
I believe that many of us share in an important relationship-that Myron Munday is the only person in our lives who every called us "Sug"--short for "Sugar," of course. And, it's been an honor to be among the many people Myron held dear.

Myron loved people and we loved him! Wherever he went, he endeared himself to all those whose lives he touched. As I have encountered people throughout the community in these years we've lived in Tallahassee, often my connection with Trinity United Methodist Church has become known. Time after time, the person I was talking with would brighten and say, "Oh, that's the church where Myron Munday is the organist!" Then, a glowing testimonial would follow on how Myron spread happiness and energy wherever his effervescent personality went.

Myron paved innumerable paths with good will. He wan an ambassador for Trinity Church and the other churches he had served. He was an ambassador for his Christian faith, which meant so much to him. And-just by being Myron--he was an ambassador for human relations as God intended human relations to be!

Myron was a "happening," but the

goodness and gift that was Myron Carl Munday didn't just happen. He spoke so often in praise of his mother and father, Willie and Alget Munday, and of the loving nurturing and guidance they gave him from his birth and for all his days on this earth. And, he expressed his appreciation for the devoted care

they gave him during his illness. We can only imagine the energy Myron must have exuded as a small child to believe that, for his parents, guiding Myron must have been, at times, a challenge. He loved his parents, his brothers, his extended family and spoke of them frequently with loving gratitude.

Myron was also grateful for his

many friends and he took care of his friendships. I want to acknowledge, on his behalf, those of you who have been special angels of God in your friendship with Myron. While it is true that ministering to Myron brought a return blessing, many of you went extra miles. He knew that and it touched his heart. Victoria Tettey, his dear friend who was like a sister, commented, "It was a privilege to be loved and trusted by him."

Myron Carl Munday was a man of faith with a great gift for music, in which he earned several academic degrees. There is a hymn in our hymnal that meant a lot to Myron because it put forth his deeply held beliefs about his music in its title: "When In My Music God Is Glorified." Myron, known by Trinity's children as "Mr. Music" before he was "Dr. Munday," brought all ages closer to God and the church through the way he presented music-his paramount motivation in his music ministry. If Myron enriched our worship experience through his music on this earth, just think of what he's doing in heaven!

Even as his body was failing him, Myron was optimistic about his health and he minimized his discomfort when you inquired. He might admit that his back was bothering him or that his legs were giving him some trouble; but, then, he would say, reassuringly, that he was doing fine.

Myron believed in God's promise of life through eternity and that brought him comfort in the seriousness of his illness. I know he mourned the coming separation • please see Myron on back page

To feed the hungry,


To release the prisoner,



We are firmly on the way to reaching the financial goals necessary to continue all of the ministries of Trinity, but we must continue our efforts to ensure that the needs of the church are met. As of Nov. 15, \$588,426 has been pledged to the Operating Budget pledge goal of \$720,000 and \$66,309 has been pledged to the Capital Improvement Budget goal of \$58,100. Although we have made good progress, we are still over \$100,000 short of the Operating Budget pledge goal and it will take support from all of us to reach the church's financial needs.

Heifer Project International

For five decades, Heifer Project International has helped people around the world become more self-reliant by providing gifts of animals and training in their care. Since 1944, continued support through churches and individuals has made it possible for HPI to provide food and income-producing animals to more than a million families in need. Within this ecumenical project, which is rooted in the Christian tradition, HPI joins with people of faith everywhere to work for the dignity and well-being of all of God's people. The Methodist church is the largest participant of the some 14 denominations involved.

The goal of all HPI projects is that each recipient must pass on offspring of the farm animals they receive to others in need, which will help to alleviate hunger and poverty in countries around the globe. The principle, called "passing the gift," assures that each participant in the program becomes a donor to others. Passing on the gift also heightens the prospect for the project to become self-sustaining. HPI's "ark" has grown from a few heifers to more than 20 types of animals, from yaks and dairy goats to llamas and geese.

The first animals given by HPI were 17 heifers sent to families in Puerto Rico in 1944. Their malnourished children had never before tasted cow's milk. Today, families and communities in approximately 110 countries and 35 states are leading self-reliant lives as a result of support for HPI projects.

Volunteer to make a difference. Ever since Abraham decided to leave Ur, God has relied on volunteers to get important tasks done. Each year, hundreds of people join this long tradition and volunteer with HPI. Volunteer service can be one of the most rewarding commitments you make this year. Skip a Meal Program

Members of the Church and Society Work Area agreed at its October meeting to participate in the area-wide Skip a Meal program to benefit the Food Bank.

We learned, for instance, that despite the highly successful Meals on Wheels program, more than three thousand elderly citizens here in Leon County do not have enough food to eat each month. Meager social security checks force seniors and others living at or below the poverty line to choose among shelter, electricity, medical care and food.

Cooperating churches in this area include Calvary Presbyterian, Evangelical Assembly of God, First Assembly of God, Grace Lutheran, Haywood Cate Baptist, John Wesley United Methodist and St. John Episcopal.


