In 1999, Mr. Sam Rogers became a mentor at Kate Sullivan Elementary School when he was recruited through an outreach program at Trinity United Methodist Church. Each year, for 19 years, he has taken two first-graders under his wing and helped them with reading. In the process, he has adopted the entire first-grade classroom, forming a relationship with each student.

### Making it personal

Every holiday, he writes simple scripts for skits for his mentees to perform for the entire class. When Sam returns from one of his amazing trips, he presents the class with a slide show (many pictures featuring the class's Flat Stanley) and brings a souvenir for each student. In this way, he broadens every child's view of the world.

#### Why he does it

He recognizes the importance of adult-child relationships and makes it a priority to know every child in the classroom. His dedication, creativity, and longevity as a mentor bear

out his own words that "Our children are our community's most precious asset. Community involvement in our schools is critical to the process of validating the challenging work of classroom teachers." Because of Sam Rogers, hundreds of students and Kate Sullivan Elementary, in general, are better because he is a member of the school.

Sam Rogers also has a love for Hope Community. There is no other way to describe his service to others than love for his fellow man. Sam is a great leader who loves the people that he serves as well as the people with whom he works. And yes, Sam also has the gift of recruiting people!

Then he volunteered to help get the residents of Hope Community fed. Now he coordinates that ministry, and volunteers his own time as well, the second Tuesday of every month.



## I Remember Momma!

I stood behind her on the concrete landing. The steps climbed up to my childhood home on Cherry Lake, The Eagles Nest Lodge, and I remember grabbing on to Momma's skirt and holding on for dear life! I peered from behind her as together we watched a water moccasin stretch across the entire width of the steps as it sunned itself on a warm July day!

As I watched with anticipation, Momma grabbed the shotgun, and while six months pregnant with my younger brother Thomas, aimed carefully, and protected her family from this all too familiar Florida reptile. Yes, I Remember Momma!

There wasn't much she couldn't accomplish when she set her mind to it. She majored in English, with a minor in Speech and Drama graduated with honors from Columbia College, Columbia SC, and played the part of Romeo in the All Women's College production of Romeo and Juliet! She taught Senior English at Madison High School and even directed the operetta, "Amahl and the Night Visitors" by Gian-Carlo Menotti with yours truly playing the role of Amahl in the Christmastime production. Yes, I Remember Momma!

She routinely drove the ski boat as my brother and his friends performed a Cypress Gardens quality ski show complete with skiing on wooden paddles, sitting on a wooden chair atop a homemade plywood disc, and 4-5 tandem skiers being pulled-up at once with several shoulder mounts for added drama. Yes, I Remember Momma!

Momma's favorite summer afternoon included a picnic in the yard with relatives and friends, watermelons floating in the shallow cool waters of the lake, and plenty of cokes, orange, and grape sodas iced down in galvanized wash tubs. The summer days were filled with activities until the sun went down and Momma called her children home by flicking the front porch lights on the lake in a "morse code" type signal to call her family home for dinner. **Yes, I Remember Momma!** 

On Mother's Day, I will fondly remember my Momma who taught me about unconditional love, and who lived her life as a faithful witness to her Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. She continued to



teach me in life and in death, what it means to be a faithful disciple of Jesus Christ. **Yes, I Remember Momma!** 

This passage from **Proverbs 31** might say it best...

A woman of noble character who can find? She is worth far more than rubies.

Her husband has full confidence in her and lacks nothing of value. gifts. If you'd like to ride in the church van, contact Gloria Colvin at 894-3625. We'll leave from the church at **9:30 and return** by **2:30.** 


Also during May, we're seeking contributions to purchase gift cards for summer recreational activities for the children living at the Ranch. We would





It's always nice to take a small bouquet of flowers that have been prepared lovingly by our Altar Guild, along with the latest Upper Room daily devotional, or perhaps even communion (yes, we have travel kits!). Whether or not you have something in hand when visiting, of utmost significance is the joy and love that is expressed through this gesture of kindness and companionship. The mission of "Heart to Heart" is to establish something of a network, to make sure all our 'at home' congregants feel loved and included - reassuring them, by our presence, that they are an active part of Trinity life.
