord Jesus Christ as the divine Saviour of all men in forty-eight countries on five continents. Participating in this "gentle persuasion" are 1501 commissioned missionaries overseas; 97 commissioned missionaries in the United States; 378 commissioned deaconesses; 101 special term missionaries overseas; 50 special term missionaries in the United States, and 22 missionaries under special assignment.

Associated with these missionaries and deaconesses are hundreds of paid national workers, men and women committed to a world-wide ministry to the whole man. The diversity of their skills and talents has its focus on Jesus Christ.

We have been hearing about "new frontiers," but the church is concerned about an old frontier and this frontier is defined in terms of people. Where the people are there the church must be. This takes in the United States as well as the world. Except in name and certain formalities life in the United States can hardly be characterized as embodying the principles of Christ. We must come to a new realization of America as a mission field.

Never has the program of the Board of Missions been so varied as it is now. Never have there been opportunities for so many activities. Never has the world so needed the Christian gospel. Were the Board to meet current requests for help from all lands, a minimum budget of \$50 million annually would be necessary (the present annual budget

is \$34 million

Frinity Church carried in the budget a total of \$30,000 for benevolent purposes. Additional gifts are solicited for specific projects such as supporting the Richard E. Milk family in Mexico. The annual offering for the Milk Fund will be received on November 22. Five thousand dollars is our minimum goal for this fund. Your support is needed and we urge you to be considering your gift.

Accomplishing the aim of missions requires of every Methodist . . . Constant prayer for the missionary work of the church . . . faithful financial support . . . study of the biblical and theological bases and meaning of the missionary task. You can help "to make Christ known" with your prayers, your study, your gifts and the witness of your example.

LAYMEN'S DAY - 1964

Christianity would never have survived without laymen. Indeed it never would have come to life without them. Jesus was a layman. He was not one of the religious hierarchy of his time. He was not a member of the Sanhedrin. His father was a carpenter and His best friends were people whom he met on the streets—on the lake shore—in the homes—in the churches—at the wedding feasts—at funerals. He was a young man who recognized parental authority and government under a rule of law.

Early Christianity was spread across the Roman Empire by laymen who translated the gospel into terms of daily living. This is still the most vital task of the active churchman. The Protestant Reformation had its genesis in Luther's concept of "the priesthood of all believers." Many of the great preachers and circuit riders of the Wesleyan revival were dedicated laymen.

So today—the church that meets its fullest responsibilities is the product of the devotion and constant effort of the "Lay Ministry." Without loyal teachers the church school would be non-existent. Without faithful women the great missionary enterprise would collapse. Without sacrificial stewardship the essential financial support would be missing.

Great churches are not mere buildings regardless of how fine the architecture or how luxurious the appointments. They are made important by the service they render and the moral and spiritual leadership they offer to the community.

They can accomplish these objectives only through the devotion of dedicated laymen. In writing to the Corinthians, Paul announced the challenge:

"Moreover, it is required of stewards that a man be found faithful."
