Ringing in Trinity's new addition just in time for Easter services

Carillon newest purchase

As Reverend Willis pressed the button, the sanctuary was filled with silence. What was supposed to happen was...Reverend Willis would push down on the remote control play button and **Amazing Grace** would play through the new carillons. After a couple of moments, the music of the bells came through loud and clear.

Not only do the brand new carillons play outside and/or inside the church, but they can also be played from the organ keyboard. So, effectively, Trinity has gained a new musical instrument as well as gaining a carillon.

The Board of Trustees was responsible for both the purchase and installation of the carillon. The bells will ring at noon, 3 p.m. and 6 p.m. each day except Sunday. On Sundays, Reverend Willis will control the ringing of the noon bells so they don't start ringing during the church service.

Palm Sunday April 9

The three services at 8:30, 9:45, and 11

a.m. will be held at the regular times.

Elementary school-age children will join in the procession carrying palms at the 11 a.m. service. Don't miss this special service.

Maundy Thursday April 13

This traditional service of communion will be held at 7:30 p.m. in the sanctuary.

This is a traditional observance of the Last Supper of Christ.

The service will be preceded by a dinner in Moor Hall that will begin at 6:30 p.m. Please call the church office at 222-1120 to make your reservation.

Good Friday April 14

Trinity will again have a worship service observing the crucifixion of Christ at 12 noon. This is a city-wide United Methodist service that is traditionally hosted by Trinity.

Invite other United Methodists to come to church with you and then stay for a delicious lunch after the service. A \$5 donation is suggested, and reservations should be made through the church office at 222-1120.

Easter Sunday April 16

Easter services begin at 7 a.m. with the traditional Sunrise Service. This service for early risers is held in E. Peck Greene Park, which is located across the street and East of Trinity. Reverend Wayne P. Cook will lead this service that will see the Easter sunrise.

A delicious hot breakfast will be served after

the service in Moor Hall. Reservations should be made through the church office by calling 222-1120.

All three regular services will be held at 8:30, 9:45, and 11 a.m. The services will feature special music and the theme for Reverend Willis' sermon will be "Be Thou My Vision." Don't miss this special Easter.


The Crazy Tree Hugger

The 8:30 and 11:00 a.m. services will include a special presentation by our Trinity Ringers. Several times during the service, the ringers will present sections from "Five



Inscriptions" by Cathy Moklebust. Short Latin verses were often inscribed on church bells of Western Europe during the period from the 13th-16th centuries. They provide a glimpse into the important role church bells played within their surrounding communities. The music for this handbell piece was created to match the meaning of each inscription, and here they are: "I announce the festival," "I call the gathering," "I console the living," "I torment demons," and "I sing for the festival." Like our newly installed carillon system, handbells have a distinctive sound like no other; a sound that can inspire and encourage us in our faith journey!



April 2

Our Chancel Choir, with the support of about 20 instrumentalists, will present a truly unique concert at 4:00 p.m. in the sanctuary. All are invited to attend! Here is an excellent opportunity to invite additional family and friends who enjoy classical music to visit our church. Actually, the "Funeral Music for Queen Mary" and Handel's "Coronation Anthems," are both classical music and sacred music. With the "Funeral Music for Queen Mary," you will hear music that quite possibly has never been performed in Tallahassee before. It has some unique

elements including a recurring military drum cadence, and a selection for two oboes, two bassoons and drum.

Also on the program is a short Organ Concerto by Handel: A chance for our fine instrument and our fine organist, Elizabeth LaJeunesse, to combine with an orchestra.....sounds exciting!

Minister from sister church in Cuba comes to Tallahassee


This is going to be exciting! After years of negotiations with governments near and far, Reverend Alfredo Caballero from our sister church, San Pablo in Fomento, Cuba, will finally arrive at Trinity. His current itinerary will have him arriving in Tallahassee on April 19 and preaching at all 3 services on April 23. Trinity will have a covered-dish dinner at 6 p.m. Sunday night to welcome him to Tallahassee. He plans on staying for 2 weeks in our fair city.

Efforts by Trinity to host members of our sister church date back to 2003. At that time, Trinity had requested that the minister and 2 lay persons, Manuel Rodriguez, known as Papo, and Zoila Garcia, be allowed

to come for a visit. Unfortunately, these efforts failed due to governmental interference by both countries. This time,

permission was asked for Papo, Zoila, and Reverend Caballero. And again, all were refused except for Reverend Caballero who is coming on a pastoral visa from the Office of the Bishop of the Cuban Methodist Church in Havana.

While in Tallahassee, Reverend Caballero will meet with church staff, visit local churches, visit Latin American United Methodist churches, and do some sight-seeing in the Tallahassee area.

The church in Fomento has been a sister church since 2001. Trinity members have visited Cuba twice, once to celebrate San Pablo's 100th birthday. There are currently over 30 United Methodist churches in the North West District of Florida that have associated sister churches in Cuba.

Trinity has been supportive of San Pablo through donations of Thanksgiving and Christmas offerings, by sending needed medicines, through donations of eye glasses, and also through the pen-pal program (over 100 letters were recently sent). Have your cards and letters ready for Reverend Caballero to take back with him.

Please make plans now to attend the covered dish dinner and wish Reverend Caballero a Trinity welcome. It has been a long time coming.


UMW Luncheon is April 4

If this sounds like something in which you would like to participate, please call Lisa at 222-1120 to set up an audition.






Here are several new books for the Lenten season that have arrived in the Trinity Library.


The Lure of Saints: A Protestant Experience of Catholic Tradition

Also this year, new officers have been elected; **Chairman - Benson Green, Vice-Chairman - Bart Wells and Secretary - Leslie Elliott.**


The trustees are excited about some of the new projects

Making preparations for life



In the two years I've been here as HEO Coordinator, I have found something that no one wants to talk about, but is very important for all of us to do. It is out of love for our family and friends that we need to face the fact that we will all leave this life some day.

There's no way around it, no way to avoid it, and no reason to be afraid to talk about it. And, for most of us, it should be a celebration, a time to rejoice in our new life in heaven. By making just a few simple decisions now, you can save your family a lot of headache and stress. When families are left to make decisions for us, it only makes things harder for them. Is that what we really want? What harm can be done if we each take the time to think about final preparations, no matter what our age?

As we go through different stages of life, additional decisions should also be made. Here are some questions to ponder and discuss with your family:

- What type of funeral service or memorial would you prefer?



- Where would you like to be buried, or do you want cremation?
- How will these costs be covered?
- Do you have a will? A trust?
- For those with children still at home, do you have guardians named?
- Have you discussed your financial obligations and wishes with family?
- Does someone know where all your important papers, contracts, policies and accounts are kept?
- If you are sick or aging, do you have a living will? A health care surrogate? Do you have a power of attorney?
- Who will take care of you when you are no longer able?
- Will you be able to stay where you are living now? Do you need to downsize?
- What are your long-term care plans?
- Do you have any other final wishes that your family should know about?

All of us have very different answers to these questions. We all have different circumstances and resources to work with. I would encourage all of us to take time to process these questions and discuss them with our families.

As hard as it may be to think about

these things, we need to remember how helpful it will be for our family later. By taking the time to think about these questions and your wishes, it can benefit your well-being and your loved ones' peace of mind.


It's a Fiesta! Vacation Bible School for 2006

There are only a limited number of spaces and will be filled on a first come, first served basis. The cost will be an additional \$50/child. Children will need to bring their own lunch.


Preschool Afternoon Program: Preschool children needing full day


Attention graduates
