Going on Vacation? Don't Forget UM Children's Home

How would you like to have only five paydays per year? That is basically the situation of the Florida United Methodist Children's Home at Enterprise, Florida. Fifty percent of the budget is given by the 775 Florida Conference churches through Fifth Sunday and Christmas Sunday offerings.

This could be a difficult year as some of the five designated Sundays are at "bad" times. The upcoming one, on July 31, like the last one, Memorial Day weekend, will be at a time when many people are on vacation and not in church. It would be very easy to let the plans for a vacation overshadow the needs of the Children's Home. There is presently a waiting list of almost fifty children, who can be taken in only when the budget permits.

The home started in 1908 as an orphanage. Today the home rarely cares for true orphans but ministers to children who lack care, bonding, emotional support, nurturing, and growth opportunities. The Children's Home has had a positive impact on thousands of lives, and is helping troubled children turn their lives into something beautiful. Effective Christian influence on these young lives enables their acceptance of God's love and care, and a desire to be responsible and productive citizens.

The Conference goal is \$5.50 per member for 1988. Trinity's contributions per member for 1986 amounted to \$3.52 per member and this dropped to \$3.16 for 1987. If you will not be in church on July 31, you may mail your check (marked for the Florida United Methodist Children's Home) to the church office.

Fourteen Trinity youth and six adults will travel to Iaeger in McDowell County, West Virginia, July 30-August 8 to participate in the Appalachia Service Project.

They will provide volunteer labor to make substantial home repairs of economically disadvantaged families in Appalachia. The Appalachia Service Project is a home repair project affiliated with the Board of Discipleship of the United Methodist Church.

Several veteran youth are participating in the project again this year. Karen Levy, Robert Lumsden, Noel Nash, Suzanne Davis, Nelson Bennett and Jeff Young went to Dungannon, Virginia, last year and all will be going to Iaeger, West Virginia, this year.

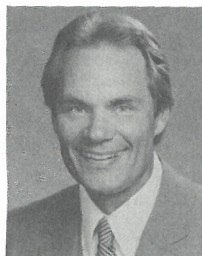

Notes from the Library

Five well-known modern-day women writers are represented in the Library by a number of books by each one. Each writer has her own way of expressing her religious beliefs and each is interesting to read.

Two touching books by Dale Evans Rogers (the actress-singer wife of Roy Rogers) are *Dearest Debbie: In Ai Lee* and *Hear the Children Crying, the Child Abuse Epidemic*. Also available are *My Spiritual Diary* and *The Woman at the Well*. Her writings reveal an unexpectedly religious side.

The late Catherine Marshall, widow of the famed Peter Marshall, was a prolific writer. *A Man Called Peter* and *The Best of Peter Marshall* are probably her best known works. Among others are *Beyond Ourselves*; *Christy; to Live Again*; *My Personal Prayer Diary*; and *Something More*.

Eugenia Price has had her own radio series, was a columnist and a lecturer, as well as writing religious books. *The Burden of Light* tells of her life before and after her conversion and stresses the importance of Christ in her life. Other books include *Beloved World*; *God Speaks to Women Today*; *Woman to Woman*; and *Share my Pleasant Stones*.

Georgia Harkness is a name well-known to all readers of religious publications. She was an ordained Methodist minister and later became professor emeritus of applied theology at the Pacific School of Religion, Berkeley, Calif. A few of her books are *The Methodist Church in Social Thought and Action*, *a Summary*; *Understanding Christian Faith*; *Christian Ethics*; *Be Still and Knock*; and *The Modern Rival of Christian Faith*. Others are available in the Library.

Marjorie Holmes is a writer "unparalleled in her ability to make religious history come alive on the page." Her *Two from Galilee* tells the story of Mary, Joseph and the birth of Jesus; in *Three from Galilee* she recreates the life of Jesus between the ages of 12 and 30; and in *The Messiah* she deals with Jesus's ministry to his crucifixion. These are all 1980 books. Other books by her are: *You and I and Yesterday*; *Who Am I, God?*; and *I've Got to Talk to Somebody, God*.

Come in and renew your acquaintance with these outstanding women writers of our time.

Report on Annual Conference

As your delegates prepared to participate in the 1988 Florida Annual Conference, which was held in Lakeland May 23-26, we were mindful that much to which we had become accustomed was drawing to a close. We had just faced up to the fact our senior minister was really retiring; we were pondering the implications of the pending assignment of our associate minister to another charge, and we knew that our director of Christian education was being married and would leave Florida.

Over and above these concerns at the local level, we knew that all across Methodism the work of a quadrennium was coming to a close; and, with that closing, we knew that the eligibility of our bishop, Dr. Earl G. Hunt, Jr., who has demonstrated sensitive understanding of and concern for Trinity, to preside over the Florida Annual Conference would terminate. Truly, an era was in its final days.

While we were inclined to think of these endings, once the sessions opened we found that the Florida Annual Conference, which was organized at Trinity in Tallahassee 145 years ago, is alive and well. In his state of the church address opening night, Bishop Hunt reminded us that as "... the first heaven and the first earth were passed away ... he that sat upon the throne said, Behold, I make all things new." (Revelation 21:1,5 KJV), so it is with the United Methodist Church, the Florida Annual Conference and with Trinity as together we face new beginnings which give great promise — both to the church and to a needy world.

We learned that in 1987, the last full year in the term of our resident bishop, prudent management of fiscal affairs over a quadrennium had eliminated a substantial deficit which had been permitted to develop over a period of years. The \$14 million budget adopted by the conference contains provision of a half million dollars toward the building of a reserve fund needed to attain full fiscal responsibility. During 1987 membership increased overall in Florida. This increase extended to 10 of the 14 districts. Additionally, there was a modest increase in church school enrollment.

A new episcopal leader for the Florida Annual Conference will be elected in July at the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference at Lake Junaluska, with Dolores Jackson of Trinity and our district superintendent, the Reverend Mrs. Charlene Kammerer, participating in the selection. The new bishop will come to preside over the second largest district in Methodism and take up residence in the newly completed episcopal residence in Lakeland.

The chairman of the Florida delegation to the General Conference, which was held earlier this spring in St. Louis, reported on the new thrusts of the general church. He reported that the new hymnal was accepted by the delegates to the General Conference with great enthusiasm. One of the bonuses of attendance at this Annual Conference was receiving a "sampler" of the new hymnal which is scheduled for distribution by the close of 1989. He also reported on the new African initiative which will include the development of a Methodist University in Africa, with \$10 million to be included over the quadrennium in the apportionment to the churches and a like amount to be raised as specials.

The General Conference clarified the role of the lay leader, and it took action which will require each church to have a unit of United Methodist Men which will emphasize ministry, not just fellowship. On the 250th anniversary of the Aldersgate experience of John Wesley, the general church is alive and well.

Trinity People Involved

For delegates from Trinity the 1988 Annual Conference was a special time. In addition to the two of us who were elected as your delegates, Dolores Jackson was a delegate by virtue of her office as district lay leader and Charlotte Blee served as a delegate at large from the Tallahassee District. These were in addition to our clergy delegates, Dr. Walter Kalaf and Clarke Evans, and to Barbara Shores and Cynthia Wendel. To all of us, the memorial service of clergy and clergy wives was particularly meaningful because our own Dr. George Foster was among those memorialized and because Mrs. Aultie Foster and daughter Julia were in

attendance.

Of great interest to all of us was the honoring of ministers retiring from active service. Along with Bishop Hunt, we honored Walter Kalaf and our former minister, Ed Norman, and their wives. A special highlight was the consecration of Barbara Shores as a diaconal minister at a moving worship service on Monday evening.

Even while we were observing the transition of our ministerial staff to their next stages in their careers, your delegates were able to establish meaningful contact with Trinity's new ministerial families—David and Cinda Hortin, Beth and Jim Fogel-Miller, and Linda Mobley. Thanks in large part to our connectional system and the sensitivity of our district superintendent and the bishop, Trinity faces the future with a talented and responsive ministerial staff. Trinity United Methodist Church, not unlike the general church and the Florida Conference, faces the future with renewed strength and vigor.

Conference Issues

Business of the conference included consideration of resolutions concerning a Central American peace plan, the sale of "X" and "R" rated video materials to minors, family unit, and Immigration and Reform Act, and being Christian on the highways. The conference also approved the sale of Camp Florida, the present children's camp which is on a site which now finds itself in an urban setting. Proceeds from the sale are to go for the development of children's camping facilities on the present Leesburg camp property. A special offering was taken, to which Trinity contributed generously, that will be used in part for conference camps and in part for churches in crisis.

Each delegate to Annual Conference is a vital contributor to the connectional process of our church, and is therefore both privileged and obligated. The delegate is obliged to study the issues and vote responsibly; privileged to be inspired by worship opportunities and the involvement with able people of high Christian character. Whether or not there is a controversy coming before the body, Annual Conference is an awe-inspiring and challenging place to be.

What we are able to tell you in a report such as this are just highlights of a full and inspiring week. If you want to hear more, ask anyone who attended and you will find willing informants.

As for us, we like to think that the promise, "Behold, I make all things new," again extends to us and Trinity United Methodist Church which afforded us this enriching opportunity.

Cindy Wendel Travels Europe As Choral Assistant

Cindy Wendel, director of music, will be travelling throughout Europe as a choral assistant with the United Methodist Festival Choir June 26-July 13. This choir consists of youth ages 16-24 from across the country who sing, ring handbells and participate in liturgical dance.

She is travelling with other United Methodist youth and staff persons to East Germany, West Germany, Austria, Switzerland and France where they will perform concerts, do sight-seeing, and share in the message of the Gospel with people in the free world and, for a few days, in a "not so free" world.

The leaders of the tour include: Judy Loehr, musical director; Allen Pote, guest conductor/composer; Jim and Diedre Kriewald, coordinators from Wesley seminary; Dan Stokes, organist/handbells; Rosalie Branigan, liturgical dance.

Eight concerts will be given, seven in Europe and one in First United Methodist Church in Winchester, VA.

The group will visit Frankfurt, West Germany; Eisenach, birthplace of Bach and Wartburg Castle, where Luther hid and translated the New Testament, in East Germany; Weimar, Halle, where Bach played the organ and Handel was born; Leipzig, birthplace of Wagner and where Bach spent 27 years as cantor of St. Thomas church (the chorale will sing a concert at this church); Nürnberg, West Germany; Vienna; the Danube River Valley, Salzburg, and Innsbruck, Austria; Lichtenstein, a tiny, beautiful country in the mountains; Switzerland, and France.

Robert Lamison Will Help Build Houses

Dear Friend:

Food, clothing and shelter are considered the basic necessities of life. To humanity's shame and sorrow, billions of people, yes billions, throughout the world lack one or more of these basic needs.

Habitat for Humanity International is an organization based in Americus, Georgia, and founded on Christian principles to provide shelter for the homeless throughout the world. It has affiliated organizations in every state and in many cities in the United States. It also sponsors projects in at least 24 foreign countries. Over 90 percent of all funds contributed to it goes directly toward constructing homes for those in need.

This summer, Habitat for Humanity International is conducting a "House Raising Walk" beginning in Portland, Maine, on June 22 and terminating in Atlanta, Georgia, on September 14. During this 1200-mile walk it hopes to raise \$1,200,000 and construct at least 120 houses. Each house constructed by volunteer labor and often contributed materials will then be sold to a needy family at cost with a no interest mortgage. The income received from these mortgages will then be used to construct additional

houses. The families receiving these houses are required to assist in their construction for 300 hours and assist in the construction of a house for another needy family for 200 hours. Tallahassee Habitat for Humanity, an affiliated organization, has recently completed its eighth house and is expecting to complete two more this summer.

As my part in this "House Raising Walk" I am committed to assist in building houses in Baltimore, Md. during the week of July 24 and again in Atlanta, Ga. in September. I also hope to assist in constructing one of the houses in Tallahassee sometime in August.

I offer you the opportunity to participate with us in a partnership that shares the message of God's love in a concrete, tangible way. Please pledge an amount for each hour I hope to work (64). If you wish to send a check instead of a pledge, please make it out to Habitat for Humanity International, and note "WALK '88" at the bottom.
