Trinity gives school supplies to Nims Middle School

Several people came to help unload the Trinity bounty, including the coach for the school soccer team, whose team was the recipient of much needed soccer equipment.

Trinity recently had the opportunity to make a difference at one of Tallahassee's more troubled schools. As you may know, Trinity already has a wonderful relationship with Kate Sullivan Elementary School that offers opportunities for reading mentors and charitable giving.

But this is a new relationship that Trinity is building with Nims Middle School. And, it is in an area in which Trinity has already established a connection — the Providence neighborhood.

Thanks to the caring heart, good memory, and organizational skills of Bill Peebles, Jr., Trinity was able to deliver a truckload of school supplies to the school recently. Bill was aware of a need at Nims and he also knew of about \$2,400 in unused funds, which were designated for the Providence neighborhood. With this knowledge, Bill asked Reverend Curry if the unused funds could be used for this purpose. Reverend Curry enthusiastically agreed that this would be a good use for that money.

At Bill Peebles' downtown law office, a conference room had been reserved for the storage and organization of the supplies which had been purchased by Bill and his staff. Each teacher received their own personalized bag of supplies. In addition, Bill was able to purchase: erasable blackboards, markers, a clock, clipboards, markers, binders, batteries, 2-GB zip drives, anti-bacterial spray, a printer and paper, file boxes, ziplock bags, trash bags, shin guards, knee pads, referee's whistles, tab index folders, calculators, language games, 3-fold display boards, BrainPop (software), bulletin board trim, flip charts, easy grader (software), scissors, protractors, and other teaching materials for each classroom.

The commitment from Trinity will not end with this latest effort. In fact, the **BFC exercise class** donates all of its proceeds to the Nims relationship. The class, which meets Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9:15 - 10:00 a.m. in the Parlor, is led by Beth Curry, wife of Rev. Curry. The class is an open enrollment class that always welcomes walk-ins. The per-class fee is \$3.

Long-range plans call for the purchase of needed items for the teachers' lounge at Nims such as a refrigerator and microwave oven.

The purchase and organization of supplies required a lot of forethought. It was one of those outreach projects that just felt right and will hopefully continue to make a big difference in children's lives.

Dear Friends,

Sometimes, things in life don't happen fast enough for us. We are not people who wait well. Our time is the time in which we want what we desire to occur. That impatience, or that desire to control and manipulate can, at the very least, frustrate and depress us. At the very most, it can ruin what is part of God's plan.

Perhaps you've heard the story of the young, new preacher who was walking with an older, more seasoned preacher in the garden one day. Feeling a bit insecure about what God had for her to do, she was asking the older preacher for some advice. The older preacher walked up to a rosebush and handed the young preacher a rosebud, telling her to open it without tearing off any petals. The young preacher looked in disbelief at the older preacher and was trying to figure out what the rosebud could have to do with her wanting to know the will of God for her life and ministry. Because of her great respect for the older preacher, she proceeded to try to unfold the rose, while keeping each petal intact. It wasn't long before she realized how impossible this was to do. Noticing the younger preacher's inability to unfold the rosebud without tearing it, the older preacher began reciting the following poem:

*It is only a tiny rosebud,
a flower of God's design;
But I cannot unfold the petals
with these clumsy hands of mine.
The secret of unfolding flowers
is not known to such as I.
God opens this flower so sweetly,
when in my hands it dies.
If I cannot unfold a rosebud,

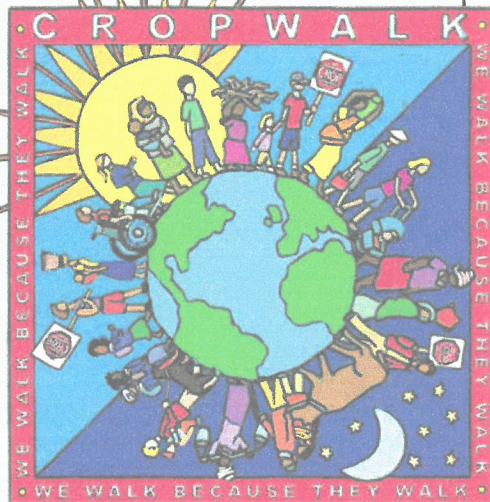
How you can get involved

Volunteer, Dot Binger, recently completed the HEO yearly financial audit, and we are grateful for her expertise in keeping us "on track" in budgetary matters. And finally, there are many HEO volunteers who are carrying out individual ministries every day - writing birthday cards to older members, delivering flowers, calling and checking up on members of the congregation who are in assisted living or health care facilities, writing notes of encouragement, and, perhaps most important, praying for one another.

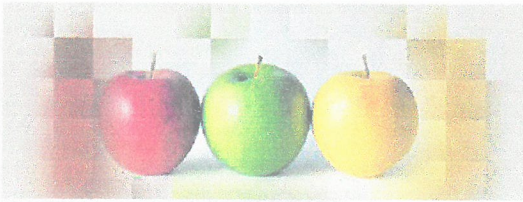

Change the City contributions for the month of October will help support the Gretchen Everhart School for Exceptional Students here in Tallahassee. Gretchen Everhart is a dynamic school that has served children with special needs at its Mission Road location since 1971. During that time, the school has been expanded and enlarged to include many new facilities and programs. The school serves students from Pre-K through 12th grade and maintains small class sizes which allows a greater focus on individual students. Gretchen Everhart sees each child as a unique individual with the ability to learn



and grow. Everhart accomplishes its goals with the support of parents, teachers, specialists and volunteers whose goals are to help each child develop maximum independence. The varied curriculum, geared to the individual student, includes everything from music and cooking to more traditional subjects such as writing and math.

Gretchen Everhart also offers a vibrant after school program that gives students additional opportunities to learn new skills and discover new abilities after the school day has ended. The focus of the program is to provide tutorial services and academic

enrichment activities designed to help students meet local and state academic standards in subjects such as reading and math. Programs also provide youth development activities, drug and violence prevention programs, technology education programs, art, music and recreation programs.

Volunteers are a key component in the success of the Everhart school. A variety of opportunities exist for those interested in providing one-on-one assistance to special needs children in areas such as tutoring, mentoring, assisting with rehabilitation exercises and teaching self-care skills. 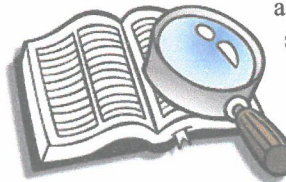

Immigration Lawyer Will Speak to UMW on Controversial Law

Local immigration lawyer Everett P. Anderson will speak on this country's immigration law and issues involving families, foreign adopted children, work, naturalization, citizenship and other aspects of the controversy of proposed changes in the law at the luncheon meeting of United Methodist Women at 11:45 a.m., Tuesday, Oct. 7, in Moor Hall.

The General Conference of the United Methodist Church, meeting in Fort Worth, TX this summer, adopted a resolution calling for full protection of all workers and the opportunity to gain legal status for all migrants. Many faith-based groups across the country are already ministering to the needs of immigrants where legally possible. The North West District of the Florida Annual Conference here in Tallahassee has been assisting local UM

churches in Quincy, Lee, Madison and Tallahassee in providing faith communities for immigrants.

"How we respond to our church's call to this ministry must be prefaced with an understanding and knowledge of this country's immigration law," UMW President Linda Yates said. "We are particularly

concerned with the plight of U.S. born children of illegal immigrants, with working mothers and families who are torn apart."

Senior Counsel of The Anderson Immigration Center, Everett Anderson has practiced immigration law exclusively since 1985. He is a member of the American Immigration Lawyers Association and a former part-time United States

Magistrate. He holds the rank of Lieutenant Colonel in the U.S. Army Reserve, having served in Europe and the Vietnam War.
