

In the email, Rabbi Romberg was asking for a place of worship since the Temple Israel temple was to be remodeled during their "High Holydays" of Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur.

Trinity is happy to help. Reverend Willis' initial thought when he opened the email was "what would Jesus do?" Well, obviously Jesus was a Jew, but he thought, Jesus would want Trinity to "love thy neighbor." With that as his guide, he knew he wanted to seek the approval of Trinity's church leadership. Which is what he did.

Rosh Hashana, literally "head of the year," is celebrated on the first day of the Hebrew month of Tishrei.

On Yom Kippur, or "day of atonement," adults fast from all food and drink from sunset to sunset. Yom Kippur is the last day of the High Holydays.

Temple Israel will be using the Trinity sanctuary for Rosh Hashana on Wednesday, September 12 at 8:00 p.m., and again on Thursday, September 13 at 10:00 a.m. They will use it again for Kol Nidre, Friday, September 21 at 8:00 p.m. and for Yom Kippur on Saturday, September 22 at 10:00 a.m.

Words that Matter



each other up."


I Thessalonians 5:11.

Coming Soon



Become a Disciple through Bible study

Would you like to learn how to experience life in Jesus Christ? Would you like to learn how to love? Would you like to learn how to accept God's forgiveness? Would you like to use your gifts in ministry to others? Would you accept Christ's call to radical discipleship? Are you ready to be a disciple?

Then you may want to consider **Disciple Bible Study**. Materials will be on display through September 9th in the **Welcome Center**. A new class will be starting **Wednesday, September 5** as part of Lay Academy so that participants will be able

to enjoy dinner if desired and childcare will be available.

Disciple I – Becoming Disciples through Bible Study consists of thirty-four group sessions and deals with material from *Genesis* through *Revelations*, with the goal of developing biblically nourished persons committed to live as disciples of Christ. He will be greatly missed. Thanks for the many memories, Ryan!




Ministry of the month

Boys and Girls Clubs of the Big Bend (BGCBB)

For several years, Trinity has supported the Boys and Girls Clubs of the Big Bend. As one of its twelve major ministries, Trinity is substantially increasing its involvement with this important local youth program.

Just what is the BGCBB?

According to their literature, “[the BGCBB] is a youth development organization dedicated to promoting the health, social, education, vocational, and character development of boys and girls...to help young people improve their lives by building self-esteem and developing values and skills during critical periods of growth.” BGCBB is part of an international network of 3,700 clubs serving over four million children and teens. In Leon and surrounding counties, 4,000 such youths, most of who are disadvantaged, have a place to call home after school, on weekends and in the summer. At the BGCBB they receive assistance with learning and study skills. For many, the BGCBB is the only organized after school program that teaches positive personal development including:

- **Character and Leadership**—through community service.

- **Education and Career**—tutoring and homework assistance, computer training and career awareness.
- **Health and Life Skills**—drug abuse resistance, pregnancy prevention and family support.
- **The Arts**—arts and crafts, dance, drama, and choral groups.
- **Sports and Fitness**—game room activities, team sports, camping and nature studies.

The BGCBB has a staff of well-trained professionals and volunteers who daily serve children between the ages of 5-17. Without the BGCBB, many of these youth would be on the streets after school with no positive leadership or direction. In Leon county there are six clubs, all occupying

rented space located in the Orange Avenue/Southside, Frenchtown/Bethel, Miccosukee, and Ft. Braden areas.

This year these clubs expect to serve 1,800 young persons including provision of nutritious meals. During the summer program alone, \$30,000 in such meals are served throughout all of the Big Bend clubs. The clubs have a fleet of vehicles to provide transportation for children who need rides.

Successful track record

In every targeted area of personal development, studies have shown, the Clubs have a decided record of success. In Character Development there was a 70% increase of members' understanding of leadership roles and practical application of skill sets. In Education and Technology, members showed a significant improvement in math and reading. A recent comparative study showed that 83% of participants demonstrated knowledge of how to refuse drugs, identification of types of drugs, and the harmful effects of such drugs. Behavioral problems have decreased, grades including FCAT scores have improved, and school attendance has increased markedly. After school programs produce better students who stay out of trouble.

Invest now or pay later

A recent study by the Ross Institute on state and local government found that for every \$1 invested in after school programs, taxpayers saved \$3 in reduced juvenile arrests, incarceration, grade repetition, and other societal costs. The cost to provide after school programs for a child is about \$1,000. The cost per year to incarcerate a juvenile offender exceeds \$50,000. If a juvenile becomes a career criminal the direct and indirect costs to society exceeds 1 million dollars.

It is impossible to measure the human tragedy of wasted lives and grief stricken families. But Trinity can help make a difference in the toll of both human and economic loss through support of the Boys and Girls Clubs of the Big Bend.


