

#### Organist progress report

The process of applying for religious visas for our new organist Viktor Billa (known as R1 visa) and his wife Yuliia (R2) is well

underway. All the paperwork was completed and sent to the US State Department in late June. Additional information was requested by the State Department, which we and Viktor supplied in early to mid- September. We are in a holding pattern, awaiting word from our State Department. It is difficult to predict how long this will take, though we were given an early estimate of six months, which would put their arrival in Tallahassee in late December.

#### Viktor's first contact

In an email dated February 24, 2014, Viktor made first contact with our church about the organist position. He explained why he needed to move somewhere else: "Since July, 2011, I moved to live in my hometown where there is no opportunity to apply all my gained experience. I want not only to accumulate knowledge but also to share them with people. To develop not only myself, but also to develop people around, to glorify the Lord together." Later in the same

email, he said: "But I want to work in church, to serve the Lord. In America there are a lot of churches where work of the organist is paid. In Ukraine also there are many churches, but here work of all musicians without payment. Therefore I look for work in America."

#### Why an organist from overseas?

Our Organist Search Committee worked diligently from late January to May of 2014 looking for suitable candidates. Unfortunately, we were not successful. We brought two candidates to our church during that time, but they were not a good match for our unique needs. We need an organist who is a highly skilled musician: a very strong sight reader, able to read open score, a sensitive and experienced accompanist, and well-versed in hymn playing that supports congregational singing. Viktor was the only candidate that met all these criteria! We had done a national search for an organist. Partly as a result of this concerted effort, Viktor had seen our announcement on the internet.

#### A musician's mission project

Earning a living by Viktor and Yuliia will be severely limited by their religious visas. Yuliia cannot work at all. Viktor can only work for our church. For instance, he cannot be organist for a wedding at St. John's Episcopal Church and be paid for it. That means their income will be quite low for several years and they will need some help ... our help! Once we receive news that the State Department has approved their visas, we can fairly accurately predict when they will arrive in Tallahassee. We will issue a wish list to the congregation of items that will help them establish a household in Tallahassee. Think about it - they are moving from Ukraine with very few possessions (they are bringing a cat!). The Chancel Choir, for instance will

### Refuge House

Our local Missions Committee is proud to support and highlight Refuge House as an ongoing mission we support. Refuge House serves all people affected by domestic violence and sexual assault across the eight counties of the Big Bend. In addition, they offer support and resources to people who have been hurt by abuse or violence, along with guidance and encouragement for families and friends worried about a daughter, sister, child, or parent.

#### Their Mission:

The mission of Refuge House is to provide direct services to victims of domestic violence and sexual assault, and to their children and families, as well as to eliminate such violence through community education and public advocacy.

Here are a few of the services Refuge House provides:

- Emergency Shelter: Free confidential shelter including food, emergency clothing, counseling, and support for children, transportation, legal and medical assistance.
- Hotline: A 24-7 crisis counseling hotline providing safety planning, rape crisis response, crisis intervention, resource referrals, and screening for the emergency shelter.
- Outreach Counseling: Face-to-face, supportive counseling or therapy involving eight sessions or more, support groups, advocacy and support with law enforcement,

landlords and employers.

• Courthouse Assistance: Information and assistance in preparing petitions for protective injunctions, courtroom accompaniment,

along with referrals to free legal assistance and other Refuge House services.

• Rape Crisis/Hospital Response: Forensic exams performed by Refuge House rape crisis nurse examiner, along with crisis counseling, law enforcement advocacy for victim and significant others, medical


supervision, forensic expert testimony in rape trials, along with ongoing counseling and medical follow-up.

• Transitional Housing: Supportive, low/ no cost housing and counseling for domestic violence victims and children. Educational support, job readiness, financial literacy classes, legal assistance for immigrant victims along with residency for up to 2.5 years; an on-going healing program.

#### Ways to get involved:

• Adopt a Family for the Holidays: With the holiday season right around the corner, Refuge House is turning their attention to these families in need and making the holiday time of year easier for the women and children served. For many of the families, the holidays are filled with painful memories and a longing for a peaceful family gathering. additional homes will need to be built, along with a stable, campus life center, chapel, learning center, daycare, counseling offices, houseparent retreats, dining hall, gym, vocational tech center, commissary, and volunteer housing.

This new and exciting venture offers opportunities for Trinity and other area churches to be involved in making a difference in the lives of children who are caught up in difficult situations.

Children's Home, which serves children in situations of financial hardship, abuse, and neglect by providing a home where each of them can feel safe and experience the love and care they need to succeed in life. Each residential home can house up to 12 children and has two sets of house parents who alternate every other week. Each child has his/her own bedroom and bathroom. The children eat in their homes "family" style, share in chores, and attend local public schools.

Eventually, the goal is to serve 100 youth ages 6-17 in the residential program. To meet that goal,
