Get Ready for Lent!

I went back to my exercise class on Monday to get "ready" to get into shape this spring! After my surgery in October, everything seems tender and less firm! In short, my body is really not ready to exercise, but then again, is it ever going to be ready? There comes a time when we just have to start! As the old Nike commercial used to remind us, Just Do It!

I ran across an article last week by George Martell that shared some great ideas about preparing for the Lenten Season, beginning with Ash Wednesday on February 26. Here is a modified plan that might be helpful for all of us to get into shape by the time Lent begins:

1. Get moving physically

Being made of both body and soul, I'm still inclined to forget how much the body tends to influence the state of my soul. On the days when I sit around on the couch or binge-watch a show on Netflix for hours, I find that I'm much less likely to have the energy to get off the couch and do something productive! But on the days when I've taken a walk, or exercised a bit, it couldn't be more different. I'm more cheerful, more hopeful, and have more energy to give to others. It's the perfect state of mind to try to begin to make some changes and become more disciplined in my life.

2. Get moving mentally

Feed your mind. Even if you aren't doing spiritual reading, any reading at all might be more helpful than you think. Just reading a whole article, instead of just the headline and then a quick skim of the content has a way of fostering the habit of following through on what you've started. It helps me learn not to give up easily. And the mind, like any muscle, needs to be exercised in order to stay strong. Using your mind more often can help deepen your understanding of your faith, which is rich beyond measure, and has so much to offer.

3. Start noticing your problem areas

Now is the time to start thinking about what areas of your spiritual life need some attention and review. A good examination of conscience will direct you to changes that are personally right for you, both physically and spiritually, helping you see your Lenten goals more clearly.



4. Make it to Worship!

You've already made a good examination of your conscience and your needs, so don't waste it. "Get Thyself to Worship!" Find your way to communion and the Altar of Confession. It's always a good choice to find a way to be closer to Jesus. After all, isn't that the whole point of our Christian Faith?

5. Pray, pray, pray...

Someone once told me, when all else fails, PRAY! You don't have to be in the mood, you don't even need to have that much energy, and you don't need to have that much to say for your prayer to be a good one. What matters is perseverance. Never underestimate the power of prayer. When my grand-daughter prays at the table, it is often the simplest of prayers, but they are often the most profound as they speak into the center of my heart.

Prayer may be hard at first, but once it's part of your routine, it becomes second nature. And wouldn't we love it if daily prayer was second nature to us all?

Lent can be a wonderful time to put your life back in order! We are still putting up Christmas and my wife Ramona is determined to sort through our many decorations and organize them by separating them into used and unused, indoor and outdoor, cloth and mildew proof! We are choosing which ornaments will stay and which ones will be given away. It takes time, but the end result will be peace of mind and an organized attic and closet. May we begin this season of Lent with an intentional prayer life!

St Paul reminds us to "pray without ceasing..." (1 Thessalonians 5:17) Maybe we can start with praying every day, for now!

She has not spoken at all for quite a few weeks....nothing. But when we started singing familiar Christmas carols like Silent Night and O

Come All Ye Faithful, she perked up and started singing along!" How powerful it can be, when words are put to music!

Funerals are usually very emotional experiences for the immediate family, especially if the deceased was quite young. During my time as Music Director at First United Methodist Church of Tarpon Springs, a family had several children in our Children and Youth Choirs. They were an active family in the church. The father even went on one of our Youth Choir tours as a chaperone. He became quite ill and in a few weeks passed away. Of course that was a difficult funeral even for my wife Cindy and I. The family asked Cindy to play some meaningful piano music before the service was to begin. She of course agreed. One of their requests was

"The Rubber Duckie song". You can google it and watch Sesame Street character Bert sing it. But why at a funeral? Because the children fondly remembered their father singing it to them, sometimes at bathtime. So of course, Cindy played it. How powerful it can be, when words are put to music!

And so it is, when we join together in worship to sing hymns and praise songs. If you feel you cannot sing, perhaps you can read the words as others sing them. Those words are a part of our precious faith, part of our walk with God! How powerful it can be, when words are put to music!

Console Upgradings and 2020 Celebration Concert

During summer in 2019 the organ console was upgraded by Casavant - combinations system from 64 to 999 levels of memory, with piston sequencer; new display panel showing the memory level, current piston and crescendo level; record and playback capabilities; new keyboards with bone-covered naturals and ebony sharps and other works.

The Celebration concert will take place **Friday, February 21 at 7 p.m.** by Trinity organist Viktor Billa. The program will include masterpieces of the most famous works by J.S. Bach, Franck, A. Guilman and virtuoso composer Marcel Dupre. A special dedication will be to one of the former organists, Myron Mundy. In his memory will be performed "Sketches on African-American Spiritual Songs" by Hungarian composer Antalfy-Zsiross Dezső.

And the crowning piece of the program is Concerto for Organ, String orchestra and Timpani in G Minor by Francis Poulenc under the direction of Yuliia Billa as a conductor, and Viktor Billa soloist.

Unlike other musical instruments, each pipe organ is a unique creation. In the 120-year history of Casavant Freres no other organ has been built with the same list of stops, in an identical configuration or with the particular visual appearance of this instrument. Just as each church is architecturally different, so too are its acoustics and the musical needs of the congregation. Therefore, the task of the organ builder is to conceive and blend the appropriate elements in order to assure a successful result when the organ is installed and voiced in its home.

While no two organs are alike, organ design is not an undisciplined art. There must be an overall tonal concept, or tonal architecture in order to give structure and form to the resulting instrument. One may think of good organ design as a kind of tonal pyramid where the foundation is provided by the bass voices, with other stops representing the tenor, alto, and soprano registers. In this instrument each of the four divisions (Grand Orgue, Récit, Positif and Pédale) has a well-developed complement of stops from bass to treble, thus providing a solid foundation of tone at various levels of dynamics. There are no less than seven stops in the instrument at the 16-foot pitch. Four flue stops and three reed stops. The flues consist of two open stops, the Contrebasse and Violonbasse and two stopped wood ranks, Soubasse and Bourdon. Casavant Opus 3786 occupies a physical position similar to that of the previous organ, however, in order to bring the sound of the instrument more directly into the building, two new cases were created to house the principal stops of the Grand Orgue and Pedale divisions on the left and right sides of the chancel respectively. The expressive Récit and Positif divisions are behind the casework on the right, while the Grand Orgue and Pedale divisions are housed in a similar position on the left. The woodwork of the two cases and console incorporate architectural details found on the choir modesty



screen and wainscot, while the hand-carved pipe shades feature a decorative motif found in the altar.

"When we were informed that the commission for the new organ for Trinity

United Methodist Church was to be entrusted to us we were extremely pleased to have this opportunity to build an organ for Florida's capital city, not only to serve the congregation but also to be a tool for outreach to the community at large. We trust that its musical voice will enrich and inspire all those who hear it for many generations." **Casavant Frères**

History of our Organ - Opus 3786

The delivery of Casavant Opus 3786 was accomplished on Oct. 12, 1999. As the large truck was unloaded during the day and safe places to store the pipes and other components were found, the full realization of the magnitude of the project was apparent.

The installation crew, Organiers Guy Leclerc and Mario Vanasse, had assembled and disassembled the instrument in the Casavant factory, where every detail had been tested prior to shipment. The technical expertise of the crew, their intimate acquaintance with Casavant Opus 3786 and their people skills facilitated the installation, which was completed within the allotted time of four weeks.



History of our Organ - Opus 3786 (continued)

The month-long process for the tonal adjustment of Opus 3786 afforded the congregation opportunity to become acquainted with the visual presence of the instrument in its place in the sanctuary. The painstaking work of voicing was done by the Casavant team of Yves Champaigne and J aeton Robert; as this phase progressed, Dr. Michael Corzine, Professor of Organ at Florida State

University, and Trinity Organist James E. Lorenz provided consultative assistance. The organ was accepted on behalf of the Board of Trustees by Dr. Corzine and Mr. Lorenz on Dec. 10, 1999.

The dedication of the instrument was conducted at both the 8:30 and 11 am. worship services of the congregation on Dec. 19, 1999. Before the organ had been

played in public, Opus 3786 was presented to the Board of Trustees by the Chairperson of the Organ Committee, Dr. Myron R. Blee. Mrs. Eleanor H. Smith, Chairperson, accepted the organ on behalf of the Board of Trustees.

Houseparents provide assistance to youth which includes learning manners, courtesy, and basic cooking skills in addition the children attending public school. Each residential cottage houses 12 boys or girls who are provided with an individual bedroom that they learn to keep clean and tidy. They are also

provided with a trail bike for recreational outings. The most important mission of the ranch is to let the children know that people love them and to bring the component of faith into their lives.

Guatemala Trip 2020

What You Need to Know!

We are pleased to announce some of the details for our 2020 trip to Guatemala. The trip dates are **November 7 -14th**. We have secured 15 seats on our flights at just \$10 over what we paid last year, which makes our total airfare costs just \$580 per person. With the ground fees added in, that brings our total to \$1360 per person. This price includes the trip to Antigua on Friday. The fees for medical clinics and construction are pending, and depend upon whether or not we go to Boca Costa, as before. That is something we can discuss at our first meeting, as it will affect our fundraising efforts.

There is a deadline of February 10th to pay the \$100 per seat deposit for our group rate.

If we don't have at least 10 people confirmed at that time, we will lose our group rate. If you are in the Tallahassee area and want to go, please consider flying with the group so we can meet our minimum. Otherwise, we will lose our group rate and will have to pay the regular fare, which is running \$2,000-2,700 per person. You can send checks directly to Jayne Mittan, made out to Trinity United Methodist Church. Her home address is 11398 Buck Lake Rd., Tallahassee, 32317. Please put "Guatemala Airfare Deposit" in the memo line. Jayne will make sure they get to Trinity. If you are not in the Tallahassee area and want me to make your reservations, please let us know as soon as possible! This special rate may not last long.
