## Renovation Will Require Sunday School Class Locations, Starting Times to Change in May

The Council on Ministries has announced meeting locations of Sunday school classes and locations of staff offices during the renovation of Trinity Hall.

The new locations and a new Sunday school hour will be effective the first Sunday of May, if construction begins in mid-May as planned.

Classes for one-year-olds through the fifth grade will meet jointly with those age groups at First Presbyterian Church. The Sunday school hour will be from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m.

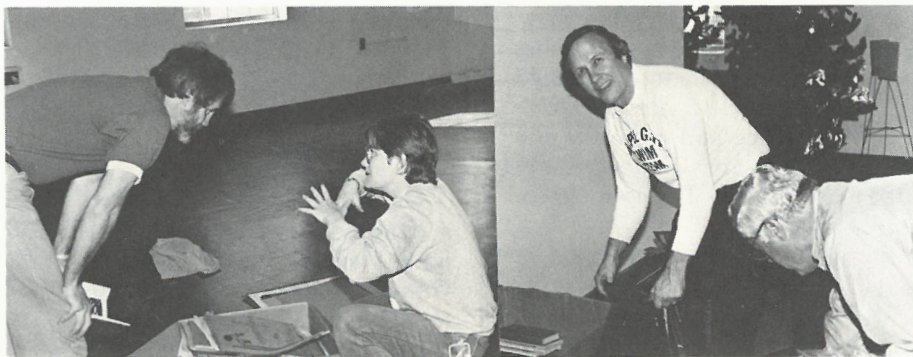
Nursery children will be relocated to Trinity's parlor and parents of one-year-olds have the option of placing their children in the church parlor or at First Presbyterian.

The church parlor was selected as the most convenient child-care location because of its closeness to the sanctuary, fellowship hall and choir room.

Older children may remain at First Presbyterian from 9:30 until noon for Sunday school at 9:30, refreshments at 10:30 and Sunday school extended session at 11. Parents may leave children there at any of these times.

Trinity teachers will be present at all class sessions at First Presbyterian. Gayle Jordan, Trinity's DCE, is working out arrangements with Katherine Mason, director of education at the neighboring church.

Sixth, seventh and eighth grades will meet in Room 220 (Choir Room), and the 9th, 10th, 11th, and 12th grades will meet in Room 224 (Women's Robing Room).



Faced with packing up all Sunday School curriculum in Trinity Hall by mid-May when revocation is to begin, the Commission on Education and others worked for three hours on January 28 and on February 1 to sort materials and pack into boxes what needed to be saved. The Fellowship Hall will be shared during the Sunday school hour by the Wesley Fellowship, Wesley Brotherhood, Florence Clemons and Felkel-Steinmeyer classes.

The Koininea, Bob Storey and Betty Phifer Advanced Studies classes will meet in the sanctuary. Aldersgate will meet in Room 334, Youth Adult Bible study group in Room 215 and the Joy Class in the Chapel.

"This plan is the result of walking over the space that will be available to us during Trinity Hall remodeling again and again, and trying to make it possible for our entire program to function during this period," Senior Minister Walter Kalaf said.

Sunday school curriculum for the summer quarter for two-year-olds through the fifth grade will be decided by a joint committee of both churches. Trinity's Commission on Education will probably have a scaled down version of Vacation Bible School, using available space at Trinity, or a full program at First Presbyterian on dates that will not conflict with that church's VCS or other summer programs.

In order to coincide with First Presbyterian's Sunday school schedule, Trinity will change its schedule to have worship services at 8:30 a.m. and 11 a.m., and Sunday school for all classes, 9:30 a.m.

## Peace With Justice in Third World Is Topic for Bolivian Bishop

Dr. Mortimer Arias, for six years bishop of the Bolivian Methodist Church and now in exile in America, will speak at Trinity United Methodist Church at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, March 28.

The Florida Conference Work Area on Church and Society has scheduled the speech on the concern of the church for world peace and the need for peace with justice, particularly in the Third World Countries.

One of several similar appearances throughout Florida, Dr. Arias' speech is for the benefit of all United Methodists in the Tallahassee District.

Dr. Arias was a principal speaker at the National UMW Conference in Philadelphia recently, and next month will publish a book on evangelism, *Announcing the Kingdom—Liberating Evangelization*.

During his last two years in Bolivia (1978-80) he was secretary on evangelization and mission of the Latin

American Council of Churches in formation and executive secretary of the Latin American Methodist Council. The military regime that took over the government in Bolivia in July 1980 imprisoned him for 37 days without formal charges or trial. He was released and exiled and accepted an invitation to teach evangelization and Latin American theology at Claremont School of Theology in California.

He studied theology in Union Theological Seminary in Buenos Aires and did graduate work at Perkins School

## Trinity In Mission

In the month of January, Trinity's Commission on Church and Society participated in the Shop and Share Program.

Shop and Share is a ministry of the Tallahassee Interfaith Council. Each month a different member congregation takes the responsibility of transporting food to those agencies that benefit the poor and needy. These include ECHO, the Salvation Army, the Pride Minority Project, and Catholic Social Services.

Every week volunteers gather food from Shop and Share bins at four area Publix stores, Warehouse Foods and Super Plus. The volunteers take the food to one of the deserving organizations.

There is warrant for this kind of activity in the Bible. Deuteronomy 24:19 commands, "When you reap the harvest in your field and forget a swathe, do not go back and pick it up; it shall be left for the alien, the orphan and the widow, in order that the Lord your God may bless you in all that you undertake." (NEB) So Shop and Share is not a new idea at all!

In January Trinity volunteers participated in this age-old idea by picking up 591 articles of food. They were blessed by the happy, grateful faces of those receiving the food. You too can be a part of this special ministry by leaving items of food at one of the Shop and Share bins.

## From Easter to Pentecost Trinity Families Will Contribute for World Hunger in 'Fish Banks'

Trinity families sensitive to the needs of disadvantaged people at home and abroad soon will involve themselves in a churchwide relief program.

From Easter to Pentecost, they will make daily contributions to a "Fish Bank," joining in a worldwide, daily mealtime ceremony to show gratitude for their own food and security from famine.

One hundred percent of all money put into UMCOR's Fish Bank will go directly to combat world hunger. Administration and promotion costs are paid out of other funds. The fish was chosen as the Christian symbol be-

cause the Greek letters which spell "fish" were also an acronym for "Jesus Christ, Son of God, Savior."

Gordon Greathouse, Trinity's missionary in Brazil, writes that in the northeast section of Brazil 25 million people have experienced their fifth consecutive year of drought. Hundreds of thousands of people are starving; millions have fled to crowded cities. At the same time, in the southern part of Brazil, where most of the industry and export goods are located, they have experienced the worst flooding of the century. In two important states, half of the industry and nearly all the crops have been destroyed.

The World Food Council reports there are 500 million undernourished people in the world today and up to one-third of all live-born children die from malnutrition and disease before they reach the age of five.

As the workers return to Florida citrus and vegetable fields for another harvest, it should be no surprise that this year they are being offered 10 to 30 cents a bushel less than they received for picking one year ago. Little wonder it is because the available pool of farm workers has been so richly replenished by the current recession.

# Ten-Day Mission Trip to Haiti Provides Opportunity to Help 'the Least of These'

After I agreed to go on a medical mission to Haiti in November, 1983, I began to have second thoughts. Considering the enormous health problems of Haitians, what on earth could I do on a ten-day trip that would make a difference?

When I voiced these concerns to my wife, her immediate response was that my reasoning was wrong. Said she, "Jesus said that inasmuch as you have done it unto one of the least of these, you have done it unto me. You must go with that in mind." And so I did. And it worked.

Our ten-day mission did not make a dent in the problems of the millions of the sick and poor in Haiti. But among the hundreds of patients we did see, there were many we were able to help. And I think that all of them sensed that we cared, and that we wanted to help. This I think is in keeping with the late Dr. Albert Schweitzer's philosophy of reverence for life which for me has been an ideal and a guiding principle for over 30 years.

The words of the scripture kept coming back to me over and over and helped me through a tough week. I thought and still think about which one was the least of these.

Was it the poor young mother with meningitis whom we struggled so desperately to save, but failed? At least her family and other Haitians knew that we fought to the bitter end.

Or was it the old man with severe anemia and heart failure, who was virtually resurrected and given a reprieve after blood transfusions, diuretics, and digitalis? I don't know that I've ever had a patient who displayed more gratitude.

Or was it the sweet 12-year old girl with severe, life-threatening anemia, which probably will be corrected by treatment with iron?

Or was it the baby with bacterial

meningitis whose life was salvaged by massive intravenous antibiotic therapy?

Or was it the 13-year-old boy, devastated by typhoid fever, who responded quickly to treatment with chloramphenicol?

These are among the ones that stand out most prominently in my memories. But there were many others who could well qualify as the least of these.

So what is the message? I think there is an old lesson that we all have to learn over and over again. Although we know we cannot solve all the problems of the world, we do have the opportunity, wherever we are and whatever we do, to do what we can to help those in need.

And the thought, certainly not a new one, recurs that collectively, if people, churches, organizations, states, nations give their best effort to help those in need, it can make much more than a dent. Although radical reform is needed in Haiti to give the common people a better chance in life, and I do not profess to know the solutions to those enormous problems, it seems to me worthwhile for Americans, as individuals or groups, to continue to do whatever we can to help their poor and their sick. It cannot hurt for them

to think of their affluent neighbors, a few air hours to the north, as people who are earnestly concerned about them and as people who are sincere about wanting to help. God knows they need all the help they can get.

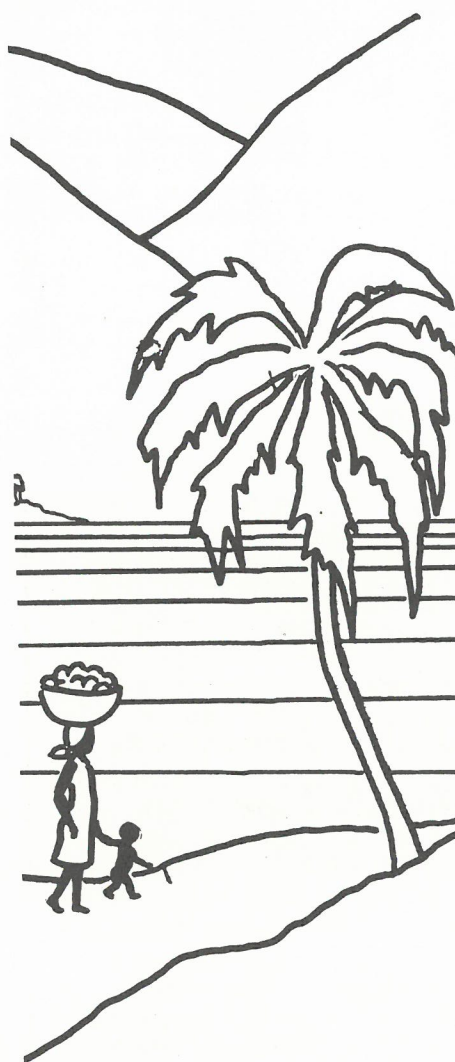
The ten-day effort of our small group (two physicians, four nurses, and one laboratory technician) was trivial compared with the ongoing exertion of the American missionaries with whom we were associated, as I am sure is true of the many others who are there trying to do the best they can with what they have to do with. Not only are they spreading the gospel, they are busy drilling wells for desperately needed water; running schools to help with the vast illiteracy;

working with agricultural and reforestation projects; and operating clinics and hospitals. They are feeding the hungry; visiting the sick, clothing the naked; giving drink to the thirsty; and giving hope to the oppressed. Although I have always had great admiration and respect for missionaries, their stock has risen enormously in my mind after being with them and seeing them in action during my stay in Haiti.

As is usually the case, I think my wife was correct.

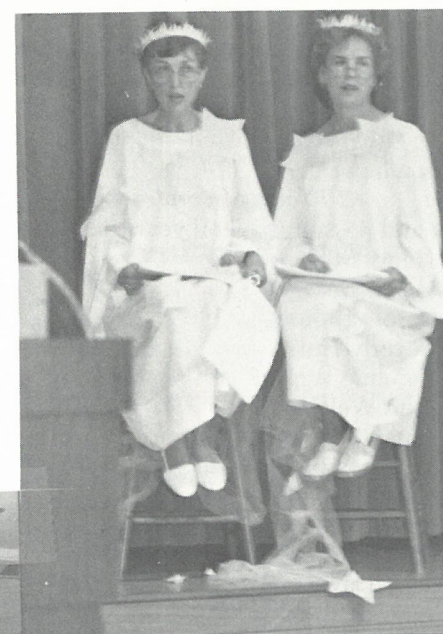
