Reverend Wayne Cook to be ordained at Annual Conference

Reverend Wayne P. Cook, Trinity's Executive Pastor, will be ordained on Saturday night, June 3, at 7:30 p.m. in the Lakeland Civic Center. You can watch the ordination on webcast if you have a high-speed internet connection. Go to www.flumc2.org and click on the link that says "2006 Florida Annual Conference Event."

The ceremony represents the culmination of years of work for Reverend Cook. What began as a calling to the ministry nine years ago, became a four-year stay at Asbury Theological Seminary in

Orlando. Since graduating from seminary, Reverend Cook has worked at United Methodist Church in Kissimmee, Grace United Methodist Church in Coral Springs, and has now been at Trinity since July of 2005.

Trinity will be represented at the conference by delegates Bill and Alice Grow, and Kitty Ball. The District delegates are Bill Fritchman and Miriam Peirce. Reverend John Willis, Reverend Wayne Cook, and Reverend Barbara Potter are also attending the conference.

"Tis a gift to be simple"

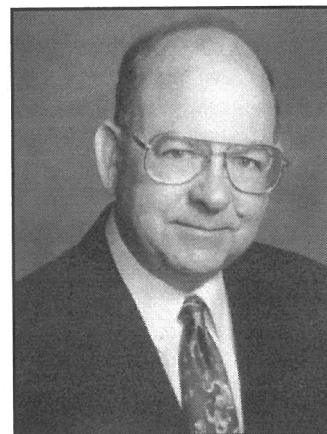

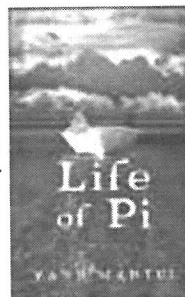
Jan Karon's **Mitford** series is a popular set of books about the residents of the fictional town of Mitford, North Carolina. The stories are heartwarming and the characters memorable.

The Red Tent by Anita Diamant weaves biblical characters and stories with imagined events. Dinah, the daughter of Jacob and Leah, narrates her life story and provides glimpses of what daily life might

have been life for a woman in that time.

Yann Martel's award-winning **Life of Pi** is an imaginative tale of adventure, survival and faith. Pi, a young Indian boy traveling from India to Canada with his family, finds himself adrift in a lifeboat in the middle of the ocean following a shipwreck. 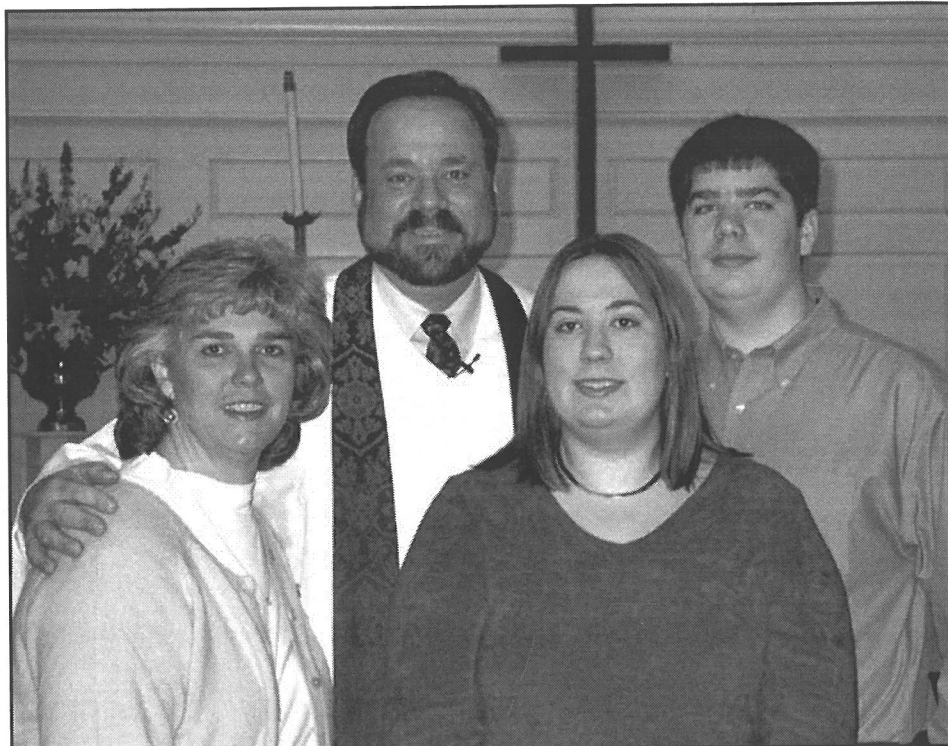
As most of you know, I will be ordained at the Florida Annual Conference on June 2. This event will be the culmination of nine years of prayer and work. While I began the formal process of earning my degree and being an official candidate for ordination in 1999, I started this journey long before I took the official steps to make it happen. I struggled with my call to ordained ministry for at least two years before stepping out and making it public and official. If it had not been for the guidance and support of some people very close to me, I do not believe I would have been able to complete this process.

Faith and grace

You see, these people believed in me and encouraged me to live out my call and to live up to my potential. I could only see the roadblocks at times but they continued to show me God's grace advancing my work and supporting me. I struggled with how I would pay for Seminary and God provided from a very unexpected source. I struggled with how I could go back to school at my age (38 at the time). After all, I was never a stellar student. I struggled with moving my family to enable me to attend Seminary, again God provided. The past nine years have often been a roller coaster ride of joy and fear, but I am glad that I have not missed one moment of the ride.

Continuing God's work

Now I stand at the end of the journey, feeling the excitement of a task accomplished and look forward to June 2 and the event that I have waited for so long. But as I sit and reflect on the event, I have come to realize that my ordination is not the end of the journey but only the beginning. I have worked hard to come to this point, but I cannot stop now, no resting on my laurels of completing seminary and making it through the

candidacy process.

Journey begins

No, I'm not at the end but only the beginning of the next leg of the journey. Reverend Willis' sermon on May 7 reminded us that the day will come when we all realize our need for God. And for me, today is that day. While I have certainly realized that need many times in my life, I perhaps realize it to a greater degree as I look toward ordination. God has carried me through to this point, provided strength, ability and knowledge to answer questions, write papers, and fill out forms to complete the ordination process.

But, I cannot go it alone at this point. It is now that I will learn to rely on God to an even greater degree than ever. I will

depend on His grace, wisdom and mercy to lead me as I continue the journey of leading His church, walking with people in times of joy and sorrow. The journey is

What a nice treat for the preschoolers. Thank you, Jane!



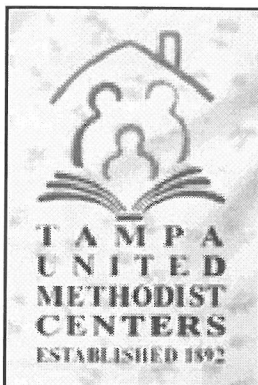

Fourteen youth were confirmed recently and joined the congregation of Trinity following a special communion service in the Sanctuary.

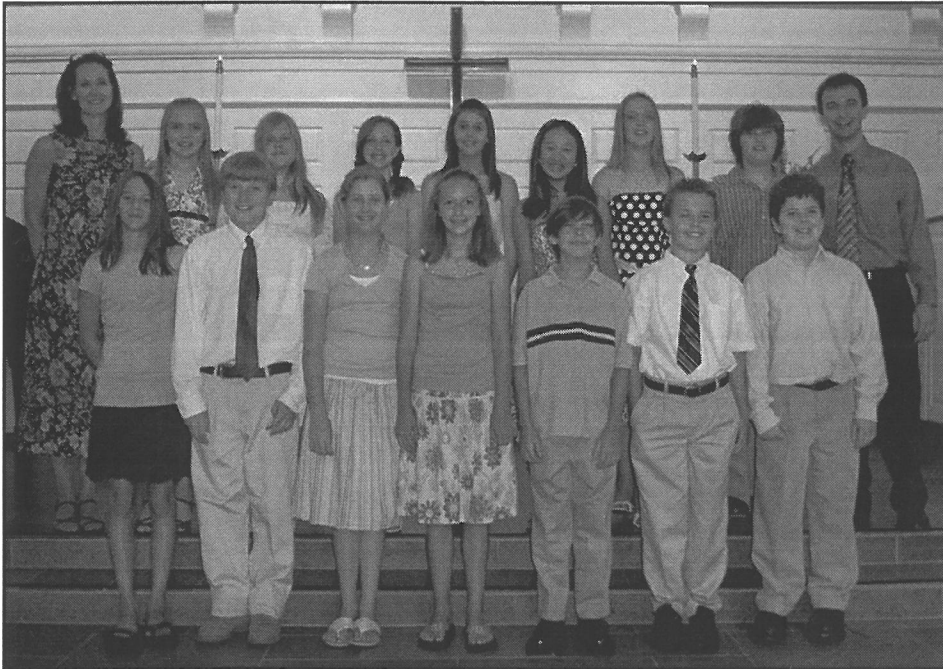
The confirmation service is a way for the class members to proclaim their

For me, summer is a good time to take a break from the usual crazy schedule, to find time for new projects and to spend time with family and friends. Taking advantage of a bit slower schedule helps

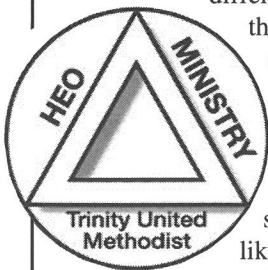

What is God calling you to do this summer? Is He in your summer plans at all? Why not include God in those lazy days of summer? It's the perfect time to hang out with Him.

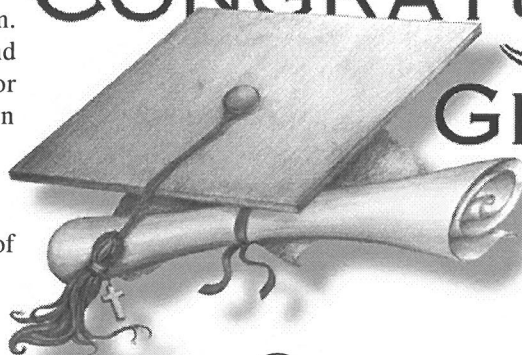


Trinity's graduates
