WAYNE'S WORDS



It is with definite mixed emotions that I write my last Tidings entry as Trinity's HEO Coordinator. I have loved every minute, being an integral part of this wonderful **Helping Each Other** ministry. I cherish each of you who have volunteered in HEO ministry, each of you who are Trinity "family," each of you who are my treasured colleagues and my pastors. For members and friends whom HEO has served, I hope that HEO might have lifted your spirits some, given you a bit of support and cheer, and shared in your journey....both ups and downs...with encouragement and God's love. For me, a new and different chapter begins....

To make a very long story short, six months ago I injured my left knee. I have been through a number of treatments, x-rays, MRI's, and remedies. And my knee has only worsened and become more and more unstable. I will have arthroscopic surgery on November 7, followed by an

extended time of rigorous physical therapy and rehab. As you may know, HEO involves extensive visitation, shopping and doing errands for others, feeding our homeless friends, cooking with Trinity Chefs, delivering flowers, etc. - all things which require being active and on the feet, or in my case, putting impact on my injured knee. So, after heartfelt prayer and consideration, I have "retired" from HEO.

I am committed to working hard on my knee recovery so that soon I can return to Trinity, only this time as a volunteer once again! I want to thank everyone for the joy you have allowed me, being in ministry with you. My mother's favorite expression, when she faced both life's challenges and joys, was "This is the day that

Change the City for October - Capital Area Community Action Agency

Change the City contributions during the month of November will go to the Capital Area Community Action Agency. Created in 1965 to provide low-income residents of Leon County with childcare and transportation, today the organization offers a variety of services to help low-income families become self-sufficient.


The Agency's mission is to provide comprehensive services and resources to help reduce the effects of poverty, empower citizens with skills and motivation to become self-sufficient, and improve the overall quality of their lives, and our community.

One of the important services offered is Project Share, which provides utility payment and assistance for City of Tallahassee customers who meet specific eligibility requirements. Every year, hundreds of households with elderly or disabled members, or with children

under the age of five are assisted with their utility bills.

Another program under the Agency's umbrella is the Head Start Program which provides school readiness services to preschool children from low-income families. Services include pre-kindergarten programs in Leon and Jefferson County, and assisting children who are ready to begin kindergarten. The overall goal of Head Start is to increase the social abilities of participating children so that they can succeed in their present environment and deal with later responsibilities in school and life. Services are provided that enhance their social, emotional and cognitive development.

Capital Area Community Action offers many other types of assistance including child nutrition and mental health, specialized services for children with disabilities, and transportation for children




November Youth news


The FSU Wesley Connection at the Preschool

The "Wesley Connection" is really making a difference at the preschool! Some of you may be wondering just what the "Wesley Connection" is. Well, it began about a year ago when FSU student, Meghan Vevera, called and asked about a job! After setting up an interview with Meghan, I learned that she was an active member of the Wesley Foundation on FSU's campus. Once employed, she said the magic words I was looking for — "I have a friend who is also looking for a job!" Well, one year later, we are blessed to have not only Meghan, but also Hallie Nimrichter, Taylor Austin and Bobbie Brinkerhoff working with us as well! All four are students at Florida State University and active members of the Wesley Foundation.

"I like the community and the encouragement everyone gives to each other at the Wesley Foundation," Meghan said. "You feel like you are at home when you are away from home."

When asked about what she enjoys about working at the preschool, Meghan stated "I like working with my friends — we all love our job and it's fun to share stories about the kids." Meghan also noted that while she is glad to have her Wesley friends working here, she enjoys working with Dominique, Linzee and Veronica as well. These aides along with the Wesley Connection aides and teachers combine to make a wonderful, top notch staff! What a blessing to the children to have these loving and nurturing role models working here each day!

These could save a life!

Trinity recently purchased two AEDs (automated external defibrillator). These life-saving, self-contained units will be located in prominent and easy to locate areas (as of this printing, locations were still being discussed). The boxes that house the units are a bright white with red lettering.

Trinity's AEDs have a self-contained energy source that will last for several years.

An AED is a portable electronic device that automatically diagnoses potentially life threatening cardiac situations, and is able to treat them through the application of calibrated electrical impulses. This therapy stops the arrhythmia, allowing the heart to reestablish its normal rhythm.

AEDs are designed to be simple to use for the uninitiated, and the use of AEDs is taught in many first aid, first responder and basic life support classes. With the recently purchased AEDs, once the "on" button has been pressed, the machine will automatically begin with instructions, talking the user through each succeeding step.

Of course, the first step with any medical emergency is to call 911 for help. Then someone should be sent to locate the AED and follow the instructions from the unit. All Trinity staff has been trained in their use.
