A LENTEN DISCIPLINE

Of a Pure Mind and Simple Intention

The two wings by which a man is lifted up from earthly things, are simplicity and purity. Simplicity ought to be in our intention, purity in our affection. Simplicity tendeth towards God; purity apprehendeth and, as it were, tasteth him. If thou be inwardly free from inordinate desires, nothing will arise to obstruct thy good actions. Seek for nothing but the Will of God and the good of thy neighbor, and thou shalt enjoy inward liberty. If thy heart were pure, everything which God hath created would be unto thee a mirror of life, and a book of holy doctrine. For there is no creature so small or so vile, but doth show forth His goodness.

If thou wert inwardly good and pure, thou wouldst be able to perceive and understand all things without impediment. The pure heart penetrates Heaven and Hell. As a man is inwardly, so he judgeth outwardly. If there be any joy in the world, rest assured that the pure in heart possess it. And if there be anywhere tribulation and anguish, an evil conscience knoweth this best. As iron thrust into fire loseth its rust and becometh all white and glowing, so he that turneth himself wholly to God puts off all slothfulness and is transformed into a new man.

When a man beginneth to grow lukewarm in the things of the spirit, he shrinketh from undertaking even a small labour, and gladly turneth to outward consolation; but when he is resolved and beginneth to perfect and overcome himself, and to walk manfully in the way of God, then he esteemth light those burdens that formerly seemed so grievous unto him.



THE STATE OF YOUR HEART

One of the books that was dearest to the heart of John Wesley was William Law's A Serious Call to a Devout and Holy Life. In this devotional classic John Wesley found the spiritual nurture that was to bear fruit in his deepened earnestness and the Methodist singularity of religious strictness and devotion.

While reading it this week a passage leaped from the page and imprinted itself on my heart:

"If you consider devotion only as a time of so much prayer, you may perhaps perform it, though you live in this daily indulgence; but if you consider it as a state of the heart, as a lively fervour of the soul, that is deeply affected with a sense of its own misery and infirmities, and desires the Spirit of God more than all things in the world: you will find that the spirit of indulgence, and the spirit of prayer, cannot subsist together. Mortification of all kinds is the very life and soul of piety; but he that has not so small a degree of it, as to be able to be early at his prayers, can have no reason to think that he has taken up his cross, and is following Christ. What conquest has he got over himself; what right hand has he cut off; what trials is he prepared for; what sacrifice is he ready to offer unto God, who cannot be so cruel to himself as to rise to prayer at such time as the drudging part of the world are content to rise to their labour?

". . . If our blessed Lord used to pray early before day; if He spent whole nights in prayer; if the devout Anna was day and night in the temple; if St. Paul and Silas at midnight sang praises unto God; if the primitive Christians, for several hundred years, besides their hours of prayers in the daytime, met publicly in the churches at midnight, to join in psalms and prayers; is it not certain that these practices showed the state of their heart?"

This is Lent, the time of discipline and introspection; of earnestness and strictness in the religious life. Our Church is providing the situation in which our hearts can be renewed—through the revival services in which we shared, our Sunday worship, the times of Wednesday Communion and the Choir's magnificent presentation of the Third Mass last Sunday Evening.


