We in Africa appreciate fully all that the people back home are doing to help us. This help is reflected in ample supplies, in a good and improving mail supply, in a feeling also that the courage and the spirit you have shown will not lessen under adversity, nor slacken no matter how long it takes us to do the job ahead. Having that feeling of confidence is much more important, really, than anything else, to us.

I have been well, and happy in the thought that my wife and children are in Tallahassee where we have so many real friends. I hope the day will soon come when I can be back there too.
