Family Night Supper Will Honor Teachers, Hear Wesleyan Hymns

Men and women who serve as teachers in Trinity's Sunday school will be honored during family night Sunday, May 6, beginning with a supper at 6 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall.

The Wesleyan Singers and Chancel Choir under the direction of Miki Harrison will celebrate the night of appreciation with a Wesleyan hymn festival. They will perform hymns composed by the three Wesley brothers, John, Charles and Samuel.

Alison Mattice, Sunday school coordinator, said teachers will be invited as special guests. She encouraged children of the Sunday school especially to attend in support of their teachers. "We know all members of Trinity will want to be there to personally greet their teachers and show them how much we appreciate their tireless devotion to the education program," Mrs. Mattice said.

The Chancel Choir, performing again May 6 after a busy preLenten and Easter schedule, won appreciation of their own from Bishop Earl Hunt when he preached at Trinity on April 8. "I can't carry a tune, but I can tell when a hymn has been done well, and that was done masterfully," Bishop Hunt commented as he started his sermon in observance of Trinity's 160th anniversary.

Charge Conference Merges Gregory, Trinity Church Trust

A Charge Conference, meeting in Trinity's Fellowship Hall April 16, voted to mingle the Gregory Fund with the principal of the Trinity Methodist Church Trust for investment and reinvestment.

The resolution calling for the change came from the Board of Trustees, and noted that the bequest left by Trinity member Clyde W. Gregory for a permanent memorial and maintenance of that memorial is impractical to separate from other maintenance costs of Trinity Hall. The Gregory Room, named for its benefactor, shall continue to be so designated and a marker inscribing that name will be placed near the room's main entrance during renovation of Trinity Hall.

With the merger of the two trusts, the principal will be preserved under terms of the Trinity Methodist Church Fund and only the interest derived from its investment will be expended for general purposes of the latter trust. A Charge Conference on January 23 voted that 1984 income from the Trinity Methodist Church Fund be deposited as earned in the operating account of the church.

In a second "housekeeping" resolution, the Charge Conference authorized name references in Trinity Meth-(Continued on page 2, col. 1)

Winchester To Begin Renovation of Trinity Hall May 14

The Trinity Hall renovation contract, in the amount of \$742,558, was expected to be awarded late last month to Winchester Construction and Engineering Company, low bidder on the project, following review by Ted Steinmeyer, church trustee and attorney.

Trustees accepted a recommendation of the Building Committee April 2 and directed architect Joe Clemons to prepare a contract to be entered into with Winchester. Renovation will begin May 14.

"Watch for exciting things to happen between now and December 1," Trustee Chairman Mel Pope, Jr., said. "Our membership is going to be delighted when they see the finished product."

"I feel real good about the project. We're beginning to see the end of the road," Building Committee Chairman Ernest Menendez said.

"We have moved along real well and everything is falling into place. There have been no stumbling blocks," he added.

An Interior Planning Subcommittee of the Building Committee has been formed to determine the best approach to accomplish interior decorating. Members are Peggy Hughes, chairman; Alison Mattice; Pat McKenzie; Dr. Walter Kalaf, senior minister; and Gayle Jordan, director of Christian education.

Interior decorating considerations include wall, carpet and furniture colors; window treatment; and furniture selection.

The early estimate of up to \$100,000 for furnishings may be reduced slightly. Subcommittee members have determined that more existing classroom furniture can be used than first thought.

A work day was scheduled for May 5 to move all Trinity Hall furniture to the Gregory Room for pickup the next week by a storage company so that the building would be cleared for the May 14 construction start.

odist Trust documents to conform with new terms of the United Methodist Church. All reference to "Trinity United Church Trust" will henceforth be construed to refer to "Trinity United Methodist Church of Tallahassee, Florida, Inc." The name "Quarterly Conference" shall be understood to mean "The Charge Conference" and the name "Official Board" shall be understood to mean "The Administrative Board of Trinity United Methodist Church of Tallahassee, Florida."

The April 16 Charge Conference followed a quarterly meeting of the Administrative Board, during which updates were given about Trinity Hall renovation, the church program for the spring months and activities of United Methodist Women.

Church Treasurer Bill Smith reported that receipts were down for the first quarter, thus causing some apportionments and administrative expenses to be under financed for the period.

Finance Committee Chairman Bill Mattice reminded Administrative Board members that the budget is still short \$7,600 in pledges. Stewardship Crusade chairman John Olson hopes an appeal to new members, those who have not pledged previously and those who have not renewed their 1983 pledges will make up the shortfall.
