It'll Be a Grand Celebration of 175 Years' Service

rinity United Methodist Church has reached an unparalleled mile stone: 175 years of Christian service to the Tallahassee area. This anniversary is unmatched by any church in the city. So of course a celebration is in order, one grand enough to suit the auspicious occasion. On Sunday, Sept. 26, the entire congregation is invited to take part in festive morning activities and join for one large worship service, the 175th Worship Celebration.

The theme for the day is "An Old Church on Fire With New Ideas." Subcommittee members have been busy planning a memorable event for the past four months, under the oversight of the 175th Anniversary Committee, which has planned the entire year's commemorative activities. Subcommittee chairperson Beverly Burleson said Sept. 26 events were planned with specific goals in mind. "We've sought to create a range of activities that everyone will find enjoyable and interesting, and we want to make the morning fun within the historic context," she said. "And of course the events must support the focus of the day, which is the combined worship celebration."

10:45 a.m.* - Noon 175th Worship Celebration (Sanctuary)

*Note: There will be no 8:30 a.m. or 9:45 a.m. services on Sunday, Sept. 26.

"The idea behind having one combined service is to allow everyone to gather together for a joyous celebration befitting the occasion," said Rev.

John Willis. "We're reminding everyone again and again because we want to make sure no one shows up for one of the earlier services and is disappointed.

"But let me emphasize this," Rev. Willis continued. "Your real risk of disappointment is if you don't attend the 175th Celebration. Our committee members have done a lovely job of putting together a fun, memorable event and

In preparation for this great event, I asked Vernon and Jamie Parramore to show me around the Church Archives. The Parramores are in charge of the preservation of our church's history.

As a part of this tour, Vernon showed me a very old and tattered book that said "Church Register 1856-1877." This was passed down from R.A. Gray, member of Trinity and Secretary of State, to Frank Moor. As I looked through these church records with exquisite handwriting, I noticed that certain pages had graffiti written on them. It appeared to be the writing of someone very young--almost like a child would mark a book. But, it became obvious that this was someone a little bit older.

The writer started out in a very timid manner and, then, got bolder and bolder as he proceeded. This unknown person, who kept referring to a certain woman, finally concluded his writing with the following poem:



About Miss Ruth Hightower

There was a fair maiden A fair maiden still is she. I love her now and always will. She had my heart and has it still.

I dare not tell her name Because I love her so, Because you mite, love her the same, But I'd still love her tho.

Ruth Hightower is her name, The prettiest name, you see This old world Will ever see.

Our eyes have met Our lips not yet, But don't you worry, I'll get her yet.

We have no idea who Miss Hightower was, who wrote this, or exactly when it was written.


The folks who might have known are now deceased. This is all we know about the author of these lines in our church history.

Why Join the Adult Choir? Let Mark Repasky Recite Some Reasons

Reasons #1 & 2

Volunteer church choirs typically consist of singers with varied music abilities. Our choir ranges from professionally trained singers to relatively inexperienced singers. We are a "team sport," however, and every choir member is important and appreciated. Less experienced singers can improve considerably over time by singing with the professionally trained singers. Every Sunday morning, we sink or swim together! Also, choral sound is a considerable improvement over the sound produced by individual singers in the choir. We tend to hide one another's weaknesses. If you join the choir and feel you are not ready to sing on Sundays for a few weeks, that is perfectly OK; just tell the music director. If your music-reading skills are limited, be patient and you will improve. Sit next to a strong reader in the choir and stay with him/her as you sing. Most volunteer church choirs have at least a few singers who cannot read music. They have compensated over the years by developing very good ears and quick memories.

Reason #3

You rode bicycles as a child, but it has been at least 50 years since you have

even touched a bicycle. So what happens the first time you try riding a bicycle again? You are a bit nervous and wobble around quite a bit, but in a few minutes you are able to do it, though not as well as when you were a child. A few weeks of bicycling and you are an old hand at it once again! Singing is much like that ... if you sang in high school choirs, much of that ability will come back once you return to regular practice ... choir rehearsals!

Reason #4

Sure there is someone your age in the choir, or at least very close. We range in age from 20 to near 80. Some of us look older or younger than we really are.

Reason #5

This is the commitment part. It's hoped that you are already attending worship services on Sunday mornings, but an additional 25 minutes each Sunday is required of choir members to prepare prior to entering the 11 a.m. service. Weekly 90-minute rehearsals do add up over a year's time.

There is no simple solution to this; the ministry undertaken by the adult choir requires that we spend adequate time preparing for our leadership role in worship services and occasional concerts.

Reason #6

Don't wait for a personal invitation! Consider yourself invited and come to one of our rehearsals. I promise you will be noticed (even pampered) and we will enroll you in the group before the rehearsal is ended.

Reason #7

The church provides nursery for all Wednesday night rehearsals, almost all special rehearsals (usually about five per year) and all concerts.

There are many good reasons to join our adult choir; I'll mention just one more here:

On the week of your birthday, something special happens at choir rehearsal. Where else can you enjoy a personalized rendition of the "Happy Birthday Song" unlike any version you have ever heard?



NOW HERE'S A SIGHT YOU DON'T SEE EVERY DAY, a "cherry picker" in the Sanctuary. Properly called "an articulating boom lift," the hydraulic hoist is being used to paint the Sanctuary ceiling, part of ongoing church maintenance and an overall dressing up in preparation for the arrival of the new organ.

Chancel Being Readied for an Organ Soon En Route

'Turn your ear to the North, from whence cometh our pipes'

Trinity's long-awaited Casavant pipe organ will be en route to Tallahassee soon, and preparations continue at a brisk pace on either side of the Canadian-American border.

The organ now is fully constructed and completely assembled in the workshop of Casavant Freres in St.-Hyacinthe, Quebec. It has been in playable condition since the middle of August and has been undergoing nearly a month of regulating and testing to make sure all is well mechanically.

Here at Trinity, workers have poured a new concrete floor, part of the new, reinforced substructure of the Chancel to support both the new organ console and the imported Italian slate that will provide the new Chancel floor.

Casavant will begin dismantling and packing the organ on Sept. 13 in preparation for the cross-continental shipping. Tuesday, Oct. 5, is the scheduled arrival date at Trinity, although Trinity Organist Jim Lorenz emphasized that the actual delivery date could vary by a day or two either way.

When the organ arrives, the process of unloading into the Sanctuary is expected to be completed in one day. The real work will be the reassembling and tuning procedures, tasks that will involve several weeks of painstaking attention by Jim Lorenz, two representatives of the manufacturer and Dr. Michael Corzine, organist at First Presbyterian Church and Trinity's organ consultant.

"It's a time-consuming process to tune and adjust, or 'voice,' the pipes," Lorenz said. "We must adjust the opening of the mouth of each pipe so that each has the correct quality of sound."

The targeted first use of the new pipe organ is sometime during the first half of December. Watch for details regarding recitals and performances utilizing the new instrument.

Working with FSU International Center Trinity Missions Team Launches 'Backyard Missions' Project

Trinity has a wonderful opportunity for "back-yard missions" without ever leaving home: both to contribute to and benefit from the FSU International Student and Scholar Center (ISSC). FSU has over 750 international students and 200 research scholars, plus many of their families. Many return to positions of high-level leadership in their home countries, and many of their impressions and future attitudes toward the United States are shaped by their experiences here. They are also a "real life" information source about the rest of the world, giving a reality and an immediacy to their sharing.

Having a positive international experience benefits students and residents. In August, the Trinity Missions Team sponsored the lunch for the new international student orientation day, were invited to help host the "friends" information table, and volunteers met arriving students at the airport. Such opportunities are ongoing, and members of the Trinity congregation are invited to participate, either as a member of a Sunday School class or as an individual. Some suggestions are for assisting students, and some are to include students as resources. Contacts at ISSC for all of these activities are Mafe Brooks or Ruth Ann Nast at 644-1702.

To assist students/scholars:

- 1.) Join the "international friends" program to help new students get acquainted with Tallahassee, with grocery shopping, banking, and other daily needs to help them become functional and feel at home and welcome. Volunteers may continue to have friendly contact during the student's/scholar's stay and may learn more about the visitor's culture.
- 2.) Volunteer in the ISSC "English Conversation Club," which meets every fourth Tuesday from 10 a.m. -noon. You may do this on your own, or your Sunday School class may organize a group through ISSC and rotate class members' participation with the conversation club. International students are eager to improve their English, and this club is a great way for them to learn more about the U.S.

- 3.) Donate unneeded, clean household items: pots, pans, dishes and other kitchen items, sheets, towels, etc. to the ISSC "lending closet." These are lent to students during their stay, returned when they leave and lent again. The lending closet is a great help to students on tight budgets.
- 4.) As individuals or as a Sunday School class, volunteer periodically to sponsor, host or drive for short ISSC-arranged trips or events. You may also wish to work with ISSC to arrange an event in your specialty area.
- 5.) If you are paired with a student who shows interest, invite him/her to get acquainted with Trinity and attend services and activities. Some Tallahassee churches have international student classes or groups, and this would be an option to explore.

To utilize students/scholars as resources:

- 1.) Invite international students and/or scholars to share presentations with your Sunday School class. They offer a rich experience and new perspective on many things we take for granted. Adult classes and Lay Academy might want to look at various religious practices and beliefs, social problems and needs, status of women, families and other questions. Teen classes might explore being a teen in another culture, how religion influences guidelines for teen behavior, dating or courtship patterns, family relations or concepts of volunteer service. Children's classes might delight in seeing costumes and food from other cultures and asking questions about life there.
- 2.) In medical emergencies with non-English speaking patients, Tallahassee hospitals regularly call ISSC. But many individual doctors may not realize this source is available. Please announce in your Sunday School classes, and otherwise spread the work to your individual doctors, that should they encounter translation needs, they may call ISSC at 644-1702. Many FSU students have nationality associations with offices at ISSC, and ISSC can link medical personnel with a person or group for translation help.

All of these activities are both a service and blessing to all who participate. Do jump in and enjoy!


But we didn't want to make that kind of impression.

'Faces of Trinity' Theme for Stewardship 2000



Grand Celebration of a 'Church on Fire'

The celebration starts at 9 a.m. with a sumptuous potluck breakfast in Moor Hall (see related story below for info on how you can add to the bounty). A caravan of antique and modern vehicles, representing different important eras in Trinity's history, will approach the church along Park Avenue and continue around the Duval Street side so that the parade can be viewed from either side of the building. The children's choir will also sing.

The morning's events culminate in the 175th Worship Celebration at 10:45, which features a grand processional of honored guests, a short historical drama about the founding of the church and a special worship service. The service also includes the dedication of an important Methodist artifact, the details of which are being kept quiet until the 26th. Many musical elements, including a brass ensemble, Praise Band and Handbell choirs as well as the Chancel, Youth and Children's choirs, will enrich the festive and joyous worship.

Even with all the festive elements planned for the day, the celebration won't be complete without you, so make plans to attend and "join the Fire" that will begin Trinity's second 175 years.
