Urs Schweizer brings message from Europe October 29

Urs will be preaching at all three services on October 29. He brings a unique perspective on the United Methodist Church and Christianity in Central and Southern Europe. His sermon title will be **Mission impossible?** and the scripture will be **Exodus 3:1 – 4:17**

Reverend Willis first came into contact with Mr. Schweizer while preparing to visit United Methodist churches in Switzerland over three years ago. The two have remained in contact through email since then.

Urs is the assistant to the Bishop of the United Methodist Church for Central and Southern Europe. He has held this position since 1992.

Urs has served in this capacity for two different bishops. The current Bishop, Bishop Streiff, travels extensively which means Urs, who speaks four languages, often has considerable responsibilities for the church in the 14 countries in their jurisdiction.

Urs will be attending a conference the week before he comes to Trinity and his schedule will allow him to be here on the 29th.

He grew up in a United Methodist family and has been active in the church since his youth. He is married and has 2 children. He lives in Hemmental, Switzerland, a very small village just outside of Zurich. As a youth, he was a leader in UM scouts.

Urs was kind enough to answer a few

questions to allow the congregation to know him a little better.

Q. Were you born and raised in Hemmental?

A. No, I was born and raised in Buesingen, which is a German village surrounded by Swiss territory (i.e. it is a German "island" in Switzerland). My father was a farmer, so I grew up on a farm. I have 3 brothers and 2 sisters.

Later I lived for some years in Zurich, but when I married and we had children, we did not want to live in a big town but rather in a small village.

Q. Where did you work before working with the Bishop?

A. I worked for 8 years with a forwarding agent (a company organizing international transports of all kind of goods). Most of the

time I worked in the airfreight and seafreight department. Sometimes I say: In my "earlier life, I sent containers and boxes around the world, now I do the same with my bishop..."

Q. Do you feel called to the ministry?

A. Not to the ministry of a pastor. There were times in my life when I thought about this way. And one of my pastors even encouraged me to go this way. But God obviously wanted me at another place. However, I would not be able to do my work in the way I do it if I did not feel called by God. In this sense, I feel very much called to this special ministry.

Q. How far is Hemmental from the Alps?

A. About 150 km (93 mi.) as the crow flies.

Q. Are you a mountain climber and do you yodel?

A. No, I do not really climb and I can't yodel. But I know many traditional Swiss songs and aim to pass them on to my children although this is considered to be old-fashioned nowadays.

I have participated in some crazy ultramarathons in the mountains (70 km (43 mi.) running with a few thousand meters of difference in altitude and things like that...). But I would be the wrong person on a typical Swiss postcard.

Q. What are the UM Scouts? What types of activities do they do?

A. The UM Scouts are a youth organization of the United Methodist Church for boys and girls from the age of 8 years. The program includes games in the forest, hiking, singing, playing dramas, doing handcrafts, working with ropes (building bridges for example), cooking in the forest, getting to know medical first aid, and camping with tents. And of course, Bible stories and discussion on actual questions on the background of the Gospel.

Q. In your biographical sketch, you wrote that you are a UM lay speaker. Can you list a few of the places where you have spoken?

A. I spoke in my own church and in many congregations in Switzerland (for example Zurich, Berne, Romanshorn, Spiez, Interlaken) where I was invited to tell people about the development of the United Methodist work in (South-)Eastern Europe. I always try to do this on the background of a message from the Bible. In a similar capacity, I also was in Eastern Germany once and in Maine once, last year.


Being aware

It was one of those days when I was overwhelmed with an avalanche of paperwork. I had information that *had* to be taken care of! Suddenly I looked up and there stood Francis Black in my office. He said that he had a question for me. I thought to myself "Golly, I've got stuff that I *have* to get done!" Then I thought, "No, if I don't have time for him, then what do I have time for?" So I asked him to sit down and I spent a few minutes with him. It was a rich conversation that I'm sure I got more out of than this 92 year-old gentleman did.

So after he left, it was back to the perpetual pile of paper that the church couldn't run without.

I keep my door open, so usually I can hear the chatter of people coming and going. I'm sitting there ensconced deep in thought and there seemed to be a multitude of voices drifting into my office, interrupting my thoughts. Then unexpectedly, I hear a voice, a high-pitched voice, that is very different from what I usually hear in the office. Instantly, I know it's a little child. So, I get up and go out to see who it is. She is the two-year-old daughter of one of our members.



I knelt down on the floor, and we just had the best visit ever.

I believe that everyday God has special gifts for us - serendipitous surprises! However, I don't always see them. Sometimes He comes with a bang on the door, sometimes He cracks open the door and slips in silently, and sometimes He comes in through the window! If I am not aware and alert to them, I could miss some of life's greatest joys.

During the **6:30 p.m.** period, there will be a continuation of the **Disciple class**, and the **Women's Bible Study class**. There will



This special program is an outreach of the organization, **Samaritan's Purse**. Each year, more than 7.6 million children receive a shoebox filled with "love."



UMW Executive Committee will meet in Moor Hall at 10:45.






This year, you have indeed helped to provide the "Rx for Healing Hurting Hearts." Because of you, we will be able to continue to share God's love with one


Perhaps most importantly, your gift of love may reach out, touch, and heal a hurting heart in our





HEO has a group of volunteers who cook up lots of delicious casseroles and soups. Perhaps you might have received one of those casseroles when you returned home from the hospital or when a new baby arrived at your home. These meals can be a great help when recovering and our volunteers certainly enjoy preparing them. Here is one of our recipes we like to use:



Beef Casserole

- 2 lbs. ground round
- 8 oz. wide noodles, cooked
- 2 cans tomato soup
- ½ onion chopped
- 1 can water
- ½ green pepper chopped

- ½ lb. American Cheese cut into chunks
- butter/olive oil

- Cook beef and drain fat.
- Saute onion and pepper in small amount of butter/olive oil.
- Mix all ingredients together in casserole dish.
- Bake at 350° for 30 minutes.

This review is re-printed from **Publishers Weekly**.

In this outstanding personal history, Tyson, a professor of African-American studies who's white, unflinchingly examines the civil rights struggle in the South. The book focuses on the murder of a young black man, Henry Marrow, in 1970, a tragedy that dramatically widened the racial gap in the author's hometown of Oxford, N.C.

A gifted writer, he celebrates a number of inspirational unsung heroes, ranging from his father to a respected elderly schoolteacher who spoke out at a crucial point to quash a white congregation's rebellion over an invitation to a black minister.

This book deserves the largest possible audience.


Capital City Youth Services benefits from November "Change"
