Dear Jack:

Your letter of November 15th reached me the first part of December. It was good to hear from you, and to know that you had been in Ocala, and had taken a meal with Mabel and the children. It makes me homesick when I think of being away from my family for so long (2 years the 28th of last November) with no prospect of an immediate return. But I don't let myself think about it too much, and as I am very busy at this particular time, I have many things to occupy my time and at-It will be a happy day when this terrible war is over and the millions of men now away from their homes, may be reunited with their loved ones and families.

Yes, Bob Parker and I have played golf together a number of times; also Cheever Lewis, from Tallahassee. Cheever is not here now, and I have not seen Bob for quite a while. I was assigned a new job about the first of September, and so have been tied down so that it is very difficult for me to get off for an entire afternoon, which it takes to get in a game of golf.

We have had a very nice Christmas season here. I had Christmas dinner with a family who were missionaries in China for many years, but now live here. It was quite an occasion, with two grandchildren present to enjoy the presents which they received and the Christmas tree, etc. On Monday night of this week (27th) I had another turkey dinner with the Lims, a Korean family. Lim was at Emory with me in 1920. He has a lovely wife and two children, a boy 19 and a girl 16. He is pastor of the First Korean Church here. Miss Alice Appenzeller lives with them, and works with the Korean people. She was President, Ehwa School for Girls in Korea for many years. Her brother, Dr. H. D. Appenzeller, is now Pastor of the First Methodist Church here, both very superior people.

E. C. Willson, of the Florida Conference is here now also. Had a visit with him the day he arrived, and am looking forward to seeing him again before long. Hugh Embry was here for a while last summer, but is now somewhere "at sea" as Chaplain on the cruiser "Montpelier". Had a very interesting letter from him about two weeks ago.

Here's hoping that I'll be able to attend the Conference in June, celebrating the centennial of Florida Methodism. I'm not counting on it too much, but there is always a possibility. I'm sure it will be a most interesting occasion.


To the Folks at Home:
