A Busy Beginning to 2026 for Local Missions

The start of a new year brings with it new opportunities for Trinity UMC to make an impact for good on Tallahassee and surrounding areas. By the time this *Tidings* is published, twenty-six teams of Trinity members will have stepped in to give regular Meals on Wheels volunteers a day off on Martin Luther King Jr. Day. Individuals, families, and groups of friends will have delivered meals to over a hundred homebound residents of Tallahassee, bringing them both daily nourishment and social interaction that is often in short supply for those who often live isolated lives.

Sleep in Heavenly Peace Bed Build - February 21

Also in January, Trinity's members collected bedding for single beds in anticipation of the bunk beds we will be building for Sleep in Heavenly Peace (SHP) on Saturday, February 21. This collection effort will continue until the date of our build.

SHP is a nonprofit organization that builds and delivers bunkbeds for children who would otherwise be sleeping on a couch, on the floor, or crowded together with other family members on a too-small bed. On occasion, such as occurred at the end of 2025, the unavailability of beds is the final impediment to a family being reunited. Beds supplied by SHP allowed the family to spend the holidays back together. In 2025, SHP Tallahassee delivered over 350 beds to children in our community, including those that Trinity built during our spring 2025 SHP build.

We will be building twenty-five bunk beds (50 beds) on Saturday, February 21. As with our 2025 build, we will be teaming up with the FSU/TSC Wesley Foundation and will hold the event again at the Wesley Foundation Pensacola Street parking lot. We need at least seventy-five volunteers to assist with the actual build with tasks appropriate for all ages and abilities, from sorting nuts and screws, to sanding, to cutting lumber to size. Volunteers are also needed to serve on a welcoming committee, to provide coffee and light snacks for the work crew. Finally, we need delivery teams of two to three people per pickup truck to deliver and install the beds. These lucky volunteers have the pleasure of personally witnessing the joy of children receiving what are often the first beds of their own they've ever had. The more delivery teams we have, the more beds we can deliver that same day.

Once you've registered for our church build, I'll send you the link to the SHP registration. All volunteers should report at 8:30 on the morning of Saturday, February 21, for a short welcome and orientation so that we can begin the actual building sharply at 9:00 a.m.

Bear Sunday - February 15

Not to be forgotten, February 15 will be our annual Bear Sunday. For this much beloved event, Trinity members supply Teddy bears and other stuffed animals to line the walls of the our worship spaces. (Please note that the 8:30 a.m. service will meet in the sanctuary on Bear Sunday.) In past years, we've collected over 300 stuffed toys that have then been distributed to local organizations including Leon and Wakulla public schools, Jefferson County Health Department, Madison Youth Ranch/Residing Hope, Camelot Community Care, and the Victim Advocate Office of the Second Circuit State Attorney. We also plan to include a stuffed toy for each of the beds built for Sleep in Heavenly Peace.

This is just the beginning of what is planned to be a busy and impactful year of mission opportunities for Trinity members. The Local Missions Committee meets on the first Tuesday of each month at noon, usually in the church Conference Room. We welcome anyone who would like to join us.



Angel Tree Ministry: Sharing Christ's Love This Christmas

This Christmas season, our Angel Tree Ministry, in partnership with Catholic Charities Christmas Connection, was a beautiful reflection of Christ's love in action. Through the generosity of our congregation and the dedication of many volunteers, more than 300 wishlist gifts and \$1,500 in gift cards were lovingly placed under the Trinity Christmas trees.

By partnering with Catholic Charities, we were able to reach some of the most vulnerable members of our community. Recipients were carefully vetted, selected, and referred by trusted social service agencies, ensuring that our outreach reached those facing the greatest needs. Each gift — whether a toy, blanket, or gift card — represented care, dignity, and hope during the Christmas season.

In addition to the wishlist gifts provided by the congregation, four families were fully adopted by groups within our church: the Chancel Choir and music groups, the Aldersgate Sunday School Class, the Betty Phifer Sunday School Class, and a women's friends group from Trinity. The families included a family of six experiencing homelessness; a family of three with an infant whose father recently lost his job; a family of four led by a single parent raising three teenagers amid financial hardship and loss; and a single mother with two young children who recently moved from homelessness into stable housing while working full-time to build a new life for her family.

Each group met every requested need — and more. Social workers shared the deep joy and gratitude expressed by these families.

Our many volunteers, including our Trinity youth, made this ministry possible. Through sorting, packing, delivering, and supporting every step, they helped ensure that our Angel Tree ministry truly reflected the love of Christ.

Trinity United Methodist Church 2026 Committees

In the United Methodist Church (UMC), the structure of committees and church leadership is carefully guided by the Book of Discipline to ensure consistency across congregations while still allowing flexibility for local contexts. The Nominations and Leadership Development Committee identifies, recruits, and nominates church members for leadership roles.

The Charge Conference is the primary governing body of each local church. It meets at least once a year and is usually presided over by the district superintendent or their designee. Its members include the leaders of the church — officers, committee chairpersons, and others defined locally. The Charge Conference reviews and approves nominations for church leadership; confirms the budget, membership roll, and church goals; and authorizes the establishment or reorganization of committees.

The Church Council is the main governing body of the local church, responsible for ensuring the church's mission and vision while providing careful administrative oversight. The Church Council includes a chairperson, pastors, lay leaders, chairpersons of key committees, and representatives from major ministry areas.

Core administrative committees include the Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC), Trustees, Finance Committee, and Lay Leadership. The Nominations Committee proposes a slate of leaders to fill committee positions each year. As required, Trinity's slate of leaders was presented for approval to the Charge Conference, and after approval, leaders began serving January 1 in the following capacities.

Additional committees at Trinity UMC plan, organize, facilitate, and engage in activities related to Local Missions, World Missions, Health and Wellness, Worship, Disaster Response, Music, Social Justice, and Investment, along with several other designated care teams that serve our church and community. Newly formed this year is the Facility Renovation Committee, a group created to address facility needs that were identified during our 2025 Onward Visioning process.

Together, these church leaders work to carry out the mission and vision of Trinity United Methodist Church and to ensure that our facility, staff, community, and congregation are strengthened to meet the needs of today and the years ahead.

It's hard to believe it's February already. How are you doing with your New Year's fitness resolutions? Why not try one of the five weekly BFC (Becoming Fit at Church) Exercise classes or learn how to play Pickleball as you work to reach your goals? There is something for everyone!

Staying Strong meets Tuesdays at 9:45 a.m. and Thursdays at 12:15 p.m.

This basic exercise class begins with a gradual warm-up, followed by upper and lower body and core and balance exercises, and finishes with a relaxing flexibility segment all while standing or seated. It's a great multilevel class appropriate for beginners, those looking to do prehab before surgery, or those looking to perform seated and standing exercise only.

Variety Mix meets Tuesdays and Thursdays at 11:00 a.m.

This fun, fast-paced exercise class begins with an aerobic warm-up, followed by upper and lower body resistance training and core and balance training, and finishes with flexibility exercise. It's an intermediate to advanced level class that may include squats, lunges and floor exercise.



Both classes use a variety of equipment, which may include hand weights, resistance bands, balls of all sizes, Gliding discs, and Pilates rings. Variety Mix also uses BOSUs, body bars, and various stability pads, pods, and more.

Flex on the Floor meets Tuesdays at 12:10 p.m.

This stretch class begins with a standing dynamic stretch warm-up, followed by static stretching on a mat using a small ball for rolling and stretch straps. It's great for those who wish to improve flexibility and mobility as well as reduce stress.
