FAQs for Churches During COVID-19:

Reopening Church Buildings

Note: These FAQs are in addition to the guidelines previously sent regarding in-person worship and ministry. We continue to ask for no in-person worship through June 15. These FAQs are for the present time and to help you prepare for the future.

What does the annual conference most want its clergy and laity to do and know?

- Practice frequent washing of hands.
- Wear a mask whenever you encounter others in public.
- Monitor your own symptoms related to health. If you don't feel well, please stay home.
- Keep a six-foot distance from others.
- Maintain civil and open conversation with others.

What is the recommendation regarding masks?

According to the CDC and state guidelines for similar venues, staff and volunteers are required to wear face masks or cloth face coverings. In an effort to protect everyone and love our neighbors, we ask everyone in attendance to wear face masks or cloth face coverings. Churches should have a plan in place to address those who are unwilling to wear masks. Clergy and others on the platform can remove masks during preaching and worship leadership if they have more than six feet distance with other persons on the platform and more than twelve feet distance from the first row of occupied chairs.

What is the recommendation regarding congregational singing and groups and individuals leading singing during worship?

Based on the science available to us, we recommend no congregational singing. Churches who choose to have limited congregational singing should make people aware of the risks involved while requiring increased social distancing (beyond six feet) and the wearing of masks. Choirs and other large ensembles singing in close proximity are prohibited. Soloists and small vocal ensembles can lead singing and music from the platform if they have more than six feet distance with other persons on the platform and more than twelve feet distance from the first row of occupied chairs.

What is the recommendation about day camps and preschool this summer?

We understand many preschools and day camps will choose not to have programs this summer since public schools remain closed. Day camps and preschools must follow all the CDC and state guidelines, which are extensive. Churches wanting to open a day camp or preschool must send their District Superintendent a clear plan on how they plan to abide by the guidelines.

How do we create a healthy conversation among our leaders?

We encourage you to listen to the concerns of your leaders. Attempt to understand what may be behind their concerns or what may be their unstated concerns. Help leaders and attendees visualize what church will look like if they return with social distancing, masks, no singing, etc. Create a video to help people visualize. Reframe questions and frequently check for understanding.

What is the recommendation for HVAC and airflow within buildings?

It is recommended that you discuss with facility staff and trustees how to increase ventilation and the flow of outside air to ensure proper air circulation when persons occupy buildings.

What if your pastor is part of the vulnerable population?

Pastors in the vulnerable population should discuss how to cover worship leadership until they feel comfortable in returning to worship. Staff Parish committees should discuss with all clergy their comfort level in returning to worship. Confidentiality regarding a pastor's health should be maintained.

What about small gatherings for funerals, weddings, baptisms, etc. before June 15?

Small gatherings of less than ten persons are permissible, but clergy must seek permission from their Superintendent and follow specific guidelines approved by the Cabinet.

What screening questions should we use with employees/volunteers who return to campus?

Standard recommended screening questions have been created around symptoms and contact with persons who may have symptoms or have tested positive to COVID-19.

What do we do when an attendee doesn't follow the guidance/written guidelines?

Churches should have a plan in place on how to respond if someone does not follow the guidance. It would be best if the pastor reminded everyone gathered of the covenant they have entered into together by agreeing to follow the protocols. Posting signage at the entrance of the church with a simple statement of the covenant around masks and distancing can help prepare people. Pastors can approach persons unwilling to follow the protocol or train a few key leaders to assist with this work. Approaching someone unwilling to follow the guidance should be done with care and love.

What do we do when someone who has been on campus tests positive?

Church facilities will need to be regularly cleaned according to the CDC guidelines. If someone tests positive, additional cleaning should take place. Churches should call their local health department for guidance on whether it is necessary to close facilities for a period of time. Additionally, churches should contact the Ministry Protection Office and their District Superintendent around best practices of letting congregants know of the possible exposure. At no time should someone's individual identity be disclosed.

What will the guidelines look like after June 15?

We are still discerning what the guidelines will be after June 15. If we resume worship, it will be in a limited fashion with previously published strict guidelines. Currently, we are considering recommending six feet between family groups in all spaces with capacity limited to 25% of what a building or room can hold. We recognize there will be a need for flexibility and contextuality. Safety remains our primary concern.

How will my congregation know when it is ready to return?

We would encourage a team-based approach. Consider virtual listening sessions or surveys. Read together "Why Reopening a Church is Different." It should not be simply based on what other churches are doing. Many in our state and church communities are part of the most vulnerable populations. Pay attention to your local COVID-19 rates and reach out to health experts. Be prepared to modify plans if cases in your community rise. Acknowledge the diversity of feelings and responses within your community. Continue to allow for online options and conference calls.


Finale

My Virgin Mary On Toast

I knew the stay at home had finally gotten to me when the Rice Krispy Cereal box began to remind me of the religious icon in my office. Just in case the stay at home notice affected you too, the religious icon is the one on the left. They're meant to act like a quick link of a heavenly kind, telling us something true about God, and work as a form of prayer for the viewer.

It's called the Old Testament Trinity. It's from the perspective of Abraham in Genesis 18 when three heavenly visitors arrive. Abraham and Sarah prepare a feast in an effort to encourage the visitors to stay awhile longer.

Icons are painted two dimensional so not to break the third commandment, "Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image, or any likeness of any thing that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth" KJV. I guess the three figures and a common bowl is what reminded me of the other.

If you look carefully at the religious icon, you'll see under the bowl a little symbol. It's an ancient symbol of discipleship, a box within another box. So what's the use of religious works of art if they only leave us looking at heaven? That's where the cereal box began to save me from being a religious spectator.

If the Old Testament Trinity icon was meant to lead me deeper as a disciple, where would this Rice Krispy Trinity be pointing, Pentecost? The Book of Acts describes the arrival of the Holy Spirit like the sound of a rushing violent wind. Maybe with such a strong gale it drowned out the tongues of fire going, "Snap! Crackle! Pop!"

If there has been any good to come from the stay at home notice, it's been getting to know my neighbors. Up to this point, we've known each other's names, our children have played together, and we've borrowed each other's tool from the





garage. Now we've shared a picnic dinner, a front yard dance party, and walks to get ice cream together. The ice cream has led to new neighbors we've never seen before.

In the aftermath of hurricane Irma, a huge live oak tree from our yard blocked the entire street and a third of the neighbors' driveway across from us. We had spent the last two years getting to know our new Jacksonville neighbors, and removing the tree helped us even more. Removing the tree revealed an old spat between two neighbors that wouldn't come out to help. Would you believe it was over where they parked there cars? I had hoped that since I was being a friend who was also a pastor that something might have worked through, but it never happened. People say that moments like we're living through today can bring us closer together, but it still takes a willingness. Jesus said as he wept over Jerusalem, "Oh how I've wanted to gather you like a hen gathers her chicks, but you were unwilling." If we are willing, Jesus says its possible. (Luke 13:42)

My new cereal box icon got me thinking, I don't know anyone who hasn't enjoyed a Rice Krispy Treat, and I am willing to make them. I began thinking about neighbors a couple of doors down from us. I think we missed one another because of something about our daily routines is different. The more I considered them, the more I began to think about the neighbors next to them. They have a yard sign celebrating a graduation. I've seen Rice Krispy Treats at celebrations. Then driving home the other day I saw it. A blue tarp draped over a roof in our neighborhood. It's been there since the tornado warnings drove many of us into our bathrooms with mattresses five weeks ago.

My family still sings grace before meals about how "the Lord's been good to me." This Pentecost I've felt challenged to consider how my religious experiences of God and how they might be leading me out there to love a new neighbor I've never met. In these important days, how can we resist the temptation of keeping our religious experiences of God in a box, even a cereal box?

Local Missions – Good News Outreach

SPOTLIGHT ON FAITHFULNESS: "GOOD NEWS OUTREACH"

From Mathew 25: 35-40, "I was hungry and you fed me...I was in prison and you came to me... as you did it to the least of these...you did it to me."

Since 1986 Good News Outreach (GNO), a local non-denominational faith-based charitable organization has been quietly and effectively going about the business of providing vital services to our neighbors, and their children, who are in need. Those services include:

• Senior Grocery Program – In 2019, GNO volunteers delivered nearly 2500 bags of groceries from more than \$5,000 in gifts

· Housing for working poor families

– Maryland Oaks Crossing provides affordable and safe housing for the working poor in 47 well maintained mobile homes. In excess of 100 persons, including an average of 60 children currently are in residence. Services include tutoring, health screening and access to a food bank. These services were provided with about \$35,000 in donated goods and

services.

- Mercy House GNO provides temporary housing for up to 16 men released from prison. Each applicant is carefully screened and must agree to attend 12 step meetings as part of their recovery from addiction and complete a career development program. Each resident is provided with one-on-one case management, job search and basic services including food and transportation.
- GNO Food Pantry GNO volunteers have distributed an estimated 57 tons of food provided by Second Harvest of the Big Bend to almost 12,000 persons including children and seniors. Food donations were valued at approximately \$16,000.

GNO Leadership Team

Executive Director Don Parks in a recent letter to GNO partners wrote in response to the coronavirus, "GNO will remain open to serve those in need as God gives us the resources and grace to do so. In fact...we have expanded our food pantry from one day to five days weekly." Both Mercy House residents and families at Maryland Crossing will continue without interruption. The twelve volunteer members Board of Directors, led

by Chair Linda Barineau, remain committed to the mission of GNO. Recently elected Board member, Retired Chief Justice of the Florida Supreme Court, Major Harding stated, "I joined the board... because I saw that this was an opportunity not only to meet a tangible need... but in doing so to share the transforming power of faith in God and his mercies."

Local partners consist of a broad cross section of organizations such as Emergency Care Help Organization of Tallahassee (ECHO), Rotary Club of Tallahassee, Culpepper Construction Co., First Love of First Baptist Church, St. Paul UMC, Good Samaritan UMC, FSU Chapman School of Community Health and others.

Trinity's Local Missions Team Chair, Dennis Smith, has indicated he wants his Team members to discuss and prepare a report on how our church may be able to join Good News Outreach in partnership in the near future and once the COVID-19 Pandemic is under control.
