our volunteer time in order to operate. It cannot function or provide a ministry without them.



### Feel the tug

#### Durham, England October 13, 2005

It was a gray Autumn afternoon. Pat and I wound our way up the narrow cobble stone street, climbing, ever up the hill, ever closer to our destination. Before we could see it - we could hear it. The bell rang out, beckoning us onward. Bong, bong, bong. As we rounded the corner of a cottage, covered with bright red fall leaves, suddenly there it was - the cathedral deceptive in its size. We were still a quarter of a mile away and it took up much of the horizon. You really can't grasp the size of it until you are right on it. We eagerly hurried onward. It almost seemed that if the bell stopped ringing we would be late for the service of Evensong.

We entered the Cathedral for the second time that day. Our eyes were drawn upward to the enormous vaulted ceiling. A sense

of awe and wonder overcame us. We walked a long way until we reached the center of the Cathedral. This is the choir area, where the service will be held. The verger, dressed



in a black robe, greeted us warmly and gave us directions for the service.

As we were about to enter the service, I noticed a man off to the right. He wore a maroon robe and every few seconds he pulled down on a rope. When I looked



closer I saw that it was one of several ropes that extended upward, perhaps a hundred feet to the top of the Cathedral. He was ringing the bell! The thing was, he couldn't hear it. Through his training he had learned when to pull. Then he felt a tug.

Isn't that what faith is? You feel a tug and even though you don't see or hear what's on the other end, you just know that God is there!

So keep on pulling,

P.S. It is 8:30 p.m. as I lie in bed writing this, and it is time for bell practice. One evening a week the cathedral bell ringers practice for an hour and the glorious sound carries across the whole city.

Where else can you lay in your bed and listen to bells of a thousand year old Cathedral? How great is that?! I may not be able to sleep tonight, even after the bells stop ringing!

becomes a huge burden to get through. If you cannot get your mail, you go to the post office to get it. Imagine what it is like on a normal day at the post office and then imagine it under these conditions!

After hearing from folks on staff at TUMC-Gulfport, it is easy to see how the recovery journey could go astray. Many of the staff members at TUMC-Gulfport have

completely lost their own homes or suffered damage to the extent that their home is not habitable. Folks on staff include a couple where the husband is fighting cancer and their home is swamped with mold, a single mother of 2 boys with a blue tarp roof between them and the outside, and a family with a 4 year



Foreign films aren't everyone's bonbon, but for those who don't mind reading subtitles or who parle français, this is a very funny, classic French farce.




### **Bible presentation**
