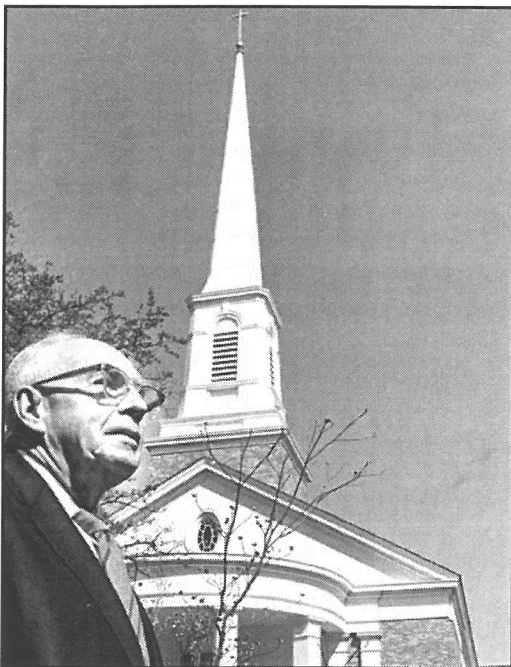
Moor Hall to get much needed renovation

Why is it called "Moor Hall"

21 years after its doors were opened to Trinity members, Moor Hall received its current designation. In May of 1985, the Board of Trustees voted to honor the memory of Frank D. Moor by naming that area of the church "Moor Hall."

Needed new name

Originally referred to as the "basement fellowship hall," or "the Fellowship Hall," Moor Hall really needed a new name.



Mr. Moor is pictured here in front of the then new Trinity facade. There is a plaque in Moor Hall that reads: Frank D. Moor, Oct. 19, 1894 - May 29, 1984. Frank D. Moor, "Mr. Trinity" because of his life-long association with, generosity to, and leadership in Trinity United Methodist Church."

They called him "Mr Trinity"

What do we know of the man for whom Moor Hall is named? On the dedication plaque in Moor Hall we learn that Mr. Moor was so honored for "his lifelong association with, generosity to, and leadership in Trinity United Methodist Church."

From church publications we learn that "His gifts to his beloved church of leadership, wisdom, vision, and material wealth made him a peerless example of Christian discipleship to the church and to the community, and won for him the altogether appropriate and deserved title "Mr. Trinity. His influence long will continue to be felt in all of the areas of Trinity's life to which he so modestly, unselfishly and effectively gave his leadership: the Sunday School, the Board of Trustees, the Finance Committee, all of the building committees organized during his adult life, the Administrative Board (now the Staff/Parish Relations Committee)." It's little wonder his memory was so honored.

Time for a makeover

Moor Hall is one of the few areas in the church which has never been extensively remodeled since the building was constructed in 1964. With the exception of wallpaper and paint, Moor Hall looks exactly the same as it did March 11, 1964, the first day it was officially used.

Since Reverend Willis has been at Trinity, the Sanctuary, the church offices, the Parlor, and the Conference Room have all been remodeled. But not Moor Hall.

The proposed plans, which have been approved by both the Trustees and the

Church Council, include many new features that will make Moor Hall a much more useable area. Details of the many improvements will be described in later issues of the Tidings.

Hardest working room

According to Reverend Willis, Moor Hall is "the hardest working room" in any of Trinity's buildings. It is used for the SUN Service, Wednesday night dinners, movie nights, wedding and funeral receptions, and special church dinners. Various groups inside and outside of Trinity also utilize it.

Believe it or not, currently there is no one person who knows how to operate all of the sound/lighting/video equipment. The audio/video components were put together piecemeal, part by unmatching part, over many years. It's very complicated and difficult to operate.

The Trustees have said that they want to make sure that the enhancements are "done right and completed all at once."

With so much going on in this one area, it will be good to finally have it more user friendly.

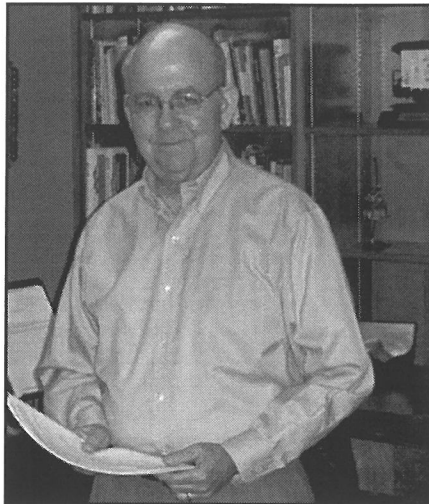
The goal of DST is to maximize the number of hours available during typical waking hours by adjusting clocks ahead an hour.

Holy Week seems an ideal time to focus once more on the theme of our Lenten sermons, "The Seven Last Words of Christ on the Cross." Hopefully, the past several weeks have been a spiritual journey for all of us as we ponder Christ's final utterances before his death. A number of composers over the centuries have set these words to music, a rather demanding project!

Perhaps the best known of these is by Theodore Dubois, a French composer and church musician who died in 1924. His oratorio is quite evocative and involves continuous interplay of soloists, chorus and organ. Early on, Dubois really makes the angry crowd demanding Christ's death come alive. The interplay between Christ and the repentant thief on the cross touches the heart. The bass solo on the text "God, my Father, why hast Thou forsaken me?" truly conveys Christ's sense of abandonment. We are swept up in the cauldron of searing emotions as we contemplate Christ's final hours on the cross.

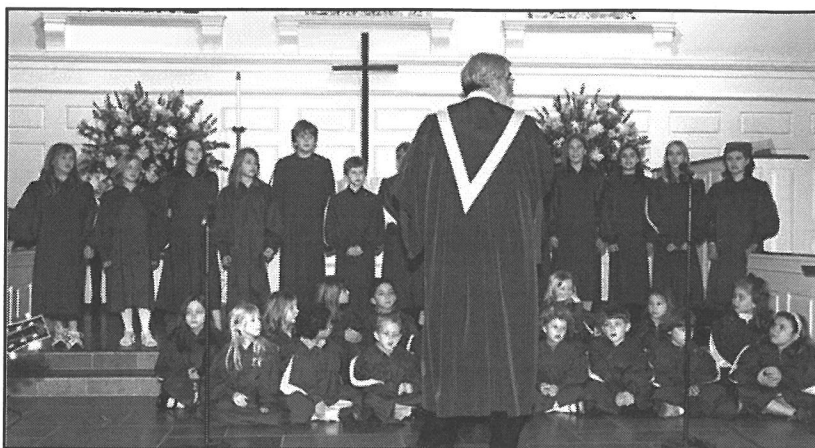
Certainly this will prepare us for the joyous celebration of Easter just a few days hence!

Winter Ring a Great Success!

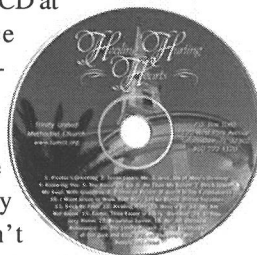

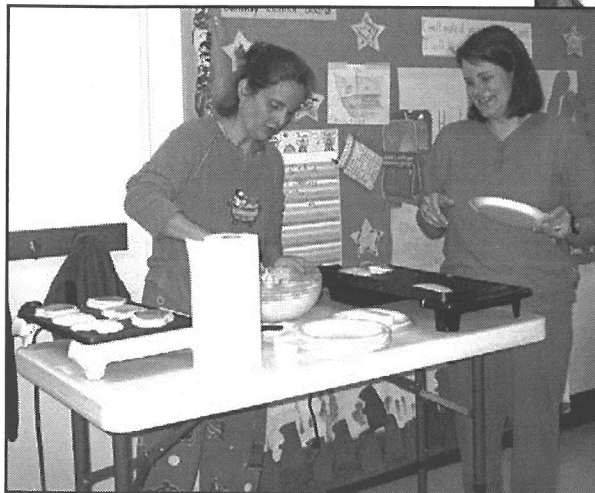

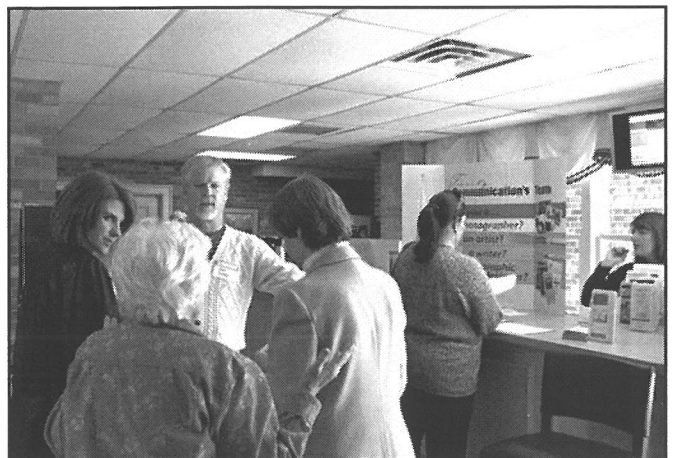
Trinity ministry Expo a great success

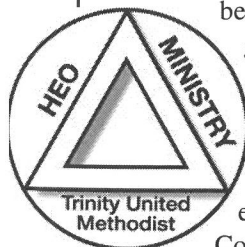

1086, Tallahassee, FL 32302. We will collect throughout the months of February/March and keep you apprised of the number of books procured in Trinity's name.

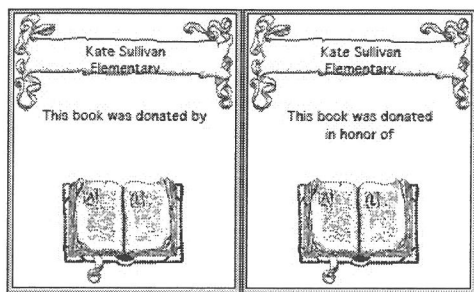

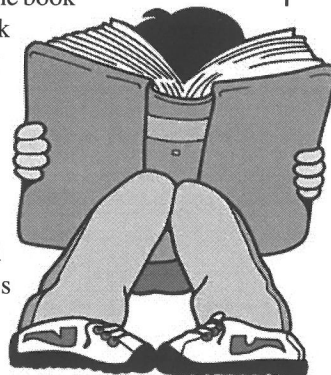

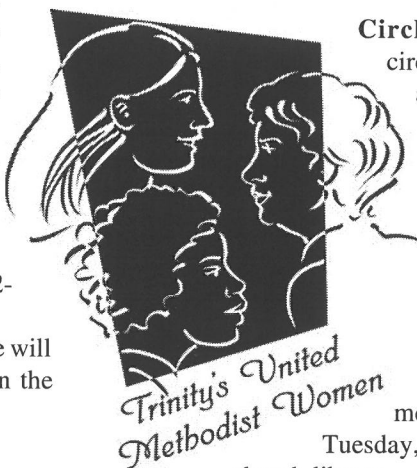

Of course, it wouldn't be Christmas without a NETKids' evening performance of the Christmas story (presented in a most unusual fashion) under the direction

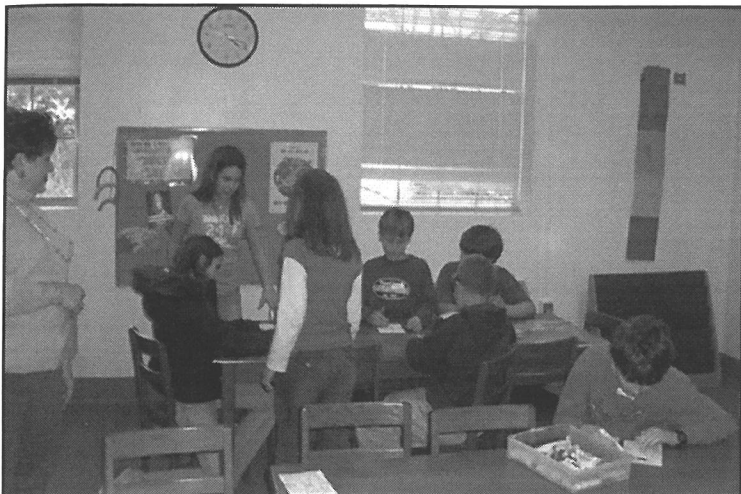
We had great fun and great food that night!

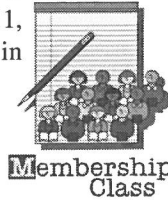

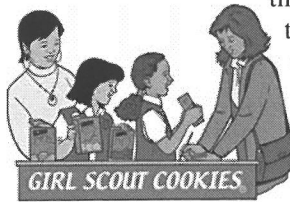

(FBBR) is a dynamic reading workshop designed for parents, grandparents, mentors and anyone who wants to help a child in elementary school learn to read and enjoy reading.

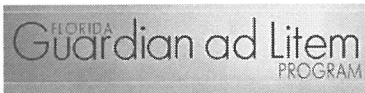

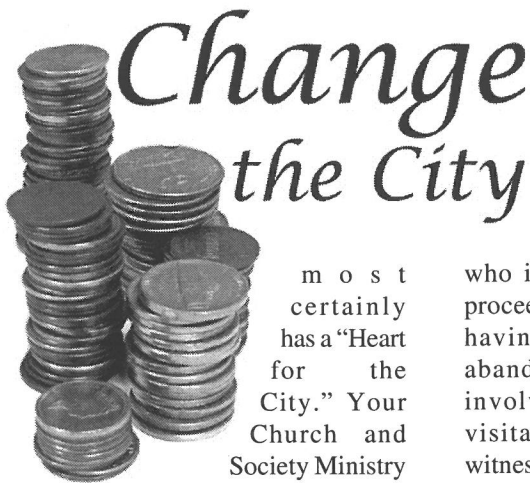


accept donations and provide funds and services for children and volunteers in the **Guardian Ad Litem** (GAL) program.
