# Evangelism Work Area Plans Television Services

The words of Christ's Great Commission are the driving force behind a bold new program launched this month by Trinity's Work Area on Evangelism.

Six major new activities are planned to carry out the Great Commission and enrich the spiritual life of each church member during 1975.

Plans for telecasting the 8:30 a.m. worship service over Channel 13, providing bus transportation to seek out young, elderly and others needing it to attend this 8:30 service and church school, developing a one-to-one "caring ministry" for new members, cottage prayer meetings, an evangelistic Sunday evening service, and other special forms of worship will be outlined to the membership of Trinity by the Evangelism Work Area dur-

Subcommittees to implement each program have been appointed and

1. Television Broadcast. The 8:30 a.m. service will be broadcast live on WDTB-TV, Channel 13, Panama City, beginning in April. A subcommittee, chaired by Palmer Williams, is working to complete arrangements with Channel 13 and to develop and produce a suitable format for a mass appeal, evangelistic broadcast. 3. "We Care." Chairman Ruth Mc-Invale will lead committee members Barbara (Babs) Wilkerson, Paul Williamson and Jim Nash in developing a "caring ministry" of Trinity members to meet the needs of others. Primary responsibilities are to assign each new Trinity member to a family who will "care" for them for three months and

to get newcomers placed in the cor-

rect church school classes.

4. Cottage Prayer Meetings. Establishing prayer centers in each major residential area of Tallahassee, training prayer group leaders and carrying out a 30-day "Wanted: Ten Brave Christians" program are the major responsibilities of a subcommittee composed of L. V. (Len) McKennon, Jim Weatherly and Dr. Gene Davidson.

5. Discipleship Celebration. A Discipleship Celebration in May, designed to deepen and enrich the spiritual life of each Church member, will be planned by Ralph Proctor, Jr., Joe Hughes, Charlene Causseaux, Alberta Ashmore and David Moon.

6. Sunday Night Service. An evening praise service centering on the Power of the Holy Spirit will be designed by Esther Wilfong, Mary Keen, Nelson Waters, Gene Morse, Dorothy Sauls and Elaine Smith, chairman. Specific responsibilities are to develop an evangelistic musical program using sacred hymns, develop a praise service format with an evangelistic theme, incorporate an altar service at the close of each program and to encourage those in attendance to take part in the service through prayer, sharing and experience, praising God for His love.

"This (Evangelism) work area is of supreme importance to this Church," the Rev. Ed Norman told work area members at an initial meeting December 12. "It is because of your commitment that we will be able to have an effective ministry—for this Church to be what it is intended to be by God."

"Christianity is a layman's religion," Chairman Teague told work area members. "It started with one layman telling another what God had done for him."

He said that simple approach best describes the manner in which Trinity's Work Area on Evangelism will proceed in carrying out the Great Commission of Jesus.





**Trinity Profile on Giving** 

Many members of Trinity has been asking questions during our Loyalty Sunday and follow-up effort for obtaining pledges of Trinity members to support the 1975 program. The questions for the most part have focused on the giving profile of Trinity.

In order to answer your questions as fully and clearly as possible at this time we have prepared the following statistical statements:

- 1. 684 out of 1200 families in Trinity have given pledges of their support so far.
- 2. The total pledged to date breaks down into an average annual gift per family of \$166 per year less than \$12 per month, if we include the families who have not offered any support.

3. 24 families give \$100 or more per month.

4. A study of Trinity pledges shows that many families are giving the same amount for 1975 that they were giving five or more years ago. Most people are receiving income from vocations which have given generous increases in salaries during those years.

What do these statistics mean for the Trinity program for 1975?

We needed a 12% increase in our giving to meet the program needs projected for 1975. That increase amounts to \$28,000. (In 1974 we increased our giving by \$33,000, but that was the first significant increase in the budget at Trinity for about ten years.)

As the picture now looks, Trinity will have no increase at all in income for 1975. This means drastic cuts will have to be made in the 1975 program. A high percentage of the budget is frozen so that it cannot be reduced — such as debt payments, apportionments, utilities, building maintenance, etc.

In order to operate with fiscal responsibility, the Finance Committee, Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, and Council on Ministries will meet early in January to make necessary cuts in staff and program in order to effect a balanced budget for 1975.

"It is a pleasure to report a great success in our Evenings at Trinity," Education Minister Joe Mills said. An average of 65 attended each of the three evenings. The Gospel of St. John had the largest attendance, followed by United Methodist Beliefs and Personal Growth.

All of the evaluations from participants indicated a strong interest in continuing this program on a quarterly basis. Most recommended topics related to the Bible. Other suggestions were Prayer, Church & Social Issues, Works of Great Theologians, Church History, a study of the Holy Spirit. The original courses were also requested to be repeated.

Evenings at Trinity will continue in the spring, Rev. Mills said. Initially the sessions will be one and one-half hours each with each study lasting four weeks. Further announcements will be reported in the *Tidings*.

## **COMMENT**:

## MORE ON **EVANGELISM**



Elsewhere in this issue of the Tidings you will find details of the evangelism program which is underway at Trinity.

As we begin a year of emphasis upon evangelism I feel a need to say in large letters for all to read that EVANGELISM IS NOT THE RAH RAH RAH OF HUMAN ACTIVITY. Evangelism is NOT bringing a great spiritual awakening by singing gospel songs or preaching gospel messages or whipping up enthusiasm in crowds of people. EVANGELISM IS NOT SOMETHING WE CONCOCT AND DO; IT IS SOMETHING THAT GOD DOES. It is something that God does in us and through us when we are ready to make ourselves available to Him.

He may use gospel songs and gospel preaching. He has done this in times past. He may do it again. But we need to know that we do not control His Spirit by using any of the paraphenalia of worship. We do not control His Spirit, period. The wind of the Spirit blows where He wills and not where we decide. Our main task is to be where the wind of His Spirit is blowing and to be willing to be blown where He wills. We can come spiritually alive anytime we are willing to meet His conditions. It never is a case of whether or not God is able or willing for us to come alive. It is a case of our response to the question: "Do you want to be made whole?"

Really evangelistic success is more the result of a healthy church where Christian people are worshipping together and serving together in the world in the name of Christ than it is the result of specific evangelistic programs. A genuine concern for persons must characterize the membership of any church that seeks effectively to touch the lives of others.

Having said this, I can go on and say that an evangelistic plan and program can play a significant role in helping persons to be open to the Holy Spirit and in helping them to express meaningfully their genuine concern for each other and for others.

Your Work Area on Evangelism here at Trinity is developing a program that will help to make all of this possible. A major part of the program will zero in on the 8:30 a.m. Sunday worship services. During the next months we will be developing a format of worship which will seek to meet the needs of a large segment of our present membership and new persons who will be entering our fellowship.

The 11 a.m. services will continue to offer a type of form and beauty that appeals to an even larger segment of our membership. Also we will continue to offer a most informal service for an increasing number of persons who worship with us at 9:45 a.m.

As you see by the program printed elsewhere in this issue of Tidings we are aiming for a TV sharing of our 8:30 service each Sunday beginning in April. This will not affect the continuation of the 8:30 broadcast each Sunday.

## **Grist From Mills**

#### IDEALIST-REALIST OR POSSIBILIST?

George Orwell wrote about "1984" and frightened some of us by what he said would be taking place in our world. Charles Reich spoke of a revolution coming in The Greening of America. Don Shula spoke of wanting the Miami Dolphins to control their own destiny toward the Super Bowl.

Often in my earlier ministry I thought of myself as an idealist — one whose dreams and visions were placed before practical considerations and solutions could be worked out. I rationalized this position by saying that Jesus too was a dreamer and that I had a good example.

Let's be thankful for growth and maturity. I have grown to realize that Jesus was not really a dreamer, nor was he an idealist; rather, he was a possibilist. A possibilist is one who sees life as a possibility, realizable through hope and organized, planned human activity.

As I look at the Christian education ministry here at Trinity I realize that we need to be possibilists, not idle dreamers. We need to develop a long range, comprehensive plan of ministry for the total life of our people.

Let me be a bit more specific about what I mean: First, we must realize that to develop an educational ministry here we cannot plan only by the month. We cannot go from crisis to crisis. We must look into the future five to ten years, answering the question: "What do we want our educational ministry to be, and to whom are we ministering?"

Secondly, it means developing such a plan for Christian education that extends through the life of the individual. Our literature is developed for the growth and development of a person from the time he is born through his adult growth.

We can then say to adults that we have an education ministry that, with their help, will be aimed at helping their child develop in the faith throughout his life and not just through certain "strong" areas of curriculum. Thirdly, and perhaps most importantly, this means renewed interest in the training of those who volunteer in our own education ministry. It means a renewed dedication by the workers to update their knowledge of Christian education both in theory and in methodology. It means taking risks, breaking old patterns to bring creative and open change to the church school and education ministry of the church.

And finally, all this means that we look at each person in our church as a unique child of God. It means that we intentionally approach each person so he will experience God's love, experience God's caring, and experience God's acceptance through us as he comes to Church.

Idealistic? No - Possible!!! Possible because we have the dedicated persons to plan for 1984 and not be afraid. Possible because we have the persons and the resources to take the steps necessary to build in 1975 for 1984. It is possible because we have the persons committed to help shape our destiny. Possible because many years ago a man came to this earth and assured us that through Him all things are possible. 1984: Watch out, here we come.



#### Ministerial Scholarship Started in Memory of Ralph Jones

A ministerial scholarship fund has been started at Trinity in memory of Rev. Ralph Jones, who died suddenly last month in Homestead where he was serving as pastor of Silver Palm United Methodist Church.

He was in his forties and his death was a shock to Trinity members among whom he grew up in Tallahassee. "Trinity has been the home church to me across the years," he wrote in a letter to Frank D. Moor in 1962 when he was serving one of his first pastorates in Englewood, Florida. "Wherever we go and then return it is always to Trinity."

"Somehow across the years the gospel of good news, the good news of salvation in Jesus Christ got across to us," he wrote about himself and his early Trinity Sunday school class-mates, "and I thank God for these teachers and others."

The memorial scholarship fund will be used to provide money for young men and women from Trinity entering the ministry of the United Methodist Church. The first recipient of the scholarship will be Timothy Jones, son of Ralph and Jacqueline Sauls

After that the scholarship will continue to be used for the support of others entering the full-time ministry of the church.

"Stewardship is more than giving money; it is being a steward of the life God has given you, developing yourself so that you can reach out to others," Miss Patterson said.


Still a teenager herself, she has been working in the area of youth stewardship for four months and is traveling across the country to find out what young people are doing in that area. Her findings will be a guide in developing a stewardship program for United Methodist youth.

"Young people are less involved in social movements than they were five years ago. The economy has made them more job conscious and they are training themselves in areas where jobs will be available," she reported.

The Senior High class discussed with her the problems of a polluted environment and the need for educating people to become more aware of the problem and recognizing their responsibility to human kind.

"Stewardship is revealed as the life style of a Christian," she told the group. "Life is a free gift; we have a responsibility to be a full partner with God."

The Trinity class is currently involved in a study, "You Are an Environment."

## Members Decline, Giving Increases

Newscope, national weekly newsletter for United Methodists, reported in its December 6, 1974, issue that membership in the United Methodist Church in the U. S. is going down, but giving is increasing.

Total membership nationwide is 10,063,046, down 129,219 from a year ago. At the same time, giving increased 4.5% to an adjusted total of \$131,782,000 for all benevolent causes.

The publication reported that average attendance is 3,612,480 at the principal weekly worship service in 39,195 local churches, down 18,781. Church school membership fell 236,-208 to 4,930,475.

# Appeal Made for Adult Foster Homes

The State Division of Family Services is seeking foster homes for adults. Caretakers who provide foster home care are entitled to receive \$200 per month from people who receive the foster home services.

The Adult Foster Home Care Program serves people who are unable to live alone in their community. These adults need and desire the support and security which family life provides.
