August 27, 1943

Dear Rev. Anderson,

Knowing, that all in war cannot be as we would desire, a person really

appreciates that he has someone before, whom he can place faith and ~~the~~ security in. These thoughts and beliefs are a great satisfaction to a person in this war zone.

Here in Africa, I find this country very interesting and so unreal, as to what we were taught and accustomed to in the States. The sights to be seen and the ways and actions of the people here, really surprise one in the beginning. After some four (4) months in Africa, I have become accustomed to their ways

and actions toward me
 Americans. In visiting
 different cities, such as
 Casablanca, Constantine and
 Tunis, I have become
 very dull toward the strange
 sights and inhabitants actions.
 Time, as we all know,
 automatically teach a person
 to become so acquainted
 with these strange sights,
 that he feels as though he
were walking down 5th
 ave. — Ha! (Do not believe all
 that statement. Ha!).

letter in Africa. Each month

and continue receiving it.

happy as can be expected.


