Choirs to Sing Music by Mozart Palm Sunday

The choirs of Trinity are busily preparing for Holy Week and Easter, the musical highlight focusing on Palm Sunday, March 23rd. On that day, there will be one service only at 11:00.

The Trinity Ringers and the Wesleyan Singers will participate early in the service. The chancel choir will present "Vesperae Solennes de Confessore," K. 339 by W. A. Mozart with instrumentalists and soprano soloist Lori Gibson from the FSU School of Music.

"It is easy for most of us to enjoy the sacred works of W. A. Mozart (1756-1791) for their light-hearted humor, beautiful lyricism and colorful vocal ensembles," Director of Music Cynthia Wendel said. Mozart was a master composer of "Ideal Music" during the Classical period. Guidelines of that period are as follows:

- Its (music) language should be universal, not limited by national boundaries.
- It should be noble as well as entertaining.
- It should be expressive within the bounds of decorum.
- It should be "natural," in the sense of being free of needless technical complications and capable of immediately pleasing any normally sensitive listener.

Miss Wendel said most of Mozart's music was composed either on commission or for a particular occasion. The "solemn Vespers of the Confessor (saint)," "Vesperae Solennes de Confessore," K. 339 was composed in 1780, although it is not known what saint was honored by the occasion.

"In Salzburg of 1780, it would never have occurred to anyone to perform such music 'in concert.' The work was the last composed for the Archbishop before Mozart's final break and departure for the life of a free-lance in Vienna," she explained.

Mozart was one of the more devoted believers among the great composers, a sincerely religious person and—for most of his life—a "good" Catholic. In this second of his two vespers services, Mozart writes freely and personally, following his own inspired understanding of the texts: Psalms 109-112, 116, Luke 1:46-55. "Familiarity with the setting of these texts will confirm that this truly was music commissioned for church use," Miss Wendel said.

United Methodist Volunteers in Mission Announce Three Projects

For the past 20 years, the Florida Conference has pioneered short-term mission projects both in this country and abroad. The movement has developed as concerned people have seen needs and opportunities for service. The stated purpose of UVMIM: "To share one's faith in Jesus Christ through service with one's unique skills and gifts in mission; to develop new perspectives and gain new insights into issues confronting the global human family."

Last year John Quigley, representing Trinity, was a member of one of the last teams to Duplan, Haiti. John and the other members of the team

shared their faith with the people of Duplan as they worked and worshipped together. John's commitment to serving others is a challenge to each of us to become more personally involved.

This year Tallahassee UVMIM is coordinating three projects—two locally for Vashti Center and the Gulf Coast for hurricane relief and the third to Chihuahua, Mexico.

Volunteers have already begun work in Apalachicola repairing hurricane damage. A local contractor has donated materials and is directing the work. The Apalachicola United Methodist Church is providing weekend housing and meals for volunteers. Work will include roofing, carpentry, painting and clearance of trees, etc.

Vashti Center in Thomasville is a residential center for troubled adolescents operated by the United Methodist Church. The project involves renovation of a 70-year old dairy barn into a recreational center. Work will include roofing, demolition of ceilings and floors, adding partitions and flooring and painting. The cost of materials will be shared by participating teams.

The Shalom Methodist Church in Chihuahua, Mexico, is a young spirit-filled congregation just three years old. Assistance in finishing the struc-

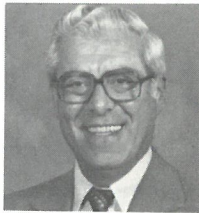
Members of Trinity are invited to encourage qualified persons they know to submit a resume for consideration, or if they are personally interested and meet the requirements to submit their own application.

The Seven Last Words of the Church, we are told, are "We've never done it that way before." Beyond a doubt, many traditions are clung to long after they have served their purpose. They deserve a decent burial if for no other reason than to make an opportunity for a new approach. Change can be exciting and refreshing.

There are traditions, however, that are well worth maintaining. I speak of those that meet particular needs so well that replacing them with something new would be to risk meeting those needs far less effectively. One such tradition that comes to mind is Trinity's Holy Week Breakfasts and Matins.

Does anyone know just when this tradition had its birth? I got to thinking about this the other day as I chatted with a member of St. Paul's United Methodist Church just prior to speaking at one of their Lenten devotion/breakfast services. He didn't know when their tradition began, but guessed that it was brought to the new congregation from Trinity when St. Paul's was founded by a group of Trinity members with Trinity's blessing and full support.

Year after year Trinity folk in all age categories have gathered Monday through Thursday mornings of Holy Week for this event. Adult Sunday school classes prepare wonderful breakfasts which feed our bodies. Lay persons, carefully selected by the planning committee, prepare wonderful devotionals which feed our souls. The fellowship, the food, the signing of favorite hymns, the inspiration of a fellow-member's faith so beautifully articulated that our faith is enlarged and strengthened by this radiant witness—all of this adds up to a golden hour each of these four days. It is no wonder that this is a Trinity tradition with a long history and a certain future.

Trinity Travelers Notes

On March 14 a group of Trinity Travelers will go to Thomasville to spend the day visiting historic sites. Following a stop at the Thomasville Historical Society the group will visit Lapham-Patterson House and Pebble Hill Plantation.

Lunch will be at the Neel House. At this writing a very few places are available to join the trip. The cost is \$26.

There is still room to join the trip to Callaway Gardens scheduled for April 2-4. On the itinerary are tours of Columbus, the Little White House at Warm Springs, and historic homes of Eufaula, Alabama, as well as ample time to enjoy the gardens. Included in the \$230 cost are the bus fare, accommodations at the Callaway Inn, admissions and tour guides, baggage handling and two breakfasts and two dinners.

A few spaces are still open for the June 27 departure for the Canadian Rockies. Following a flight to Seattle, the group will join Johansen Tours for a 12-day bus tour of sites in the Rockies, including Glacier National Park, Calgary, Banff, Lake Louise, and Jasper. Completing the trip will be a tour of Vancouver, Expo 86, and Victoria. The \$2101 cost covers air and bus fare, all hotel accommodations, admissions, two meals a day and gratuities.

Statement Against Lottery and Gambling

The people of the State of Florida face one of the gravest perils in their history in the issue of a state supported lottery. Implicit in this well camouflaged threat is the even more tragic possibility of moving toward the legalization of casino gambling as a normal additional development. If, in fact, this tragedy should occur, widespread organized gambling would bring in its wake all of its attendant destructive evils, and the tragedy would be compounded.

In areas where legalized gambling has prevailed, the social and moral climate has suffered, crime and poverty have increased and the interests of good government have been imperiled. Gambling, in any form, is a diabolical expression of the age-old "something for nothing" syndrome. As such, it runs absolutely contrary to that clearly established axiom of human experience which contends that the rewards and successes of life do not come easily or without a price; rather are they bought with hard work and willing sacrifice.

Let us, therefore, face up to the fact that if public education in our state is going to be upgraded (and so it must be), that blessing will not be handed to us "for free" on a silver platter by either a state lottery or any other form of gambling; it will happen only when we are willing to pay the price demanded of us.

I implore the good people of this great state to rise to answer the threat of a way of life that endangers morality, destroys one's sense of values, corrupts good government and in general acts as a deadly enemy to the human spirit. Let us close the door to a state lottery and thereby retard the progress of the gambling interests toward a takeover of the State of Florida.

Trinity was among many area churches represented at the announcement luncheon of the North Florida Billy Graham Crusade in December.

Senior Minister Walter Kalaf, Associate Minister John Quigley and Jim Nash, Evangelism Commission representative, were among several hundred church members and ministers attending the luncheon.

The message was delivered by the Rev. Cliff Barrows, director of programming for the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association and a familiar

face to millions of viewers of Graham broadcasts over the years. He also led the large Civic Center audience in "O Come All Ye Faithful."

The Tallahassee visit, scheduled for November 2-9, is only one of four Graham crusades scheduled this year. The others will be in Washington, D. C., and in Amsterdam and Paris.

According to Rev. Barrows, the three purposes of the crusade are "to offer a united witness to the community, to make a frontal attack against lethargy affecting Christendom, and to present the good news of the gospel of Jesus Christ."

"The men and women who do the needlework also will receive a great deal of satisfaction and pleasure in the accomplishment of work to God's glory that will last several generations."

Trinity Members Gave Generously in 1985

A yearend financial report shows Trinity members to be generous in their giving to missional causes and in support of the ministry of the United Methodist Church.

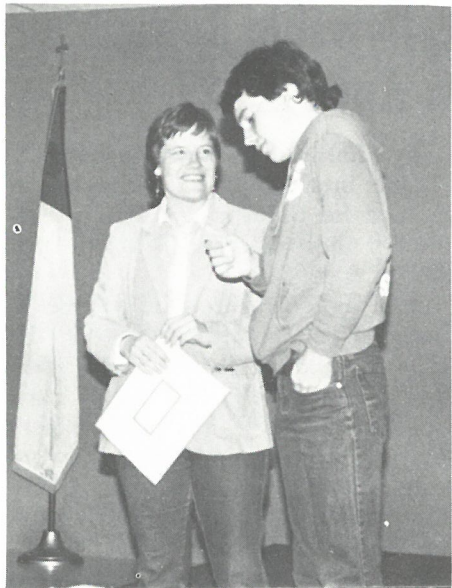
Paid out for these causes in 1985 was a total of \$129,704.52.

Apportionments assigned by the General and Florida Conferences were paid in full and accounted for \$76,700 of the total. Largest single apportionment was \$27,552 for world service and conference benevolences.

Another \$35,082.37 was given toward the church development financial campaign, Christian education, cooperative ministry of the Tallahassee District, and the Wesley Foundation.

Designated gifts, including such items as UMCOR Advance Special, World Advance Special, the Children's Home, One Great Hour of Sharing, Scarritt Graduate School and Vashti, totaled \$17,922.15.

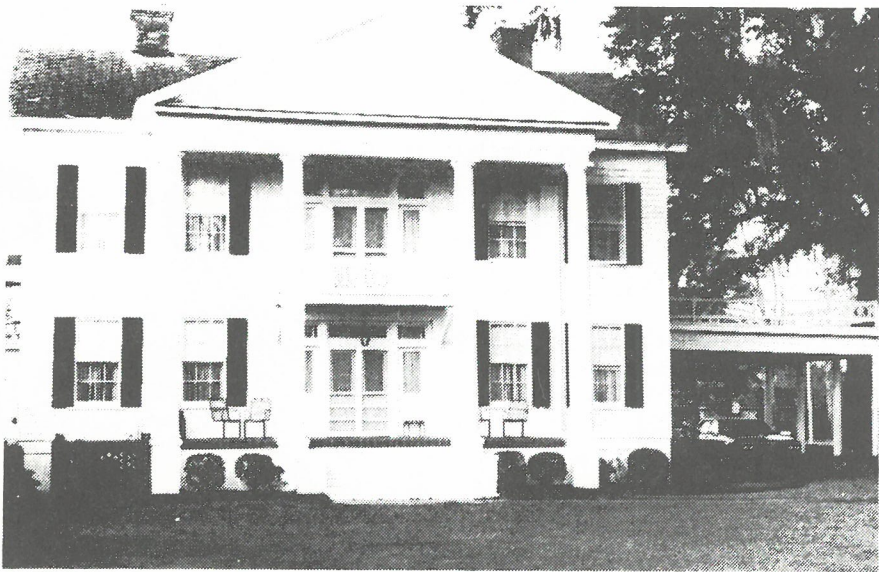
Cary and I love all of our Trinity friends and will continue to pray for growth and renewal that have characterized Trinity's people in the past year."

QUINCY, Fla.—The parsonage of Centenary United Methodist in Quincy, Fla., is believed to be the only United Methodist parsonage on the National Register of Historic Places. The house was built in the 1840s with slave labor and was the site of the formation of the Ladies' Aid Society, a predecessor organization of United Methodist Women, says Bette Shafer, who now lives in the house.

QUINCY, Fla.—Pastors and pastors' families at Centenary United Methodist Church have lived in a parsonage with U.S.-certified credentials since 1973.

That's when the pre-Civil War mansion, known as "The White House of Quincy," was placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

The rambling, five-bedroom house, with its formal living and dining rooms, and entry way that extends the full length of the house, is believed to be the only United Methodist parsonage on the National Register, says Gregory Strong, a research assistant with the General Commission on Archives and History.

"We have over 100 shrines and landmarks, but I'm not aware of any parsonage being recognized," he said.

Built in 1840 with slave labor, the house is a colonial-style southern mansion—one of few remaining authentic

antebellum homes left in North Florida, says Bette Shafer who now lives in the home with her husband, the Rev. Carl Shafer, pastor of Centenary UMC.

The 775-member church, which adjoins the property, purchased the home from the estate of Judge P. W. White in 1921 for \$15,000. Since then, the White House of Quincy has been home to 19 parsonage families.

Typical of its antebellum architecture, the house has identical entrances on the north and the south sides, massive Doric columns on each side and balconies that open from either end of the upstairs hall, she said.

Since the house was built in a time when kitchens did not adjoin the "main" house, a kitchen had to be added to the house, Mrs. Shafer explained.

The house, with its 12-foot ceilings, has periodically been updated with central air conditioning, heating and plumbing, she added.
