This was the theme of the 2006 Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. The event was held May 31 – June 3 in Lakeland. Attending from Trinity were Rev. John and Pat Willis; Rev. Wayne, Janet, Lyndsay and John Cook; Rev. Barbara Potter (along with husband and new Bethel minister Rev. George Potter); Kelly, Malinda and John Rains; Bill and Alice Grow; Miriam Peirce; and Kitty Ball. Kelly Rains' husband, Dr. Vance Rains, Campus Minister at FSU's Wesley Foundation, was also there.

Over the three and a half days there were many sessions — opportunities for information, inspiration and fellowship. These included laity and clergy sessions, memorial service, business sessions, bible study, holy communion, mealtime gatherings, musical entertainment, celebration of 50 years of women in ordained ministry, and service of ordination. The highlight of all these sessions for us Trinity folk was the ordination of our own Rev. Wayne Cook.

A few statements by different distinctive

speakers from the conference, which can serve to challenge us are:

1.) "Clergy are called to preach and teach the gospel. Laity are called to lead into mission. We should never lose the priority of being in mission."

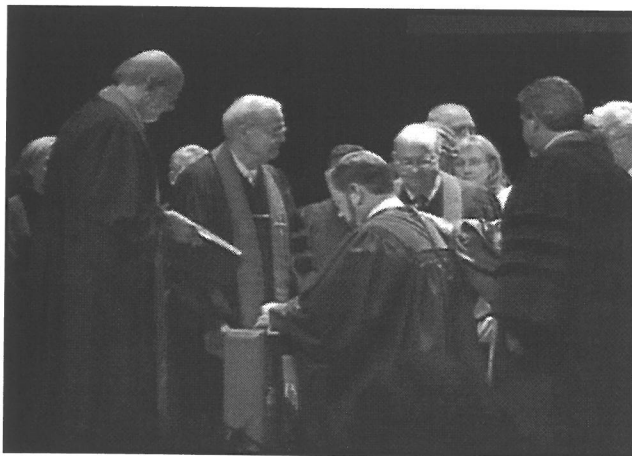
2.) "Christian calling is not by choice but by surrender. We must learn to be a disciple, see people with Jesus' heart. A seasoned disciple is someone consistent in their walk with Christ — reliable and dependable."

3.) "We have connections

within United Methodism giving us the ability to connect people for ministries who have the same passions. Share your gifts with others."

4.) "We need to be open to what God is doing around us, open to change. Lives can be changed. Our faith is about God's kingdom on earth not just eternity."

A personal pleasure for me was seeing and reconnecting with former Trinity pastors and pastors' wives — Art McClellan, David and Barbara Hodges, Beth Fogle-Miller, Gene and Emily Ann Zimmerman, Irma Norman, and Melvin Ware (from the 1960's).

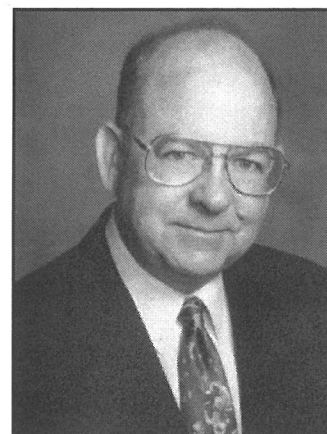


I Miss You

It has been almost a month since I picked up a pen to write anything. As most of you know, I had surgery at the end of June. After several days in the hospital, I have been home recuperating. I knew what to expect with the surgery, but I really wasn't sure what would follow.

Two things have surprised me. First is how long it is taking me to bounce back to my former self. (I was told it would take a while, but I just didn't believe it.) The second thing is your response. It has simply been overwhelming! The prayer quilt, the books, the food, and the cards have just been more than I ever could have anticipated. While I have been at home convalescing, I have received several hundred cards, and each and every one has been very special to me. When they arrive, I take each one, open it, and read it carefully. (It is the highlight of my day.) I know each one represents someone who cared enough to go to the store and pick out just the right card. Then take it home and write a personal note on it, address it, stamp it, and mail it. Each day when they arrive, it is like a joyful dose of medicine that makes me better.



However, underlying all of this, and most important, is your prayers. I know they have helped and healed my body and spirit.

I really don't feel worthy of all this, but really appreciate it. You are such a wonderful congregation, and I love each of you. I am grateful to Wayne and all the staff for doing such an outstanding job while I am gone.

Among several books of devotions is the aptly titled **Dear Lord, They Want Me To Give the Devotions!**, by John Schroeder and Shane Groth. There is a sequel by the same authors, **Dear Lord, They Want Me To Give the Devotion Again!**

Each book contains more than 50 one-or-two page devotions, arranged alphabetically by topic, such as Change, Fear, Forgiveness, Happiness, Memories, Relationships, Truth, etc ...

Each devotion consists of three basic parts:

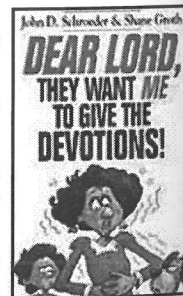
1. a Bible verse related to the topic;

2. a story, anecdote, or example that relates to the topic; and
3. ways the Scripture relates to us in our lives today.

In addition, each book has a section on how to create your own devotion from scratch.

Check the books under Dewey Decimal System #242 on our shelves for these books and others, such as **Homework for the Heart: Devotions for Teachers** by Lisa Flin and Barbara Younger; and **Coffee Book Devotions** by Marjorie Kimbrough.

With help from these books, you will be able to prepare a devotion with more confidence.

Sometime before 1991, the First

From that humble beginning, the program has grown to the point that now Trinity cooks and serves meals at The Shelter on the first, fourth, and fifth Mondays of each month.

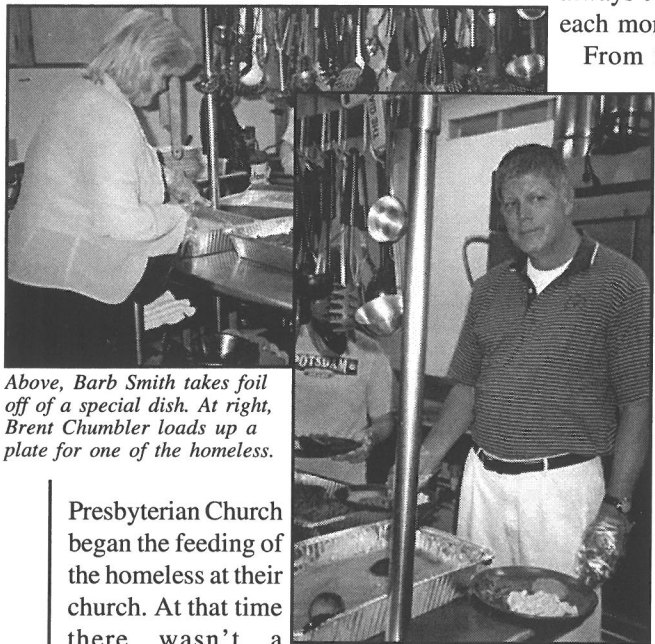

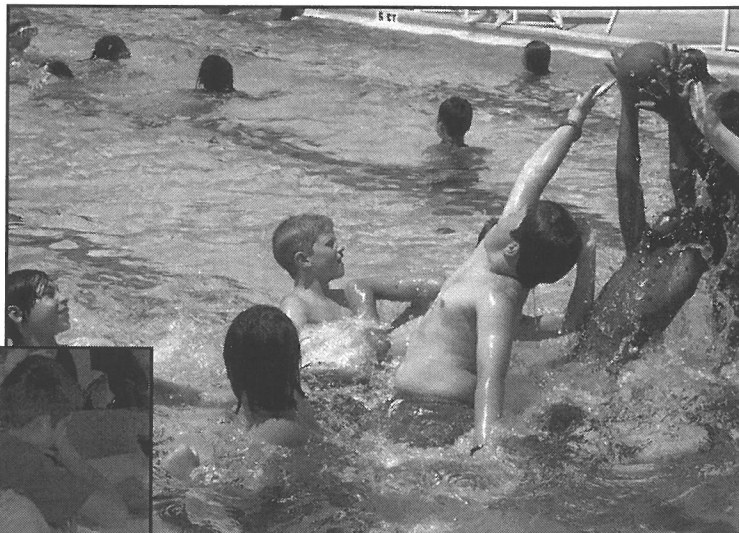

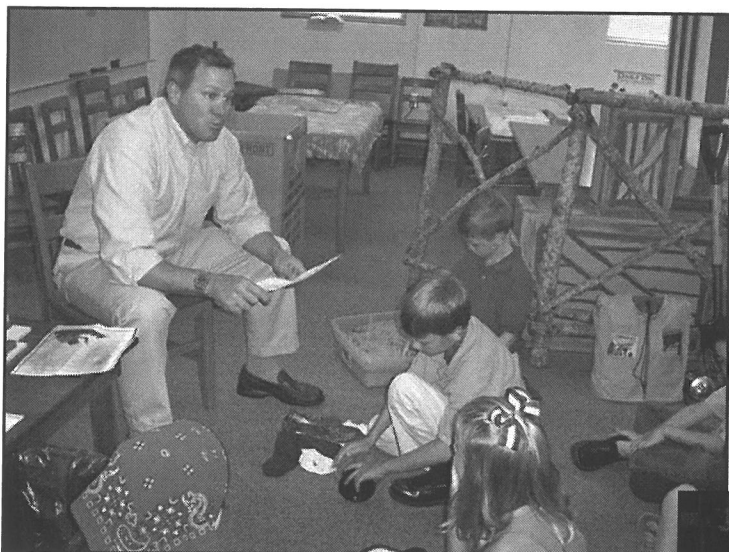

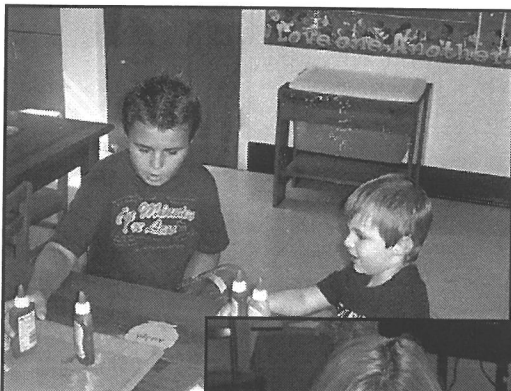

Summer Mission Experiences

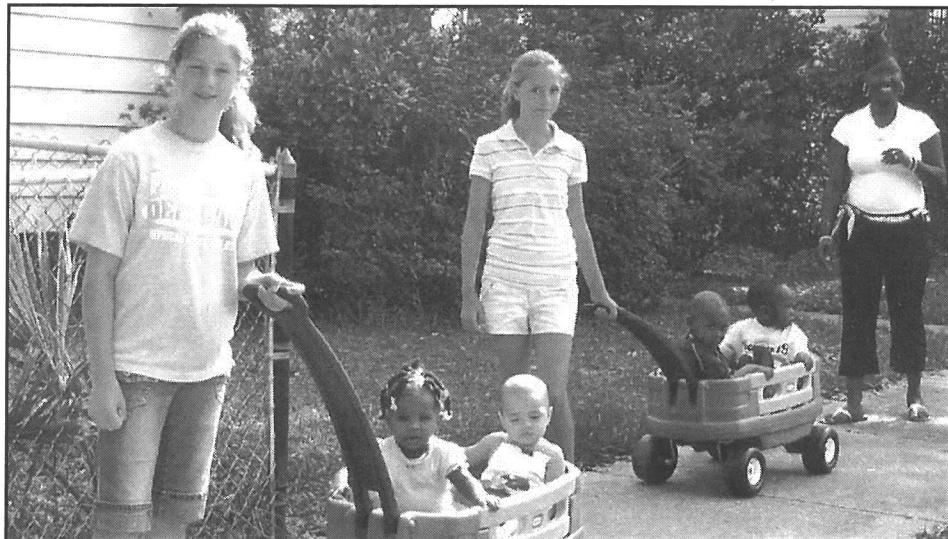

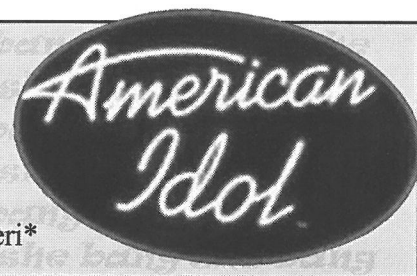

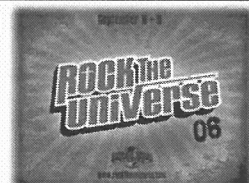

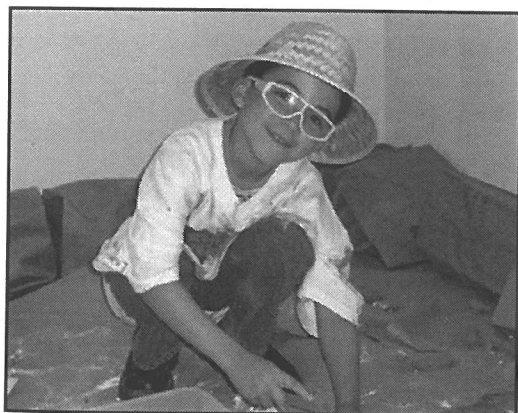
Preschool and kindergarten classes will meet on the first floor and grades one through five will meet on the second floor. There will be a parents gathering in Room 305 following registration.

Refreshments will be served and parents will have a chance to meet each other and find out about our adult classes.

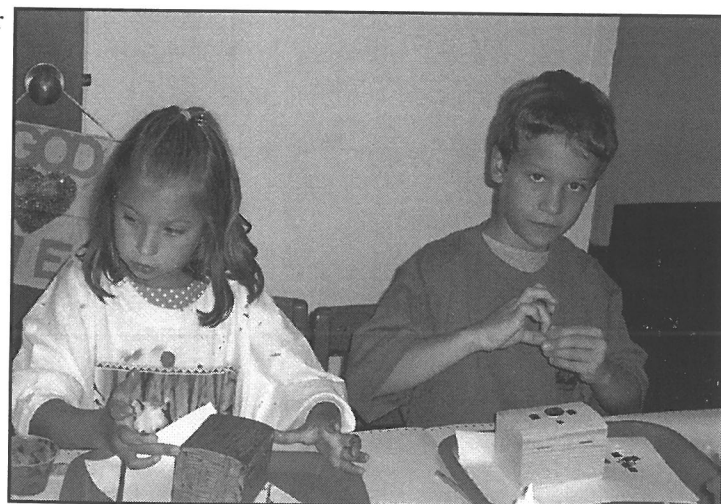
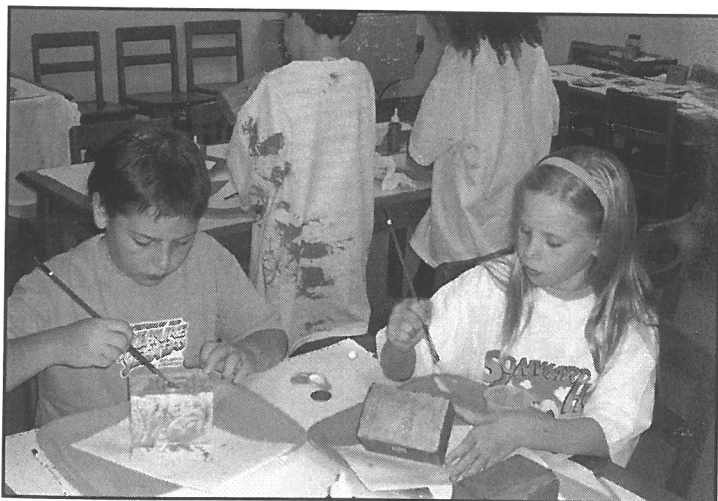
At 10:15 a.m., there will be a short presentation of the new curriculum we are launching and other important information on children's ministries at Trinity.
