## Special presentation of *Amahl* December 5 & 6

You can really get into the Christmas spirit by attending our production of "Amahl and the Night Visitors" on Wednesday, Dec. 5 and Thursday, Dec. 6.

"Amahl" is a 50-minute Christmas season opera. That's right, Trinity musicians are presenting an opera! It is the only opera I am aware of that is frequently presented by churches. Our church presented it at least twice during the years that Walter James was Music Director here. First Baptist Church has presented it within the past 10 years. It is popular with churches because of a strong connection to the biblical story of the three wise men and the poignant message of hope and mystery it conveys, qualities many of us feel with the coming of Christmas each year.

The opera features three kings and their page, some rowdy shepherds, four dancers and of course the two main characters, Amahl and his mother. The opera takes place at a poor widow's home. She has one child, a crippled boy named Ahmal. They are near starvation when visitors, the three wise men, arrive and ask to stay overnight. I don't want to give away the whole story, but during the opera, nearby shepherds visit the kings with food and dance, Amahl gets in trouble for "stretching" the truth, we find one of the kings is nearly deaf, someone tries to steal the three wise men's

gifts intended for the baby Jesus, and a miracle occurs. The entire story is told through the eyes of young Amahl, making it interesting for youth and children as well as adults. There are about 20 members in the cast, mostly Chancel Choir members.

American composer Gian-Carlo Menotti wrote the opera. It was the first opera commissioned especially for television and received its premier on December 24, 1951.

The entire story is seen from little Amahl's point of view. He is supposed to be a child of 13, but we cheated. Sarah-Ashley McClellan plays the part of Amahl, while Nicole Grace is the mother. The kings are Warren May, Gregory Hilliard and Dan Hall. We are especially pleased that 6 former members of our Youth

Choir are involved in this production. Plus, present Youth Choir member, Avery Smith, plays the page to the Wise Men. Fifteen members of Chancel Choir are also performing in the opera!

There is **no charge** for this event, though collection plates will be available following the performance for those who wish to make a donation to help defray costs of the production.

This is an excellent opportunity to introduce opera to children and youth, since it is short, has lots of action and is presented from the

point of view of the young teenager Amahl. We'll really put Moor Hall's new lighting and sound equipment through its paces!

Since we are presenting "Amahl and the Night Visitors" as a gift to the community, **admission is free and there are no tickets**. You can come for our Wednesday night dinner and stay for the show (call 222-1120 for dinner reservations)! What a great way to launch into the spirit of the Christmas season!





The Advent-Christmas season is always special for those involved in church music. Many of the groups here begin practicing Christmas music in early October! Here's a schedule of our musical offerings for this glorious season.

**December 1:** Come to the sanctuary of First Baptist Church for a 3:00 p.m. gala concert featuring 6 - 8 handbell choirs including our own **Trinity Ringers**. **Ring in the Season** is celebrating its 10th anniversary, and is (as far as I know) the only massed handbell concert held in Tallahassee on a yearly basis. 



## A Note from Kelly ...








## Ministry of the month

### The Shelter

The Ministry of the Month for this month is **The Shelter** which Trinity has been supporting for many years — not only through monetary donations but also by providing evening meals on the first, fourth, and fifth Monday of every month. There have been, and still are many people at Trinity that donate their time for this worthwhile ministry. **The Shelter** serves over 200 different people each day, 2,600 each year, and records over 60,000 nights of lodging. There will be 150,000 meals served this year — all provided by at least 50 different groups with Trinity being one of them.

Government tax dollars only account for 5% of **The Shelter's** operating budget. Private contributions from the community

along with funding from **United Way** make up the other 95% of their operating funds. **The Shelter** spends up to \$10,000 each year providing free medication to clients, dispensed by licensed nurses who are on duty each evening.

The cost to provide free lodging, meals, showers, towels, hygiene needs, medication and crisis intervention is only \$7.25 per



person, per day. **The Shelter** helps families with housing start-up costs, such as utility deposits and other basic needs to move them out of the Shelter.

**The Shelter** has never had a stabbing, suicide, or homicide in 19 years, even though they accept and work with hundreds of people each year who suffer from moderate to severe mental illness.

Thank you for the "Spotlight" on **The Shelter** and your continued support. **The Church and Society Ministry** appreciates all of you for being a part of **The Shelter** ministry by the giving of your prayers, time and money.

The items listed below are always in need at **The Shelter**. There is a container outside of Moor Hall where you may drop off your donation. We take the supplies to **The Shelter** on a weekly basis.

**Items needed:** socks, underwear, t-shirts to wear under regular shirts, men's jeans, sweat shirts, outer t-shirts, tennis shoes, personal hygiene items, foot powder/spray (athlete's foot), hydrocortisone ointment, Benedryl (tablet form & off brand is fine), cough drops, laundry detergent, and toilet paper (they go through 4 big packs that you get at Sam's each day)

**One more item:** We need volunteers to help with the fourth Monday in December which is Christmas Eve. Please contact Steve or Sabrina Denmark (524-0658 cell; 893-5635 home) if you can help.



In one more way I have new family in Trinity and in Christ.

Barbara's words fill my brain and soul with thoughts beyond the urgency of today and tomorrow and I am at peace. At the end of the service, a tiny bell, for your tree or your door, will be given to you to remind you of your own special "Clarence".

This is a very, very special service. Regardless of how you're dressed, in your work clothes or your casual clothes, I hope you will take the time to stop by.

Give yourself a present. You'll find yourself returning it every year.


## Did you know that HEO has an inventory of health care equipment?

Come join us as we pause to remember and look forward in hope for peace to be with us, and all mankind, this Christmas season.




# Moor Hall Rededication a big hit!






## December "Change" to help The Shelter
