Reverend Willis plans retirement in June

At the conclusion of the 11 o'clock service on January 13, Reverend Willis announced to the congregation that he would be retiring at the end of June. He will have been with Trinity for 9 years and has had an enormous impact on Trinity.

Before he had even begun his work here as the senior pastor, he said, "I believe God has great things in store for us, and we can't wait to get there and get started." Boy, did that ever prove to be prophetic.

What can be said about a man who has done so much for so many? For this article, several of Trinity's church leaders agreed to write some of their fondest memories of Reverend Willis.

From Linda Yates, current United Methodist Women's chair and chair of the Preservation of Church History Committee: *When Pastor John arrived at Trinity in June 1999, he found out that there was one thing he didn't want to miss — in fact, couldn't miss.*

Trinity's 175th anniversary celebration was planned for the last Sunday in September and he was to have a major role. He became

part of Trinity's history that day as he led Acting Bishop Lloyd Knox, Tallahassee Mayor Scott Maddox, and Associate Pastor

Mark Caldwell down the aisle for the celebration service. A crowd of 842 persons filled the sanctuary to hear Rev. Willis' sermon and the music of all of Trinity's choirs.

"In the midst of all this, we must continue as the Church of Jesus Christ to reach out to others," Rev. Willis preached. "In addition to continuing what we are already doing, we need to find new

and better ways to share the love of God."

The rest is history: He introduced new ways to share God's love each year he has served here. — Linda H. Yates

From Ann Lumsden, chair of the Trinity Church Council: **My Favorite "John Willis Moments"**


When John Willis stood in the Trinity sanctuary on the first Sunday and walked to the marble steps and said "Do you know what an honor it is to be your Pastor, the Pastor of Trinity United Methodist Church in Tallahassee, Florida?" He was so sincere

and humble about this appointment that I knew this was a very special man to be our new pastor.

John has been so creative with our services, and has brought life, love, and caring to Trinity (The Church with a Heart). He rode a horse into the Park on Park Avenue to show exactly how the circuit riders came to Churches all over Florida. This outdoor service was just one example of the creativity of John Willis.

And the Lenten Study Groups were so meaningful for our Lenten Season. These small groups of members were given a study booklet and we met in homes and read the Bible assignments and talked about these assignments and how this fit into our life. Many neighborhoods in our Church area formed these small Lenten Groups to study 1) The Bible, 2) John, 3) Scriptures from our own Trinity Bible, and 4) The Cathedrals of England ... These study groups gave the Lenten Season a new meaning for each of us in Trinity United Methodist Church.

From Larry Pendleton, Trinity Lay Leader: *My first impression of John was lasting. As I began to converse with him on several issues, I soon realized that his enthusiasm and passion were catching. Whether it applied to fixing water leaks in the building or drumming up support for a "need," he was the same. His messages on Sunday contained the same passion. He went after everything with zest. It was always difficult to say no to him because you knew he believed strongly*


Why I am retiring and where I am going



Trinity website does all of that?

Hot links?

Before the invention of the internet, a hot link was likely the description for a spicy sausage. But, that is no longer the case as we are in the age of the world-wide-web, and an internet connection can be found in most homes.



Just what is a hot link then and how does it affect you? A hot link is any text or object on a website which takes the internet user to another location or web page when clicking on the text or object with a mouse.

Huh? Okay, let's try to describe this process a different way. On the Trinity website, at this very moment, there is a hot link you can use in order to try this (our website is www.tumct.org). Go to the left side of the home page toward the bottom of the page. You will see a graphic of hands holding the Trinity heart. As you move your mouse cursor over the icon, the cursor arrow will change appearance to a hand with the pointer (index) finger extended. This is a hot link. Whenever the cursor changes to the hand with pointer finger, this is an indication that there is more information beneath. Now, press down on the mouse until you hear it click. Voila! You have activated a hot link!

How to find hot links

Now that you have opened one, how can you recognize a hot link? Usually, graphics are hot links, especially if the graphic relates to the surrounding information.

A different color of text usually foretells text hot links. The best way to find hot links is to just run your mouse over the top of objects that look like they *might be* hot links. If your cursor changes into the pointer finger icon, there is a hot link under there. And, the more you find them, the easier it is to recognize them. Happy hunting.

They had planned a special ministry project for the children, along with a study of homelessness and God's call to help others less fortunate than we.


The class collected food items to make into "snack packs" for the homeless friends who come to Trinity's door. And how! By the time I came to their class to receive their "gifts" of food items and to talk with the children about Trinity's homeless friends, they had collected two large boxes of food, filled-to-the brim!

Bear Sunday Feb. 10


Make sure to bring a brand-new teddy bear to church with you on "Bear Sunday" – February 10, 2008.

Refuge House

Refuge House provides direct services to battered women, their children and victims of sexual assault. Refuge House, which opened its doors in 1978, provides emergency shelter and services to Leon and seven neighboring counties in North Florida.

Families come to the Refuge House when they have no other safe housing option. Shelter can be provided for 50 women and children for up to 45 days, as

well as a transitional housing wing which can house 20 women and children. While in the shelter, residents receive assistance in areas such as counseling and support groups. Special activities are designed to help children begin the process of recovering from violence. Families are provided with emergency foods, linens and other household items.

Trinity actively supports the Refuge House through the Church and Society Ministry Team. However, Refuge House also welcomes volunteers who can assist by answering the hotline, helping with



maintenance and providing meals, as well as providing medical and legal assistance. Opportunities also exist in the Thrift Store, which is always in need of responsible volunteers to help in all areas from sorting, tagging and stocking goods to customer service, to keeping the inside and outside of the store looking good.

John's dreams were big, they were bold, they were an invitation to the congregation and the staff to "jump on board." Before we knew it we had "Bear Sunday," "Community Sunday," a series of "Capital Faith Forums," and a "Legislative Breakfast." He rolled out the "Kate Sullivan Partnership and Mentoring Program," "Change the City," and the "Providence Neighborhood Project," to name a few. Just this year, John's budget recommendations nearly doubled the financial support given to many Church and Society Ministry programs—such programs as Habitat for Humanity, Boys and Girls Clubs, ECHO, The Shelter, Refuge House, and the Neighborhood Health Clinic.

There is no "halfway" about John Willis. With a twinkle in his eye, with gentle prodding and feverish planning, he made things happen at Trinity. We were admonished to come to a special service or an upcoming program with his familiar urging, "Trust me on this, you don't want to miss this one!" And we all followed him, and we came. He encouraged us to grow, to work, to "be there," to participate in ministry, to join him in learning about Christ and the love of God.

What's "not to love" about John Willis? His heart is as big as a basketball. He entertains youth with his "Hollywood" puppetry, he is a highly effective communicator, and his creativity keeps our heads spinning and our hearts "on track." John brought to us fresh and ever-changing elements of worship, using music and drama and visual effects together in new and different ways. Most

important, John's message was always unwavering and passionate, illustrating the love of God through scriptural teaching and preaching.

John Willis came to Trinity with a vision. He will be leaving this church with that vision engaged, lives enriched and a congregation changed for the better.
