Where will you be on May 9? Make Visioning Day a priority

Will you be participating in Visioning Day at Trinity on Saturday, May 9, from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.? The answer to that question may have great impact on the growth of your and your children's spiritual life and the vitality of our church during the next five years.

A preview of the results of the internal survey about Trinity and its ministries, that 416 members of the church completed in April, show high marks for worship services, music, friendliness and community service, but also revealed the need for improving our children and youth ministries, more opportunities for individual spiritual growth and outreach, and morality teaching.

Co-chairs for "Trinity's Visioning for Tomorrow's Harvest," Paula Smith and Lawton Langford urge all members, young people and parents of youth to take part in

Several youth participated in the Core Values discernment session in March.

Visioning Day so their views on personal spiritual growth, building a stronger Trinity community, reaching more effectively into the surrounding community, and making better use of technology to spread God's message will be included in the Vision that results from the day.

"The day needs all members of the church,

not just those who are families with youth, to share their experience and changing needs," Lawton Langford said.

Increases in growth, diversity and ages of the church's members also were concerns in the survey. Trinity's membership is concentrated in ages 50 and older and new members will be needed to maintain the vitality of the church. How can Trinity attract new members and develop new Christians?

A complete analysis of the survey is being prepared by Christina Drouin, consultant for the "Visioning for Tomorrow's Harvest," who will also lead Visioning Day. Each participant will receive a packet of research materials and strategic planning guidelines prior to the event.

Visioning Day in lay persons' language might well be "we are the church." Our church, Trinity, is providing an opportunity





for members to decide what ministries they need for the growth and transformation of ourselves, our families and our community and how an involved church family can accomplish them.

Participants will be guided by a Mission Statement and set of Core Values developed at the first session of the visioning process on March 8. That Sunday afternoon, 172 members met in Moor Hall to develop the statement and Core Values they perceive reflect what Trinity believes and practices as Christians.

The Core Values are Faith, Worship, Love, Service and Community. The Mission Statement is: 'Because of God's love for us through Jesus Christ, we exist to worship, grow and serve.' The Church Council approved both at a meeting on March 31. These will also be in the packet of materials to provide the basis for any strategies approved on Visioning Day.

Health Wellness Visioning

Just as Trinity is taking time to look at its vision to make sure we are focusing our efforts as God directs, so the Health Wellness Ministry is evolving and looking at how its activities can best fit into the overall vision at Trinity.

The Health Wellness Ministry MISSION

Serving God Through - Self, Church and Community and Always Being Faithful

• By maintaining our body, we are better able to physically serve.

BFC (Becoming Fit at Church) is serving self by becoming healthy - but also church and community because of dollars raised. With only a suggested donation of \$3/session, we have raised over \$30K which has been used for various charities and to maintain exercise equipment. Two classes are offered 3 times a week (Tue, Wed, Thu) for different skill levels. BFC is the foundation of this ministry, which has not only helped us keep our bodies strong and healthy, but has helped us form



strong bonds with other members and a few non-members. Doing our part to be strong and healthy is part of God's plan: "Don't you realize that your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit, who lives in you and was given to you by God? You do not belong to yourself, for God bought you with a high price. So you must honor God with your body." (1 Corinthians 6:19-20) Trinity Runners/Walkers Club provides a fun way to exercise and socialize, with a bonus of helping others when we win a monetary prize as we have in many races.

• By finding ways to be involved at church, we can serve God by helping one another.

The Community Garden is a wonderful opportunity to serve God by helping others at church and in the community by planting and tending a bountiful garden of delicious veggies – free to all. You can help plant, water,

weed, or pick the veggies for yourself or to give to others. The HW ministry has also coordinated with One Blood (http://www.oneblood.org) to make the bloodmobile available at church several times a year, providing a way to help others by donating life-saving blood. For the last six years, the HW Ministry has provided a Health Fair with free screenings as part of TLC Sunday. Helping those who may not

have a regular doctor or don't think they



need screenings has proven to be very useful to several whose screenings have turned up a serious problem that needed to be addressed immediately. **CPR classes** are also offered several times a year.

• By reaching outside the walls of our church, we can serve our community and world.

For 4 years (starting in 2011), the HW Ministry has sent a **Medical mission** team to Guatemala and helped hundreds of natives, some who have never had access to health care before. Their stories are heart-rending



and inspiring - you can read many of them in previous issues of the Tidings (see the website for past issues http://www.tumct.org/ connect/monthy-tidings-newsletter/). Mats for the Homeless is an ongoing ministry that makes sleeping mats for Tallahassee's homeless men, women, and children. These thick, spongy, water-resistant mats are made from recycled plastic grocery bags - a win-win for the recipients and the environment. Hats for the Homeless is another community-focused ministry that gives out hundreds of pairs of warm hats and scarves during the winter months. Some of the friends who come to the BFC classes have joined with Trinity to donate materials and help make the hats and scarves along with our members.

As you can see, the various activities of the HW Ministry listed above have a primary service area, but most overlap the three main components of its mission (serving through self, church, community), and serve more than one area.

A Note from Blake ...

Have you ever had to skip a meal or been working on something so intently you just forgot to eat? By the time you got around to eating a few hours later, it started to feel like you could hardly stand it anymore. Food is definitely a passion of our culture, and for the vast majority of us, readily available whenever we might need it. However, this is not the situation for people here in Tallahassee, around the country, and around the world.

This past month we had 22 students voluntarily fast for 30 hours while participating in the event 30 Hour Famine, which is coordinated by World Vision. This

was an opportunity for our students to see and feel firsthand what it is like for millions of people to go without proper nourishment. Through an interactive experience called TRIBE, students learned the harsh realities of people living in Ethiopia, struggling with barriers such as lack of clean water and proper education.

We also discussed what people even living in Tallahassee struggle with when they live in a "food desert". This is when an area is lacking in fresh fruit, vegetables, and other healthful foods and happens many times in impoverished areas.

On Saturday, the students worked hard at

the Big Bend Habitat for Humanity ReStore, completing projects ranging from digging a trench to hanging doors to raking leaves. In fact, they worked so hard they were able to complete the full list of things to do much faster than anticipated.

The students did an amazing job throughout the whole weekend and I am so proud of each and every one of them. They were sacrificing themselves for the least of these and I couldn't think of a better way to spend 30 hours with them.
