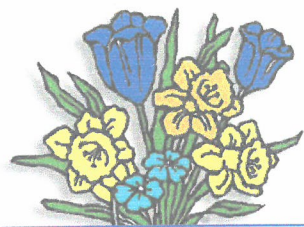

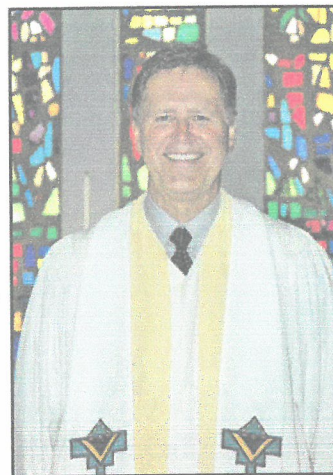

Preschool Music at Trinity

Monday mornings at 9:30 a.m. is a special time for music ministry at Trinity. Around 50 Preschool children and several of their teachers gather in the choir room

and say some amazing things. They absorb information like sponges. Their innocence and wide-eyed wonder at the world surrounding them is refreshing, even invigorating. We adults could learn a thing or two from them, like not taking ourselves too seriously and living in the moment.

Of course, I meet the children for only half an hour a week; just long enough to get them all wound up and send them back to their teachers!

Madrigals Are Coming

Mark your calendars and plan to attend; Our Madrigal Dinners are set for Friday December 11 at 7:00 p.m. and Saturday December 12 at 6:30 p.m. in Moor Hall. Tickets cost \$16.00 and will be available

from the church office starting Monday, November 30. They will also be available at Wednesday night dinners, December 2 and December 9. The price includes a full

meal and lots of entertainment, with our fourteen costumed singers the main attraction.

So what is a madrigal? This became the most common form of secular vocal music of the Renaissance (roughly 1500-1600) and into the first quarter of the 17th century. It started in Italy, spread through much of Europe and became especially popular with a number of English composers. Madrigals are usually sung in 3 to 6 parts, without instrumental accompaniment. Many communities have high schools, colleges or church groups that present Madrigal Dinners each year, usually near Christmas. Here at Trinity, our goal is to recreate a gathering of friends at a nobleman's castle circa 1600 to celebrate the Christmas season. "Christmas Feaste" would be a good alternate title for our event, since at least half of our music is tied to the coming of the Christ Child. We only sing a few madrigals and like to feature Christmas carols from various countries.

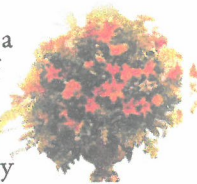

This group focuses on Men's issues. New participants are always welcome in this group.

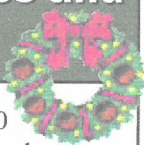
The BFC Series -Becoming Fit at Church - Total Body Toning

As part of the 2009-2010 fundraising efforts for youth area renovations, Trinity youth will be selling Christmas trees again this year.

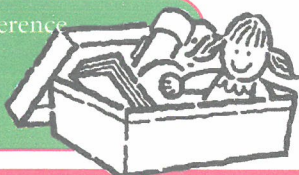

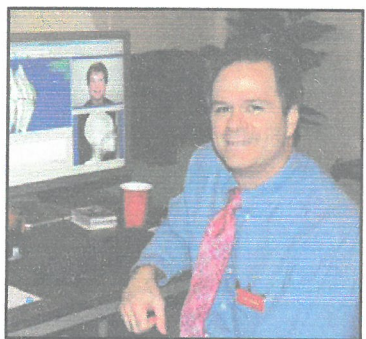

A new group is taking shape in the Trinity family, and it is serving a much-needed purpose. There is great ministry to our Youth, and the Wesley Foundations and other campus ministries serve faithfully on the college campuses. Our **Empowering Parents** group has also done well to bring together young families who typically return to Church as their children begin to grow. Unfortunately, there is often a large gap in ministry to individuals after they leave college and before they settle down with children. Nowhere is this more prevalent than the United Methodist Church, where the average member is now 57 years old.

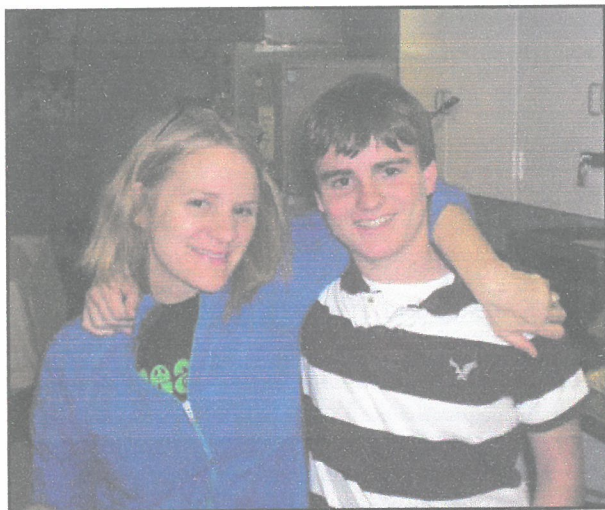

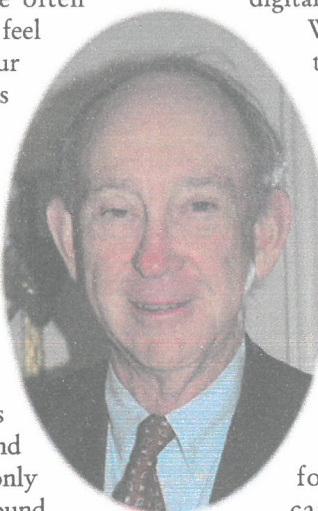

Volunteers needed!

There are so many wonderful ways to serve Trinity. Some are high profile jobs where your work is seen by most and your efforts are recognized during the process. With this type of service, the benefits it creates are often tangible, and you can feel the appreciation of your fellow members immediately. Other forms of service are so behind-the-scenes, so low-profile, that there is a likelihood that only one or two people know what good things you are doing. But Christians believe that all service is seen by the Creator, and sometimes that is the only quiet satisfaction to be found.

This lower-profile, quiet satisfaction has surely been the only benefit for Dr. Lynn McLarty. For over 10 years now, he has been working his way through the yellowed, tattered, and sometimes indecipherable documents of

the church and steadily converting all of the information contained within, into a more accessible, readable, digital format (Excel).

Why would he do this you may be ask? It's obviously not for any tangible recognition because, before reading this article, it's doubtful you had ever heard of this project.

His inspiration for this ministry came from doing genealogical research which made him realize that Trinity could do a better job of providing this vital historical information to both Trinity members and

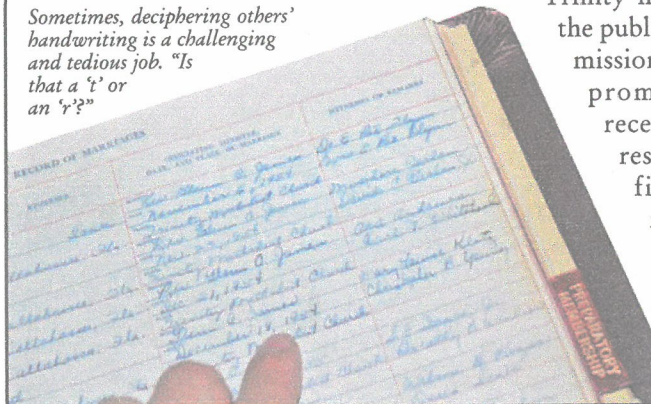
the public. This is exactly the type of mission Reverend Curry has been promoting within the church recently - find a ministry that resonates with you, and then find a way to make that ministry happen.

Now, after 10 years Lynn could use some help. Is this a ministry to which you feel led? He is looking for someone who is
