Sincere thanks on behalf of Bethlehem Ministry to all who participated in our annual Shoebox Christmas Program for the children of St. Barthelemy's School in Terrier Rouge, Haiti — Sunday School classes, UMW, and individuals. Your generosity in contributing both boxes and financial support is greatly appreciated. Last year we shipped 750 individual gift boxes which covered the 720 children in the school with a few left over for other children. On November 19th over

1200 boxes were delivered to Haiti by Missionary Flights International in Ft. Pierce. What a blessing! Without asking, people sensed the need and sent more. They arrived at my house from all over the US, and even from Canada. The extra boxes will be an unexpected surprise for the children of the 1000 or so refugees from Port-au-Prince area who are crowded into Terrier Rouge.





Celebrating Christmas at Trinity

Most church musicians invest a lot of time and effort in Advent/Christmas music. Here at Trinity, it is perhaps our biggest season of the year!

We start early, with Trinity Ringers participating in the only Massed Handbell Concert in the Tallahassee area, held each year at First Baptist Church. The concert is at 4:00 p.m. on Saturday, December 4. Many who attend then stay for the Winter Festival parade!

The very next day, we are pleased to host the FAMU Concert Choir's annual Christmas Concert. Remember, the group sang at our 11:00 a.m. worship service one Sunday this past April and they were WONDERFUL! Their concert is at 6:45 p.m. on Sunday, December 5 in our sanctuary. They will present the Christmas section of Handel's "Messiah," plus a selection of more contemporary Christmas music. The FAMU Handbell Ensemble will also perform.

Our NETkids annual Christmas Concert is set for Sunday, December 12 in Moor Hall. We begin with a pot-luck dinner at 5:00 p.m. with the music program immediately following. Something new this year is our NETkids Steel Band Ensemble, which will play 2 or 3 short selections. All are invited to attend as the choirs tell the Christmas story through our Christmas musical "Aaron, the Allergic Shepherd."

Youth Choir presents a Christmas Music Program at a retirement center on December 12 and NETkids Choirs visit a different retirement center on December 15.

Our annual Preschool Christmas Program

is Friday, December 17 at 11:45 a.m. in Moor Hall. The children present the Christmas story with costumes, dialogue and songs. It will be fun!

Christmas Eve services are always special occasions at Trinity. Warren May will be music leader for the 4:00 p.m. Vespers Service in our Chapel. Youth and Children provide most of the music for the 5:30 p.m. Family Service. Youth Choir, NETkids Choir, NETkids Steel

Band Ensemble, and Cherub Choir will all participate. Our 8:00 p.m. Lessons and Carols Service features music by adult groups, namely Chancel Choir, Trinity Ringers and new this year, our adult Steel Band Ensemble and Senior Handchimes. At 9:30 p.m. we have a Contemporary Service led by Circle of Friends Praise Band in Moor Hall. Finally, at 11:00 pm is our Communion Service with an ensemble from Chancel Choir singing a few selections.


If you enjoy singing, how about coming to the Community Christmas Dinner December 25 at noon and help in singing some Christmas favorites? It's a tradition!




Above, Pat Stafford sang "I'm In Love With A Wonderful Guy," from the musical *South Pacific*.



Ever since I was blessed with the position as the Helping Each Other (H.E.O.) Coordinator, I have wanted to somehow inspire more Trinity members to volunteer through the church in some small way - to put it on their "to do

list" - even if it is just one small effort once a month. Not so much because we "should," but because I want my church family to experience the joy I have. Serving at Trinity has given me so very much. It has deepened my faith and enriched my life. I want that same experience and opportunities for others.

So, I have been asking as many faithful and frequent church volunteers as possible: "Why do you do so much with the church? What or who inspired you?" Inevitably, many say the behavior was modeled for them growing up (as the sixth and seventh reasons listed below reflect - more on that in the coming months), but, one volunteer, after attending a very long (several hours long) committee meeting at church one night, took the time to contemplate the question and emailed my family member this truly inspiring response that so moved me (and that I really identified with), I wanted to share it with you. It was simply entitled: "Reasons." This is not your average forwarded email.

Reasons I Volunteer With My Church:

- I volunteer because I love Jesus and He speaks to me as we work together.
- I volunteer not to earn my salvation, but as a way to thank God for my salvation. When I think of all God has done for me, how He has saved me, and what He has saved me from - I cannot help but volunteer out of a heart of gratitude.
- Volunteering has increased my faith and been a display of what God can do in a life, as I have been enabled to do tasks far beyond my capabilities. When you KNOW how frail you are and see what God does - you know there is a really BIG God behind it. It is NOT you.
- Volunteering puts me in position to depend on God and not myself. When I am able to accomplish the work He gives me, it brings Him glory.
- I volunteer as a way to be a part of the Kingdom - not as an observer, but as a participant in what God is doing in the world.
- I volunteer because it was modeled for me by my father; it is his legacy.
- I volunteer to model it for my children - maybe it will be my legacy for them.
- I volunteer because it brings me joy.
- I volunteer to experience the character of God first hand, not just read about His character in His Word.
- I volunteer because when each one does what God has called them to, little ones come to saving faith.
- I volunteer out of obedience to what Christ calls us to do.
- I volunteer because it connects me relationally with people who also love Jesus.
- I volunteer because God has provided for our family in that I haven't worked outside the home, and some who would like to volunteer can't because of work commitments.
- I volunteer because I love people ...
