



"Grown-up" Superbowl Party a Huge Success



WAYNE'S WORDS

Dear Friends,

We are now in the season of Lent. Lent is a time for us to really look at ourselves and see ourselves for what we are.

The poet, Shelly, told of having a dream in which a strange, hooded figure appeared and signaled for him to follow. The poet ran after the mysterious figure and caught up with him. When he lifted the mask from the face, he was startled to find the likeness of his own face. As Shelly silently gazed at this likeness of himself, the figure asked, *"Are you satisfied?"*

And this is the question that each one of us needs to ask ourselves. Lent is set apart by the Church as a time for gazing at our true selves, as only we know ourselves, and asking: *"Am I satisfied? Do I like what I am?"*

- Am I pleased with every word I say or would I willingly omit any words if I could go back?
- Am I proud of the way that I treat others, not only the ones I like, but the ones I find hard to like?
- Do I stand alone when something is right, or do I stand with the crowd because it is more comfortable?
- Do I seek understanding, and fail to give it?
- Do I please myself or do I please others about me?
- Do I leave my Sunday principles behind on Monday morning and fail to pick them up until I return to church again? Or do I justify this by saying, "Everyone else does this, why should I do any differently?"



- Is my hope merely to increase each day in money, in pleasure, in fine clothes, in lots of friends? Or is my hope to increase in wisdom and to grow in the knowledge of God?

Am I truly satisfied?

Lent is upon us. Let us not observe it with wild festivities. Let us not observe it half-heartedly, with the feeling that it does not matter how I observe Lent and that it is no one else's business.


It is God's because He made us.

This spring tour will mark the Chorale's inaugural tour with Dr. Ames. The tour schedule will include a time of fellowship with the choral departments of Chiles High School, Leon High School, and Lincoln High School, with visits to the campuses of Florida A&M University and Florida State University. The Chorale also anticipates worshipping with the Trinity family during its morning services, and providing a concert in such a beautiful edifice.

"Maria Theresa" Mass

Composer Joseph Haydn was in his sixties living again in his beloved Vienna when he composed the "Maria Theresa" Mass in 1799. This was the fourth in a series of six great masses, written for his employer of many years, the rich and influential Esterhazy family. He wrote one mass per year in honor of Princess Maria Hermenegild, the wife of Prince

Nikolaus II, who was head of the Esterhazy family.

Maria Theresa of Naples and Sicily married Archduke Francis of Austria in 1790. He later became Holy Roman Emperor Francis II, and then Francis I, Emperor of Austria.

She was an important patron of music and musicians in Vienna and was fond of Haydn's music. Eventually, this mass gained the extra title "Maria Theresa."

Our Chancel Choir is joining with adult choirs from Faith Presbyterian Church and St. John's Episcopal Church to present this 40-minute masterwork. A professional orchestra will accompany the choir. Kevin Fenton, Assistant Director of Choral Activities at FSU will be the conductor. The concert will be at Faith Presbyterian Church at the corner of Meridian Road and John Knox Road on Sunday, March 22 at 4:00 p.m. All are invited to attend this special event.

Haydn was occasionally accused of composing music that was too cheerful for the church. His response is enlightening: He did not think God would reproach him for praising Him "with a cheerful heart."

United Methodist Children's Home Provides Vital Ministry

Throughout 2008, the Florida United Methodist Children's Home celebrated its centennial. When it opened in 1908 as the Florida Methodist Orphanage, the Florida conference described its purpose as "a noble Christian institution for the



relief, education and training of destitute, fatherless and motherless children."

Now as it moves into its second century, the Children's Home continues to be a vital mission of the Florida United

Methodist Conference, but one that has evolved over the years to provide an increasing array of services for children in difficult family situations or who otherwise have special needs. On its campus in Enterprise, Florida,

this ministry provides residential care, therapeutic group care, an emergency shelter program, a foster care program, adoption services, a community child care center, and independent living assistance. Its expanded purpose is now "To create an atmosphere which enables children and families with special needs to experience God's love and care as presented in the life and ministry of Jesus Christ. Combining

Christian influence with a healing, caring, therapeutic community, the Home provides a continuum of highly specialized services designed to strengthen individual and family life."



Financial support for the Children's Home comes primarily from individuals and churches within the Florida Conference. On **March 29**, as we do whenever there is a fifth Sunday in a month, we will collect an offering for the **Children's Home**. During difficult economic times such as these, it is more important than ever for us to maintain our support for this ministry and all of the children in its care.

Change the City for March - St. Francis Wildlife Association

What is St. Francis Wildlife?

St. Francis Wildlife, a non-profit organization, was founded in 1978 to provide care and rehabilitation for all species of sick, injured, and orphaned wildlife in North Florida and South Georgia. Each year, they receive and care for more than 3,500 animals, from hummingbirds and squirrels to bald eagles and river otters. The majority of the sick, injured, and orphaned wild animals received are suffering not because of "natural" occurrences, but because of human intervention -- some accidental, some intentional, many preventable: free-roaming pets, collisions with automobiles and windows, illegal gun

shots, development; and so on. St. Francis Wildlife eases the suffering of these animals by providing humane care and rehabilitation.



What is Wildlife Rehabilitation?

St. Francis cares for wild animals with the goal of returning each into its natural habitat. Each animal is examined, diagnosed and treated through a program of veterinary and hospital care prior to being released back to the wild. Those animals that are not able to return to the wild are moved to other locations including facilities such as the Tallahassee Museum of Natural History which provides a natural habitat zoo environment. Those animals that are beyond the help of St. Francis are humanely euthanized.



Where do I take an injured animal if found?

Sick, injured, or orphaned wildlife can be brought to the Northwood Animal Hospital in Tallahassee at 1881 N. Martin Luther King Boulevard (across the street from the Northwood Center). St. Francis also responds to rescue calls and calls to help with "nuisance wildlife."

Are volunteer opportunities available?

Many types of volunteers are needed, from working in the wildlife hospital and feeding animals, to working in the office, organizing fundraisers, talking to the public, distributing information and the like. Teresa Fillmon, founder/director of **His Kids Too!**, a charity that ministers to orphans and children at risk in the Ukraine, will speak at the luncheon meeting of United Methodist Women starting at 11:45 a.m., Tuesday, March 3, in Moor Hall.

The charity was founded in 2000 to provide adoption/foster care, camp programs, child sponsorships, educational resources, medicine, clothing and shoes in orphanages in the Ukraine. More than 2000 volunteers in 180 states have become involved in the 501K charity now recognized by the United States and the Ukrainian government.

The Fillmon family of Tallahassee has made many trips to Ukraine, delivering supplies and Christmas boxes to children in 15 orphan

facilities. Their goal of building and opening a Christian orphanage to bring the Gospel of Jesus Christ to people while ministering to their basic needs is now on the way to fruition. Women of Presbyterian Church USA recently granted 33% of its construction costs.

All Trinity women and guests are invited to attend the luncheon to learn about this Tallahassee family's missional outreach.
