
## Trinity commemorates Memorial Garden

**O**n Sunday, June 27, Trinity members gathered in the Memorial Garden after the 11 o'clock service for a brief commemoration service — dedicating and sanctifying the Trinity Memorial Garden. Reverend Curry gave a brief history of the Sewell Prayer Garden and spoke of the beauty and serenity that can be found there.

For those who choose cremation, the garden is a sacred place on church grounds to memorialize the gift of a precious life. # WAYNE'S WORDS




# Trinity's community-partner-school supply drive

appreciated by the faculty, staff, and students alike. We begin each year with the supply drive and initiate the year long mentoring program in mid September. We will begin our collection to kick off the new school year on Sunday, August 8

and continue collecting through Sunday, August 15. Collection boxes will be found in the Narthex and at the Welcome Center outside Moor Hall. The donated supplies will be itemized and delivered before the school year starts August 23 to be distributed to students who would otherwise have difficulty acquiring the necessary school items. 
develop a narrative for the program.

Summer is a wonderful time - vacations, watermelon, VBS,


barbecue, Summer Camp, lemonade, Youth Week, did I mention vacations?

The following is a listing of some of the upcoming activities that have been planned by Reverend Barbara Hynes, our Associate Pastor of Discipleship.




### Promotion Sunday


