# Several new employees join Trinity's staff

The Staff/Parish Relations Committee announces the employment of a youth director and HEG coordinator replacing Melinda Ensley and Christine Moody, respectively, and a part-time coordinator of adult singles, a new position.

Mike Tamborello of Houston, Texas, will assume the full-time youth position the second week of June. He is a 1994 graduate of Florida State University where he received a BA degree in theatre. He served on the Wesley Foundation Upper Room staff there for two years and coordinated the Wesley drama group, His Majesty's Players.

Last summer he was a youth intern at First United Methodist Church of Clermont where he led Bible studies and programs and helped plan summer events. During his senior year he worked with middle school students at Killearn UMC and coordinated their drama group. On May 31 he finishes his most recent work with the A.D. Players, a professional Christian theatre company.

Kim Kerce, who served as interim youth director after Melinda Ensley returned to graduate school in February, begins a new part-time position as coordinator of single adults. The position has been included in Trinity's budget for the past four or five years but has never been filled.

A native of Tallahassee who grew up in Trinity, he is the son of Lum and Nancy Kerce. He received a BS degree in secondary education from Toccoa Falls College, Toccoa, GA, in Dec. 1991. He taught two years at North Florida Christian where he also was assistant baseball coach, and one year at Brookwood School in Thomasville where he taught middle school classes, was head baseball coach and assistant football coach.

He is the father of four-year-old twin sons Jamey and Justin.

The new HEO coordinator, Ann G. Miller, became a member of Trinity in June, 1991. On June 1, she will begin ministering

to Trinity's elderly shut-ins, bereaved and others in need that Christine Moody has served for the past four years.

Mrs. Miller was manager and administrative assistant in the Governor's Mansion for three years until Dec. 1994, where she coordinated the mansion staff, planned menus, assisted the Docent program and made appointments for the First Family.

She has a background of volunteer service, including 21 years in the Lakeland Junior League. She has most recently been a volunteer at Tallahassee Museum of Science and History and with the one-year-old Sunday school at Trinity.

Stephen White, a graduate in music education of Michigan State University, with a master of music degree from Northwestern University, recently became associate organist. He is currently enrolled in the Doctor of Philosophy in Music Education program at Florida State University.

He has had public school teaching experience, and was director of music/organist at Maple UMC, Battle Creek, MI, associate organist/director of music at First UMC, Evanston, IL, and associate organist at St. Paul's Episcopal, Flint, MI. He was principal organist for West Michigan Annual Conference UMC from 1989 through 1991.

The Staff/Parish Relations Committee is completing interviews for another part-time new position as communications coordinator. That person will handle promotion—and public relations for the church and serve as editor of the *Monthly Tidings*.

These new employees, as well as new Associate Minister John Fletcher, will be welcomed at a reception following 11 a.m. worship on Sunday, June 18, in Moor Hall. Members are urged to come get acquainted with these new staff members.

# Dr. Hortin continues as senior minister; Rev. John Fletcher will be associate

Dr. David Hortin is being assigned as senior minister at Trinity for his eighth year June 15, and the Rev. John M. Fletcher, who retired in 1993 as senior minister at Tallahassee's St. Paul's UMC, has agreed to serve as associate minister here for one year.

Associate Minister David Hodges will become minister of First United Methodist Church of Monticello. He has served Trinity since June 1991.

Rev. Fletcher is a graduate of Candler School of Theology and since 1953 has served as minister of Riverview UMC in Jacksonville; St. Andrews, Ft. Lauderdale; Goss Memorial, Orlando; Centenary, Quincy; Lakewood, St. Petersburg; First, West Palm Beach; and St. Paul's Tallahassee

He and his wife Helen continued to live in Tallahassee after his retirement. They have attended worship at Trinity and are members of the Disciple Sunday School Class that meets in the Congregate Room.

Chairman Jim Ashlock of the Staff/ Parish Relations Committee, while announcing these appointments to the congregation during morning worship last month, said a shortage of new ministers and a large number of retiring ministers this year caused the Bishop to ask Rev. Fletcher to come out of retirement one year to serve at Trinity. He expressed appreciation for his willingness to serve as Trinity's associate.

"There's within my heart a melody
Jesus whispers sweet and low,
Fear not, I am with thee, peace, be still,
In all of life's ebb and flow.

Jesus, Jesus, Jesus, Sweetest name I know, Fills my every longing, Keeps me singing as I go."

As you read all of the stanzas, it is obvious that it is not a children's song. But, Brother Mathis knew that we would not be children long and that we would need a faith to sustain us in the trials of life. Across these many years, whenever I have hummed, whistled or sung that song, it has encouraged and uplifted me.

So, as the children of Trinity Church gather this month for Vacation Bible School, we have the opportunity to enrich their minds and spirits with Scripture, song and story that will sustain them all their lives.

# Trinity members recognized for community service

A record number of Trinity members were honored at the 1995 Volunteers of the Year Awards Luncheon May 12 at the Civic Center, two winning top awards in their service categories.

Waldie Anderson was tops among three finalists nominated in the Arts category. He was co-founder and director of the Big Bend Community Orchestra, an all-volunteer group of teenagers to retirees who play music for enjoyment. Encouraging participation in music, he invites parents to bring children to the concerts and on stage to witness the performances of the final number.

Donna Legare, co-owner with her husband of Native Nurseries, was top winner in the Business category. She has worked with elementary schools by providing expertise and materials for hands-on opportunities in nature and environmental studies. She helped students at Kate Sullivan to start a butterfly garden and a long-leaf pine reforestation. She also provided consultation to Griffin Middle School and Kate Sullivan Elementary.

Among finalists was Milt Bauguess, also in the Business category, for volunteer work with an immunization program for children, with ECHO and as a trustee for the Chamber of Commerce.

Robert Lamison, nominated by Trinity Lay Leader Liz Smith, was a finalist in the Religion category. He was recognized for building cabinets for Trinity's music department, for work in refurbishing Centenary Camp near Quincy, and for his work with the Coalition for the Homeless and Habitat for Humanity.

Tallahassee Memorial Regional Medical Center Auxiliary, represented by Trinity member and hospital administrator, Duncan Moore, was a finalist in the Organization category.

Several other Trinity members were nominated for recognition at the awards luncheon, including Grace Fisher, Ruth McDonald, Benson Skelton and Bob Yates in the Civic Services category; Brooks Pettit, Education category; Marti Chumbler, Social Services category; Tallahassee Memorial Regional Medical Center, represented by Duncan Moore, in the Business category.

Two other Trinity members were honored by the Tallahassee Area Chamber of Commerce April 27 at an awards program in the Civic Center. Carrol Dadisman, publisher of the Tallahassee Democrat, received the Distinguished Leader of the Year award

# Camp Centenary--a resource for district churches

Camp Centenary is a summer camp for use by members of United Methodist churches in the Tallahassee District. The Rev. Rich Wilson is the camp director and welcomes all the help he can get. If anyone is interested in assisting the work at the camp or scheduling its use, Rev. Rich can be reached at his church office telephone number 627-9226, or his home, 875-1904. The camp telephone number is 856-5601.

The camp is about five miles beyond Gretna off Route 90 and consists of 38 acres. The camp opens June 11 and runs through the end of July. A "Love at Work" Mission Camp is scheduled each week end for a month after the camp closes.

There are two dormitories, one for men and one for women, accommodating a

total of 60 to 70 people. Last year Trinity volunteers remodeled the kitchen and painted the exterior. Trinity also donated \$3,000 for new mattresses and the Missions Work Area is recruiting volunteers to work Saturdays before the camp opens.

A central air-conditioned commons building includes the kitchen and a multi-purpose center for dining, recreation, religious services and meetings. It also has a swimming pool with a new bath house. Future plans include a dorm to accommodate couples, to be built by Volunteers in Missions from another UMC church.

The Tallahassee North Side Rotary Club has adopted the camp as a service project and Killearn UMC youth used the camp while working on homes in Gretna. Trinity youth are planning a similar project.

During a midweek Bible study class one night in the fall of 1973, the Rev. Edward Norman, senior pastor at Trinity, was telling the group about all the activities planned leading up to Trinity's 150th birthday celebration on April 21, 1974. "We need a newspaper," I said. The idea was quickly accepted, and developing a paper to communicate with Trinity's then 2500 members became a goal of the Administrative Board for 1974.

Vol. 1, No. 1 of the *Monthly Tidings* was published in January 1974. At first, Gene Morse assisted me as associate editor until he moved away. Then in September 1980, Dean Bunch, already a busy lawyer, began serving as editor, continuing through the July 1981 issue. I have continued as editor since then.

With this June issue, I complete 20 years as the church's volunteer editor. Trinity is adding a communications coordinator as a member of the staff, who will give the editorship new energy and direction. The coordinator will also publicize the church's program and ministry in the community so that newcomers will be attracted to Trinity. You can help by enthusiastically supporting and assisting the new editor's efforts.

I have been blessed to have had an opportunity to "publish the glad tidings" of Christ's church. Thank you, Trinity members, for affording me that privilege.
