A LETTER TO TRINITY'S COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

At our meeting on Tuesday night, February 13, 1973, we took the first step in what I hope will be a long journey of dreaming, planning, setting goals, and achievement that could play a big role in Trinity's future ministry.

For our first couple of meetings we will be doing some listening (I hope CREATIVE listening). I realize that some of this preparatory introduction will be "old hat" to some of you. Yet others are getting involved in a planning process for the first time. I feel that all of us will derive benefit from an introduction to the planning process even if it results in merely being a "refresher" for us. I feel that the broader our base of COMMON experience the easier it will be for us to work together.

I believe that there are advantages (which far outweigh the disadvantages) to getting a broad participation from within the membership of the Church in DESIGNING goals and in IMPLEMENTING these goals. In a little book, "Listening to the Church," Virgil Wesley Sexton says, "Local parishes demand more autonomy and participation in decision-making. . . . Participation in planning should help prepare the way for the acceptance of strong leadership but a less bureaucratic style. IF LAITY WERE INVOLVED IN PLANS BEFORE 'PACKAGES' WERE ANNOUNCED OR PRONOUNCEMENTS MADE, THERE WOULD MORE LIKELY BE IMPLEMENTATION AND ACCEPTANCE. And, this involvement means ANY layman who is interested."

During our first meeting for 1973 we listened to Lyle Schaller as he shared with us some "ELEMENTS OF GOOD PLANNING."

Among other things, we learned a bit about defining goals. We learned:

- (1) a goal ought to describe a specific task or target group of people at which the goal is directed. In other words a goal is not just a great dream or a nebulous hope.
- (2) a goal takes into consideration the resources available. (We do this as individuals when we set out to buy a compact car instead of a Cadillac after we have taken a good look at our bank account.)
- (3) a goal identifies who is responsible for implementing it. (On a chicken farm this would imply the necessity for setting a goal of having 1000 fryers weighing three pounds in nine weeks, but also for being certain that someone is going to assume responsibility for feeding them.)
- (4) a good goal carries with it a schedule so you can see where you ought to be when achieving the goal.
- (5) a good goal ought to be formulated in terms which can be evaluated — indices which tell "how we're doing."

Our next meeting will enable us to see some of the trends for the future which ought to be taken into consideration in our planning.

WHY DO WE ASK MEMBERS OF THE CONGREGATION TO REGISTER THEIR ATTENDANCE EACH SUNDAY? For lots of reasons:

(1) Nearly every Sunday new residents in Tallahassee are present. When we know who they are, we are able to give them a personal welcome to the city and provide them with information about Trinity. This enables them to feel free to make this their church home.

(2) Many people who have been attending worship services and participating in other areas of Trinity Church life find the registration a convenient way of letting us know that they want to become more closely identified with this church either by joining the church on vows or by transfer. (When we say the words in the Apostles' Creed: "I believe in the holy Catholic Church" we are saying that we believe in the Church universal which encompasses all Christians regardless of denominational affiliation. We not only say this, but we practice it by recognizing the baptism which you received in another denomination and by accepting your transfer from another denomination.)

(3) When church members register their attendance along with non-members it encourages others to register who otherwise might hesitate to do so.

(4) We live in a transient age. Addresses are constantly changing. So, registering enables us to help keep our mailing lists up to date.

(5) Each week volunteers mail cards with a picture of Trinity Church on them to visitors letting them know that we are aware of their presence and that we appreciate their visiting us.

(6) Registering affords opportunities for the congregation to give the staff information concerning people who are ill or who need a pastoral call. Some people use this as an opportunity to make comments and suggestions or to request certain hymns to be sung, or to request offering envelopes. In other words the registration becomes one means of congregational communication with the staff.

(7) The registration also becomes a source of data for the ministers and committee chairmen in knowing who to ask to serve as ushers, greeters, choir members, etc., for various worship services. By separating the registrations by the hour of church attendance we can be aware of who attends which service.

(8) Registration also helps the ministers to become more familiar with the names of persons attending the worship services.

(9) As the registration pad is passed down the pew, it provides opportunities for people to become aware of who is sitting with them in the same pew. Particular note can be made of new people and visitors so that a special effort may be made to welcome them.

(10) When college and university students give their home addresses, it provides parents with one more contact with their sons and daughters.

There may be other good reasons for continuing the practice of regular Sunday morning registrations. Here I have mentioned ten of them. And I take this opportunity to thank you for your willingness to take part in this weekly activity.

"Sometimes I think no one is every going to love me," despairs Lucy.

Perhaps you remember the comic strip, "Peanuts," some time ago providing us with a sad scene of Lucy, seated on the ground, her lip-line turned down so forlornly. Her thoughts are turned inwardly upon herself.

"Sometimes I think no one is ever going to want to lean over and kiss me," she moans. Snoopy, seated nearby, hears Lucy's lament. He stands up and leans in her direction.

"Look at me, sweetie . . . I'm leaning over . . . Hurry up and look!"

But Lucy is so wrapped up in her misery that she is oblivious to love being offered.

Lucy's problem was that she was so focussed upon herself and her own need (the need to be loved) that she could not see the love that even at that very moment was being offered.

I have seen ads that said, "Take your problems to Church and leave them there." (Some folks I know take that suggestion literally. These literalists drive up in front of the Church each Sunday morning, drop off their "problems" to attend Sunday School while they themselves go back home to study the funny paper.) The trouble with the ad "Take your problems to Church and leave them there" is that we are apt to be so hung up on our needs and so focussed in upon our problems that we miss the whole opportunity of genuine worship (to focus upon God and the reality of His presence and the love that He offers).

"Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God." Blessed are those whose lives are focussed upon God. Part of the joy of living lies in receiving. The Gospel implies the GIFT of God . . . giving Himself in Christ for us. But also part of the joy of living lies in giving. The Gospel implies the DEMAND that God makes upon us. ("Freely ye have received; therefore freely give." Matthew 10:8.)

In other words, to focus upon God means to see God where He is at work in the history that is being made right this moment out there in the world. And to receive His love places us under the obligation to be with Him in the fulfilment of His purpose of loving that world out there.

Of course, the trouble with that kind of religion is that it can get you into trouble. You'll find yourself butting into affairs where many people feel the Church has no business being. But if God is the Lord of all of life there can be no area of life where He is not concerned. And there can be no area of life where the Christian can say, "This does not concern me!"

Do you suppose Lucy was smart enough to know what she would be letting herself in for if she responded to love? Maybe she felt it would be cheaper to sit and complain. After all, the grace of God, though free, is costly.
