Lenten activities lead to Easter

Several ways to prepare

March 1 marks the first day of Lent and Trinity is already preparing for Easter. As usual, there are several Trinity-wide events that make participation in the lenten season more meaningful.

Get a Lenten Journal

How many books have you read recently that: a.) you know the author; b.) you know the text was written with you in mind; and c.) you only paid \$5 for both a book AND an interactive DVD? Of all the things we spend money on, the **Lenten Journal** has got to be one of the best values for our dollar. This little booklet is filled with information, pictures, and suggested scripture readings, all with a focus on making Lent more meaningful for you.

Reverend Willis spent 3 weeks in the British Isles with the sole purpose of preparing this year's journal. He not only studied at prestigious Oxford University, but he also traveled to several of the finest cathedrals in the world, all located throughout England and Ireland. While at these amazing structures he documented, through still photographs and video, their intrinsic beauty, and also studied the relationship between the cathedral and the saint associated with it.

Use the DVD

On the DVD you will find weekly devotionals by Reverend Willis, as well as still photographs and videos that he took while in the British Isles. By pressing the

"menu" button on your DVD player (or remote) you can bypass the intro that comes up each time the DVD is inserted. Or, if you don't have a DVD player, you can also access weekly devotionals by going to tumct.org and playing the video from there.

Join a Lenten small group

Joining a small group may be the best way to prepare for Easter. Those who have participated in previous years say things like: *"Talking with others opened my eyes to scripture meaning that I hadn't seen before."*; *"The group helped me understand that others have questions just like I do."*; and *"Our leader was so organized that just by coming to the group I was able to learn more than I would have on my own."* These groups are a non-threatening way to get involved with other members of the church and help you prepare for the miracle of Easter.

Come to the Ash Wednesday service

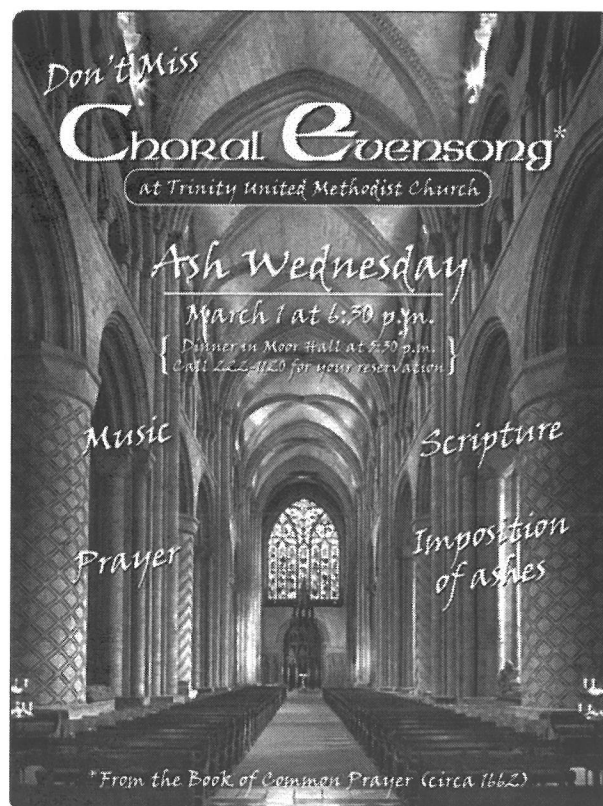
This year's Ash Wednesday service will be different from years past. This year's service will be modeled on the traditional cathedral evening service called "Choral Evensong."

Simply go to the bottom-left-side of the homepage and click on the "Quick Links" button. You can then just scroll down to the page for which you are searching.



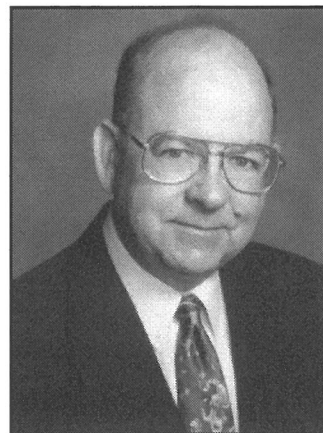
A Traveler's Parable

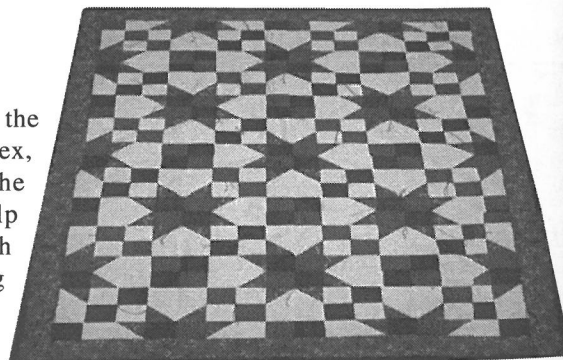
March "Change" goes to Prayers & Squares

This is REALLY a special concert — April 2!

Mark your calendars and make plans to attend a concert at Trinity the likes of which you will probably never witness again. We're talkin' unique, historic and memorable here!

The concert starts at 4:00 pm on Sunday April 2 in our sanctuary.

As part of our Lenten Journey for 2006, the Chancel Choir, assisted by a 15-piece orchestra, will hearken back to an England

centuries removed. There, at Westminster Abbey in London, one of the great cathedrals of England and the traditional church of English monarchs, important state events including coronations and funerals were

commemorated. That tradition started in 1066 (remember William the Conqueror?) and continues to the present day! Over the centuries a large amount of music used during state funerals and coronations has

been accumulated. From this varied collection are compositions that have stood the test of time and are still performed today.

The Funeral Music for Queen Mary includes music by Henry Purcell, Thomas Morley, Thomas Tollett and James Paisible. It begins with a solemn and haunting military drum cadence to which brass, oboes and bassoons are later added. Short choral sentences are interspersed with the instrumental sections. Texts include "I am the resurrection," "I know that my Redeemer liveth," and "Thou knowest, Lord, the secrets of our hearts." An interesting tidbit about this funeral service in Westminster Abbey: Historians note that "a thousand-odd candles" illuminated the interior of the building that bleak and gloomy day in 1695.

Four Coronation Anthems were created specifically for the coronation of King George II, which took place in October of 1727. George F. Handel, best known as the composer of "*The Messiah*", likely composed the 20+ minutes of glorious music in less than a month! The coronation included much more than just the Coronation Anthems; it was a religious as well as a state event. Music by other composers of earlier generations was also part of the coronation ceremony. The first of Handel's Coronation Anthems titled "Zadok the Priest" has been a part of every coronation of British monarchs from 1727 to the present day. The text is from I Kings

1: 38-39.

Rounding out our 60-minute concert is Handel's *Organ Concerto in B flat*, composed in 1720. Elizabeth LaJeunesse, Trinity's organist,

will be performing accompanied by the 15-piece orchestra. Interestingly, this piece was originally designed as a harp concerto!

With this music, we are reminded that the faith we embrace today has flowed to us through countless people, through the centuries. We invite you for a few moments, to transport yourself to an earlier age, to experience the faith expressed through their music in their time.

As our Lenten Journey begins, many aspects of our worship will converge on a particular focal point each week. The role of music in worship at any time of year is to enhance both scripture and sermon, and help tie all elements together into a unified service. However, during Lent here at Trinity, the music in the service actually becomes a part of our journey, and helps to set the tone for each week. With that in mind, special preludes have been chosen for each Sunday in March to help you prepare mind and heart for each of our special worship services.

As we are centering our journey in England, **March 5** will feature two Lenten chorale preludes by British-turned-Canadian composer Healey Willan. Willan was organist at St. John the Baptist, Kensington, during the early part of the twentieth century. On **March 12**, look for a Suite by Handel (who spent the latter part of his life in England) that will feature a new addition to our organ.

On **March 19**, you will hear American composer Samuel Barber's variations on Wondrous Love, one of the most stirring



Lenten hymns. And, returning to England, March will conclude with a pre-worship recital, on the **26th**, of music by English composers of the Renaissance and Baroque.

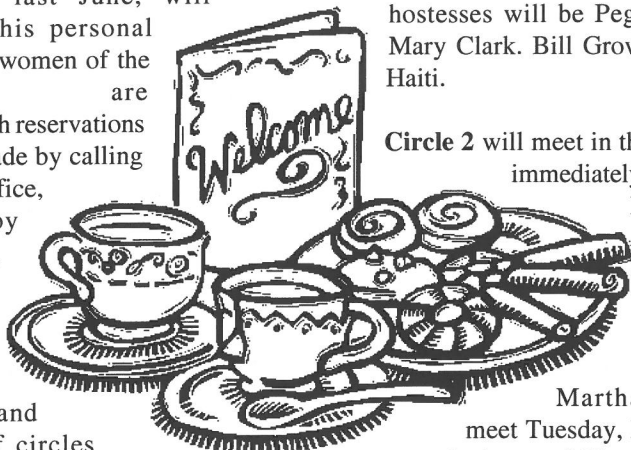
The program will include works by Dunstable, Redford, Tallis (often referred to as the "father of English Cathedral music"), and Walond, who among them served St. Paul's Cathedral, Queen Elizabeth I, and Oxford University. This Lenten season, let music be a part of your journey...

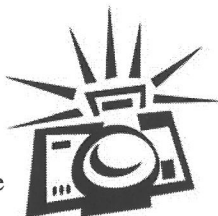

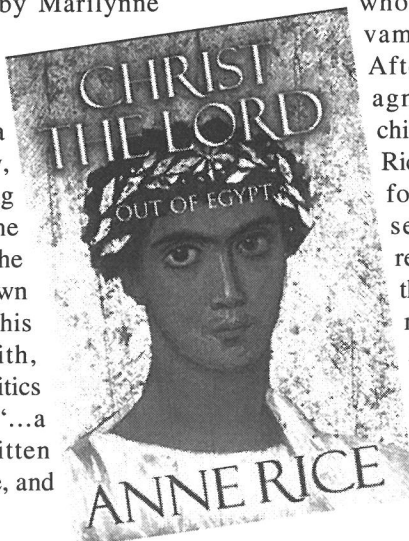


What's new in the Trinity Library

It's a treat to find an excellent novels with religious themes. Our library has two such award-winners: **Gilead**, by Marilynne Robinson, and **Christ the Lord: Out of Egypt**, by Anne Rice.

Gilead is in the form of a letter written by an elderly, dying minister to his young son. Through his writings, he hopes to reveal to his son the father he lost. Set in small town Iowa, the novel explores his thoughts, his family, faith, failings, and redemption. Critics have called the book "...a spiritual, beautifully written story, full of wisdom, grace, and wonder.

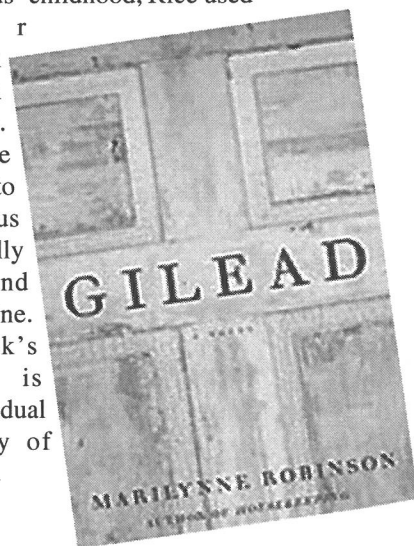


Christ the Lord: Out of Egypt was written, surprisingly enough, by Anne Rice, who usually writes of vampires and witches. After returning from agnosticism to her childhood Catholic faith, Rice was inspired to write for God. She spent several years researching material for this novel and plans to make it the first of a series about the life of Jesus.

In this book, 7-year-old Jesus tells the story in his own

words about his family's from Egypt to Nazareth. Since the Bible says very little about Jesus' childhood, Rice used

h e r imagination to fill in the gaps. S h e attempts to show Jesus as both fully human and fully divine. The book's theme is Jesus' gradual discovery of who he is.

Trinity member honored at Tallahassee Regional Airport

Trinity member Francis J. Black, Jr. is currently being honored with a display at the Tallahassee Regional Airport in their Aviation Museum on the second floor.

Mr. Black was once Number One Seniority Pilot for Eastern Airlines. He had first choice, before 5,000 other pilots, of any of Eastern's planes and routes. He retired in 1974 after more than 35 years.

Mr. Black got the bug for flying after chasing down a plane with his childhood pal Godfrey Smith.

Mr. Black met his future wife at Trinity as a young boy. Being the daughter of a superintendent of the Methodist Church, she had to move away and eventually married another and was widowed. In 1977 the two were married and now live in Los Robles.

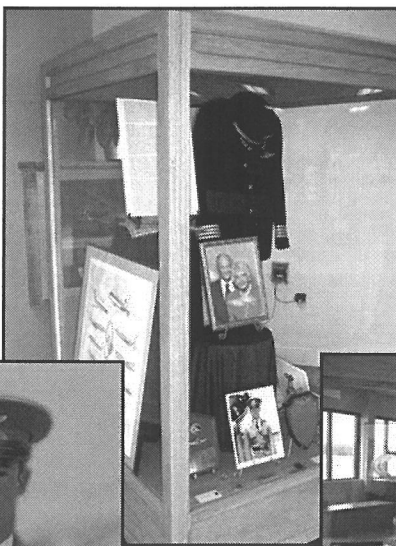
You will find them in the front of the church every Sunday. As Reverend Willis says of Mr. Black "that's pretty good for a 92 year old man."



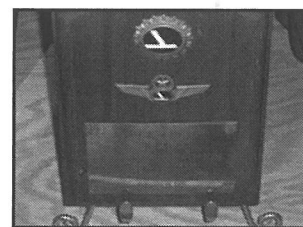
Francis and Mary Elizabeth Black. She says "if anyone had told me back then that I'd someday marry that little Black kid I'd have thought they were crazy."



Mr. Black is shown here as a member of the Army Air Corps. He graduated from training as a second lieutenant pilot.



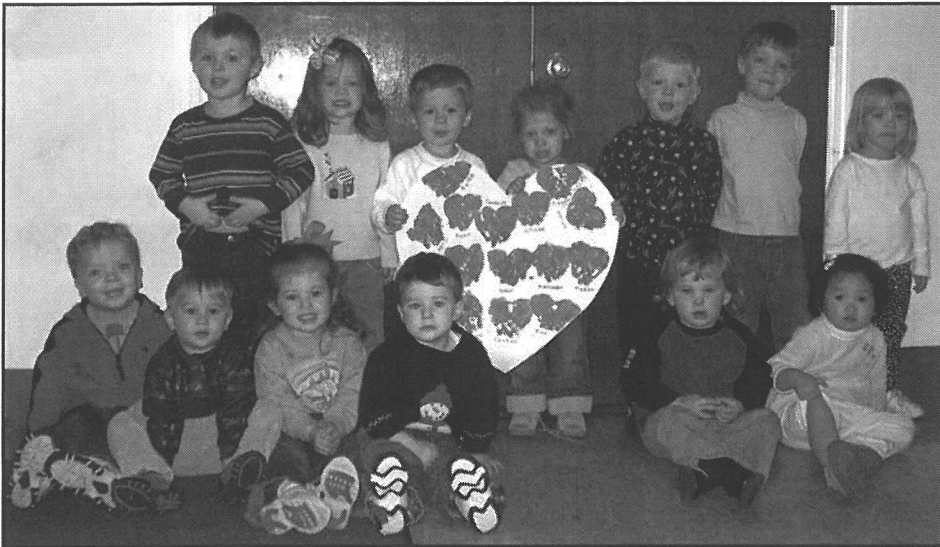

Why not try Trinity's Park & Ride

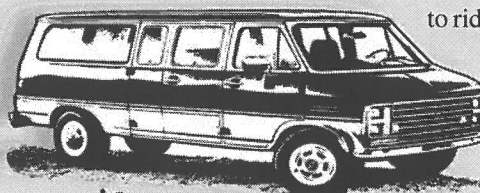
Tired of scaling the hill?
