Tallahassee Boys' Choir to Perform at Trinity

February is observed in the United Methodist Church as Black History Month. This year at Trinity it will be observed with a church-wide dinner and a concert by the Tallahassee Boys' Choir on Tuesday, February 6. The event is

being planned and spon-

sored jointly by the United Methodist Women and the work area on Religion and Race.

The Boys' Choir was featured last November in the Tallahassee Democrat article "From Boys to Men" and it is now in demand by churches and civic organizations. As a youth outreach project of the FSU School of Social Work, the choir

was established to offer constructive activities for middle and high school-aged students in several southeastern Tallahassee neighborhoods.

The choir program is designed to prevent juvenile crime by providing positive alternate activities through music. The director of the choir is Earle Lee, Jr., who

has a Bachelor of Music Education and a Master of Social Work degrees from FSU. He recruits young men, inspires them, teaches them and accepts no excuses for less than their best.

If you decide to come to the concert, be prepared to be moved by the performance. In the words of FSU Dean Dianne Montgomery, "If you are not inspired

> by watching these kids, check your pulse."

Reservations are required for the dinner which will be served at 6:00 p.m. in Moor Hall. Dinner reservations need to be made by Friday, February 2 by calling 222-1120. If child care is needed, those needs should be made known at the time dinner reservations are made. Dinner will cost \$4.00.

If you are coming only to hear the choir, be in Moor Hall by 7:00 p.m. No reservations are necessary for the concert. There will be no charge for the concert but an offering will be taken to help finance the choir's participation with the Columbia Boys' Choir in Montreal next May.

It is going to be the year of the wedding," Nancyanne Carothers said. She should know because she schedules the weddings at Trinity Church. When I put

all of them in my 1996 date book, there were twenty-two of them. Not that that is a record for me - in Clearwater one year, I had forty-five weddings. One summer in Lakeland, I had twenty-one weddings in thirteen weeks. The total for Trinity will undoubtedly increase if we have twenty-two scheduled by the first week in January.

"They're singing songs of love," as the old song said. There is romance in the air. I like to ask people who are celebrating their fiftieth anniversary, "How did you meet?" There are some interesting and charming stories in answer to that question. Hopefully, children ask that question of their parents and grandparents. If they don't ask, tell them anyway.

As a student at McKendree College in Lebanon, Illinois, my father, Paul Hortin, saw a notice on a bulletin board that counselors were needed at a Rotary boys' camp in northern Illinois. When he arrived there to work for the summer, he first saw a young man nailing a canvas tent down to a wooden floor. In the con-

versation that followed, the "big Swede," as my father referred to him, said, "You ought to see that Nelson girl over at the Fresh Air Camp." Apparently, the lake between the two camps was not an insurmountable barrier. My father did meet Dorothy Nelson, and romance bloomed.

Several year later, when my mother had finished a Masters Degree in Religious Education at Northwestern and my father had finished most of his seminary work at Garrett Biblical Institute, they were joined in marriage by Dr. Ernest Fremont Tittle of First Methodist Church of Evanston, Ill.

HEO 1995 Annual Report

Nineteen ninety-six sped by faster than I'd like to remember; 1996 hovers full of new challenges for HEO at trinity to meet. The first challenge is to exceed the excellent job done by the volunteers this past year.

We are excited to give the following information of the services provided by HEO in 1995:

- 987 home visits were made by our volunteers and coordinators to members of our congregation living along, homebound or those with special needs.
- From the HEO office—810 items of correspondence were sent to families and individuals. The items included sympathy notes, birthday cards, get-well and congratulations cards. 386 phone contacts were made in connection with service for or about our members. 17 families were given brown bags of groceries. This food is purchased from the Second Harvest Food Bank at a discount and is also used (when available) for meals prepared at Trinity for The Shelter. Distributed 12 pieces of health care equipment. 94 office contacts to share resources and make referrals. \$2,530.02 was given out from the crisis fund to help with living and medical expenses for those who were in need.
- 119 *Upper Rooms* were distributed to homebound persons. 7 large print hymnals were given to members by request.
- •15 requests for transportation were provided and 58 people received flowers that had been on the altar.
- 5 receptions for family and friends following funeral services were planned. Food for a family was provided after a funeral service.
- From July to November, 56 faithful followers attended "Lunch Bunch."
- HEO is represented on the boards of Faith Counseling and Church and Society. 18 adults are participating in "Pray Partners" with the Youth Department.
- HEO and Adult Fellowship sent two members to the Governor's Seminar, sponsored by the State of Florida Elder Care Agency and initiated a shuttle from the parking lot to the front of the church • please see HEO on back page.
